In a written opinion dated December 8, 1981, a copy of which is enclosed herewith, the Baltimore County Zoning Commissioner adopted the same position oversed by our office in this letter. By building berms and spreading sludge on both the subject property and the land adjacent thereto, Land Reclamation, Inc. acquired a vested right under Maryland law.

From the standpoint of the owners of the property, the landspreading of sludge constitutes a nonconforming use. Section 104.1 of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations and the standard of the Saltimore County Zoning Regulations and the standard that the construction of these regulations and the landspreading of sludge on the subject property seets the criteria for establishing an "existing use" under Maryland law:

"As understood in the ordinance, 'existing use' should mean the utilization of the premises so that they may be known in the neighborhood as being employed for a given purpose; f.e., the conduct of a business." Landay v. Board of Zoning Appeals, 173 Hd. 460, 469 (1938).

The neighboring residents knew that sludge had been spread on the subject property prior to the effective date of the zoning amendments. In cooperation with the Office of the Baltimore County Executive, this law firm has been negotiating an agreement with those residents that would establish acceptable operational procedures and environmental controls and create a trust fund for the benefit of the neighborhood.

I hope this letter explains our position that the landspreading of sludge on the subject property does not require a special exception. Please contact us if you require any additional information.

Dear Mac:

It was a pleasure meeting with you on February 22nd for the purpose of reviewing the status of the present sand and gravel operation on the Smuck property. Roland Manger of Genstar Stone Products Company, which is the mining company for the site, was also in attendance. We informed you at that time that it was our intent to restore the mining excavations in accordance with the State mining plan by importing off-site materials.

The evolution of the mining operation on the property is as follows. The property was originally zoned R-40, however, on November 22, 1967, Baltimore County granted a special exception which authorized a "controlled excavation". The special exception was subjected to four conditions, all of which have been either modified or satisfied.

In 1975 the State of Maryland enacted a surface mining law for non-coal related activities. It was designed to regulate the mining of sand ad gravel and it emphasized the restoration and rehabilitation of mined areas. The prefatory provisions and the intent indicated an attempt to restore mined areas to their original contours and grade. It is fair to say that that intent has not been uniformly achieved because of the lack of on-site back fill material. The State has not, therefore, enforced reclamation to original contours as a strict condition in the reclamation process. It has strictly enforced stabilization and restoration of beneficial uses subsequent to the mining operation. A major element in the State mining law is the requirement for reclamation and stabilization bonds.

MICROFILMED

From the time that the mining operation commenced on the subject property a significant interest in reclaiming the subject property in a manner which would be consistent with a passive State Park usage has been discussed and there has also been discussion regarding the donation of the property to the State.

Genstar seeks to use non-putrescible material, such as broken concrete, cement, brick and mortar as back fill material in order to raise the grade of the land and restore the area as closely as possible to original contours. It also seeks, in a separate cell, to utilize tree stumps as fill material. The material placed within the mined out areas to be used as fill is subject to both local and state health office approval. This operation would permit an expedient and more cost-effective restoration of the natural contours. In the environmental sense it is a recycling of spent inorganic material as part of the rehabilitation process. The finished grades will be stabilized and planted in accordance with state requirements. This is critical because of the state objective of including the mined area into the Gunpowder State Park system.

I have represented the intent to utilize off-site fill material and I expressed the intent to the two citizens associations in the area. To date I have received no negative responses, but both Genstar Stone Products Company and the Smucks wish to assure you that given the minimal impacted area and the use of inorganic material, there should be no negative environmental impacts. We are certain that we can work together with the Citizens Associations so that any of their concerns will be satisfied.

You indicated that this matter should be reviewed with the Zoning Officer of Baltimore County to satisfy all regulatory requirements. This letter should place our representations on record. Cur review of the Baltimore County Zoning Ordinance would indicate that no further zoning approvals are required, so long as this restoration process is an integral part of the mining operation.

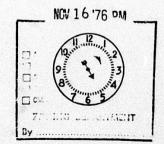

In essence, the enclosed letter requests that the Campbell Company be permitted to utilize their own private haul road, which has been constructed entirely within the boundary of their property. Said haul road presently crosses Allender Read at one point and, if this request is granted, it would be extended into the adjoining Smuch property, which would necessitate one other grade

controlled excavation. Over the years we have constructed and developed a private road system through our land, that makes one right angle crossing of Allender Road and enters U. S. Route 40, Pulaski Highway, just north of Allender Road. Our truck traffic movements have followed this road pattern without incident. We have also maintained the surfacing of Allender Road where we cross it.

By this letter, we would like to request an alternative to the fourth condition, that would substantially comply with the Board's mandate and create an overall safer traffic condition on Allender Road, that, of course, was the Board's concern at the time.

As can be seen on the attached plat, the Campbell Special Exception and the Smuck Special Exception overlap along Allender Road. During our extraction operations on Campbell property, a private road was established and maintained in close proximity campoen property, a private roas was established and mannamed in close prosimity to this overlap. We, therefore, propose an extension of our private road system to the northeast, crossing Allender Road at right angles and continuing into the Smuck property. All materials then hauled from the Smuck parcel would make this new right angle crossing of Allender Road, proceeding through our property and again crossing angue crossing of Allender Roan, proceeding urough our property and again crossing Allender Road at our present location, continuing again through our property to Pulaski Highway. This would eliminate the necessity to reconstruct and widen Allender Road from Loreley Beach Road to Pulaski Highway, and also eliminate additional pull-offs on Allender Road east of the Loreley Beach Road intersection.

The Smuck family owns all of the property east of the proposed new easternmost crossing of Allender Road, with the exception of one improved lot and one unimproved parcel. Both parcels are shown on the attached plat.

It is our feeling that this alternative will create a much safer traffic condition in this area and, of course, virtually eliminate what could become extraordinary maintenance problems for almost one mile of County road. Our company would cooperate and maintain the proposed new crossing of Allender Road, as it has done in the past with the existing crossing. Proper site distance of the crossing would be maintained by us and appropriate security measures taken in order to discourage use of our private road system by the public.

We therefore request your confirmation that Condition No. 4 of the Special Excep-tion is inapplicable to the transportation of the sand and gravel from the site in view of the fact that our company would not be utilizing Allender Road as was contemplated at the time of the granting of the Special Exception.

We would appreciate your decision and comments on these matters at your earliest convenience.

OPINION The petitioner in this case seeks a special exception in an R-40 zone to

conduct controlled excavation of sand and gravel deposits. The petition was granted with restrictions by the Zoning Commissioner on April 13, 1962, from which decision the proleutente are appealing

The subject property is located in the Loreley section of the Eleventh Election District of Baltimore County. It is at the eastern end of Allender Road, also known as Taylors Mount Road, on the south side of Big Gunpowder Falls, near its confluence with the Gunpowder and Bird Rivers. The property is actually on a peninsula. The tip end is owned entirely by the petitioner, constituting 720 acres, of which 579 acres is the subject of this petition and is identified on a plot entered as petitioner's exhibit #1.

The zoning map in effect for the area is the Eleventh District map adopted by the County Council on August 1st, 1966. The subject tract, as well as adjoining property, had been previously zoned R-6 but on the latest map they are reclassified to R-40. This is a rural area and much of the cleared land is cultivated for growing farm

Counsel for the petitioner called Captain Paul Reincke of the Baltimore County Fire Prevention Bureau; Mr. Timothy Margerum, Chief, Division of Engineering, Baltimore County Department of Health; Mr. Hugo Leim, Jr., Traffic Expert; and Mr. Bernard Medairy, realtor-appraiser, to testify as expert witnesses. Without going into any lengthy discourse of their testimony, it was their consensus that Section 502.1 of the Zoning Regulations would not be violated by granting the petition. However, Mr. Leim testified that it would be desirous to widen Allender Road from 18 to 24 feet. He testified that Baltimore County has appropriated funds to make such an improvement for 1300 feet from Pulaski Highway to Loreley Beach Road. This testimony was further verified by introduction of petitioner's exhibit \*14, a copy of minutes of the Baltimore County Executive Board meeting approving project directive #2986. He further testified that since the Nottingham case was heard (1962-#5109-X), traffic signals had been installed at the intersection of Pulaski Highway and Allender Road.

Mr. Medairy stated that the proposed excavation could not be seen by the residents of Loreley Beach and would not adversely affect their property values. Their

, to some extent, are already influenced by existing industrial zoning at Pulaski Highway and Allender Road. He further testified to the effect that quarrying operations can only be accomplished where the product is found. A precedent for this observation i found in the Circuit Court case of A. A. Dyer Co. vs. Nathan H. Kaufman, et al, Misc. Docket No. 6, Folio No. 126, File No. 1937, where in a supplemental opinion dated December 5, 1958 the Court, by John E. Raine, Judge, said: "A quarry area, unlike group housing areas, is sui generis. The location of quarries is fixed by nature. They are, in a sense, unique and this aspect of the matter justifies unique treatment by the zoning authorities and by the Courts".

The petitioner, Mr. Harry Smuck, testified that the proposed excavation would be done by drag line and that there would be no run-off of silt to the rivers. He cited an excavation that he has been operating successfully for twenty-seven years on the Patapsco River and Hollins Ferry Road without run-off. He further testified that he would widen Taylors Mount Road as necessary to assure safe traffic conditions.

There was only one protestant at the first day of the hearing. The sole nt, Frederick G. Brown, appeared in his own behalf and testified that he does not oppose the granting of the special exception if the road will be widened. He cannot see the subject property from his home, but was concerned that a school bus and a truck could not safely pass each other on the narrow road.

Other protestants contacted the Board's office after the first day of hearing, stating that they were unaware that this five year old case was being tried since there had been no new "posting" of the property. The Board, over the objection of the petitioner decided that the protestants were entitled to their "day in court" and that the case should be continued, even though the usual sequence of presenting testimony would be altered.

At the continuation, the protestants were represented by counsel. Some ourteen additional protestants testified, including a Mrs. Katherine Van Rossum representing the Oliver Beach Improvement Association; Mr. Len B. Wilson, a soil conservation expert; Harry Reipe, Jr., a real estate expert; and Mr. Lee Rosenberg, Executive Vice President of the neurby Joppatowne and Rumsey Island developments. 
The protestants' testimony, in toto, was that they objected to granting the petition because of potential traffic hazards, siltation of the rivers, and lowering of the potable water table that may

Mr. Wilson testified that the site now is in good condition to hold or prevent siltation, but that a certain amount of erosion can never be stopped as it is a natural phenomena. If the site were developed into R-40 residential lots as presently zoned he said there would be some erosion that may be greater or lesser than if controlled excavation Harry A. Smuck - \$5166-X

rmitted. He stated that planting permanent grass mixtures and develop good sod on the slopes would be sound erosion control practice.

Mr. Reipe testified that, in his opinion, development of Joppatowne would rdized, and that Loreley Beach residences would suffer mild damages if the petition were granted. Under cross-examination he replied that he was familiar with the fact that a sand and gravel operation, located in Joppatowne, was conducted during the construction of Joppatowne and is still operating under lease. He further expressed concern that periodic flooding conditions in the Gunpowder River basin may overflow mining peration on the subject property and thereby increase siltation.

Mr. Rosenberg testified as to the multi-million dollar investment that his company has in the Joppatowne and Rumsey Island developments, and objected to the granting of the petition on the basis that his developments would be adversely affected. lowever, he acknowledged that the sand and gravel company in Joppatowne is owned by them; that it supplied most of the sand and gravel for the development of Joppatowne and Rumsey Island; and that it is leased out for continued regration for another one and one-half to two years.

To further his case, the petitioner produced two other expert witnesses; Mr. Henry Gropp, a hydrological engineer, and Mr. Carl Supp, a civil engineer and certified professional geologist. Both experts had impressive qualifications and experien in their respective fields. Some of the more salient features of their lengthy testimony were that the mining excavation here would not have any adverse effect on the undergroun water table, its supply or purity. It should not contaminate the rivers as a "closed" system will be employed, pumping and recirculating water for washing the sand and gravel. These two witnesses greatly impressed the Board with their thorough, detailed, and convincing testimony. The Board relies heavily on their expertise in the technical aspects of the case and along with the testimony of other witnesses, it is the opinion of the Board that the petitioner has satisfied the requirements of Section 502.1 of the Zoning Regulation and we are convinced that granting the petition will not adversely affect the protestants. The special exception requested, therefore, is granted subject to the following restrictions:

- 1. The site plan for the excavation of the subject property The site plan for the excavation of the subject property shall be subject to the prior approval of the Bureau of Land Development, the Bureau of Traffic Engineering, and the Office of Planning and Zoning
- 2. A buffer strip of at least 50 feet wide, consisting of perimeter of the site

## OPINION

The petitioner in this case seeks a special exception in an R-40 zone to conduct controlled exception of sand and gravel deposits. The petition was granted with restrictions by the Zoning Commissioner on April 13, 1962, from which decision the protestant are exception.

The subject property is located in the Loreley section of the Eleventh Election District of Baltimore County. It is at the eastern end of Allender Road, also known as Taylors Mount Road, on the south side of Big Gunpowder Falls, near its confluence with the Cunpowder and Bird Rivers. The property is actually an a peninsula. The tip end is owned entirely by the petitioner, constituting 720 cares, of which 579 acres is the subject of this petition and is identified on a plat entered as petitioner's exhibit \*1.

The zoning map in effect for the area is the Eleventh District map adopted by the County Council on August 1st, 1966. The subject tract, as well as adjoining property, had been previously zoned R-6 but on the latest map they are reclassified to R-40. This is a rural area and much of the cleared land is cultivated for growing form crops.

County Fire Prevention Bureau; Mr. Timothy Margerum, Chief, Division of Engineering, Baltimore County Period Prevention Bureau; Mr. Timothy Margerum, Chief, Division of Engineering, Baltimore County Department of Health; Mr. Hugo Leim, Jr., Triffic Expert; and Mr. Bernard Medairy, realtar-appraiser, to testify as expert witnesses. Without going into any lengthy discourse of their testimory, it was their consensus that Section 502.1 of the Zanning Regulations would not be violated by granting the petition. However, Mr. Leim testified that it would be desirous to widen Allender Road from 18 to 24 feet. He testified that Baltimore County has appropriated funds to make such an improvement for 1300 feet from Pulaski Highway to Loreley Beach Road. This testimony was further verified by introduction of petitioner's exhibit 14, a copy of minutes of the Baltimore County Executive Board meeting approving project directive 7296. He further testified that since the Nottinghom case was beard (1962–5109-X), traffic signals had been installed at the intersection of Pulaski Highway and Allender Road.

Mr. Medairy stated that the proposed excavation could not be seen by the residents of Loreley Beach and would not adversely affect their property values. Their

properties, to some extent, are already influenced by existing industrial zoning at Pulauki Highway and Allender Road. He further testified to the effect that quarrying operations can only be accomplished where the product is found. A precedent for this observation is found in the Circuit Court case of A. A. Dyer Co. vs. Nathon H. Kaufman, et al., Misc. Docket No. 6, Folio No. 129, File No. 1937, where in a supplemental opinion dated December 5, 1958 the Court, by John E. Raine, Judge, said: "A quarry area, unlike group housing areas, is sui generis. The location of quarries is fixed by nature. They are, in a sense, unique and this aspect of the matter justifies unique treatment by the zoning authorities and by the Courts".

The petitioner, Mr. Harry Smuck, testified that the proposed excavation would be done by drag line and that there would be no run-off of silf to the rivers. He cited an excavation that he has been operating successfully for twenty-even years on the Patapsco River and Hollins Ferry Road without run-off. He further testified that he would widon Taylors Mount Road on secessary to assure safe traffic conditions.

There was only one protestent at the first day of the hearing. The sale protestant, Frederick G. Brown, appeared in his own behalf and testified that he does not oppose the granting of the special exception if the road will be widened. He cannot see the subject property from his home, but was concerned that a school bus and a truck could not safely ones each other on the narrow road.

Other protestants contacted the Board's affice after the first day of hearing, stating that they were unaware that this five year old case was being tried since there had been no new "posting" of the property. The Board, over the objection of the petitioner, decided that the protestants were entitled to their "day in couri" and that the case should be continued, even though the usual sequence of presenting testimony would be altered.

At the continuation, the protestants were represented by councel. Some fourteen additional protestants testified, including a Mrs. Katherine Van Rossum representing the Oliver Beach Improvement Association; Mr. Len B. Wilson, a soil conservation expert; Harry Reipe, Jr., a real estate expert; and Mr. Lee Rosenberg, Executive Vice President of the nearby Jappatowne and Rumsey Island developments. The protestants testimony, in toto, was that they objected to granting the petition because of potential traffic hazards, sillation of the rivers, and lowering of the potable water table that may

Mr. Wilson testified that the site now is in good condition to hold or prevent sillation, but that a certain amount of existion can never be stopped as it is a natural phenomena. If the site were developed into R-40 residential lost as presently zoned he said there would be some ension that may be greater or lesser than if controlled excevation Harry A. Smuck - #5166-X

were permitted. He stated that planting permanent grass mixtures and development of a good sod on the slopes would be sound crosion control practice.

Mr. Reipe testified that, in his opinion, development of Joppatowne would be jeopardized, and that Loreley Beach residences would suffer mild domages if the petition were granted. Under cross-exonimin-7-3n he replied that he was familiar with the fact that a sand and grovel operation, located in Joppatowne, was conducted during the construction of Joppatowne and is still operating under lease. He further expressed concern that periodic flooding conditions in the Gurpowder River bosin may overflow mining operation on the subject processive and thereby increase silation.

Mr. Rosenberg testified as to the multi-million dollar investment that his company has in the Jappatowne and Runsey Island developments, and objected to the granting of the patition on the Losis that his developments would be adversely affected. However, he acknowledged that the sand and gravel company in Jappatowne is owned by them; that it supplied most of the sand and gravel for the development of Jappatowne and Runsey Island; and that it is leased out for continued operation for another one and one-half to two years.

To further his case, the petitioner produced two other expert witnesses; Mr. Henry Gropp, a hydrological engineer, and Mr. Carl Supp, a civil engineer and certified professional geologist. Both experts had impressive qualifications and experience in their respective fields. Some of the more solient features of their lengthy testimony were that the mining excavation here would not have any adverse effect on the underground water table, its supply or purity. It should not contaminate the rivers as a "closed" system will be employed, pumping and recticulating water for woshing the sand and grovel. These two witnesses greatly impressed the Board with their thorough, detailed, and convincing testimony. The Board relias heavily on their expertise in the technical aspects of the case and along with the testimony of other witnesses, it is the opinion of the Board that the petitioner has satisfied the requirements of Section 502.1 of the Zoning Regulations, and we are convinced their granting the petition will not adversely affect the protestants. The special exception requested, therefore, is granted subject to the following restrictions:

- The site plan for the excavation of the subject property shall be subject to the prior approval of the Bureau of Land Development, the Bureau of Traffic Engineering, and the Office of Planning and Zoning
- A buffer strip of at least 50 feet wide, consisting of natural brush and woods, shall be provided around the perimeter of the site

Soon after the causeway was completed at Georgetown (1805), Long Bridge was constructed across the Potomuc several miles below. This bridge, located on the site of the present 14th Street bridge, linked the Federal City with Alexandria, Va. Georgetown and Alexandria were rivals in tady. Shortly after the bridge was finished, the trade of Georgetown fell off rapidly as a result of the silting of the channel above. A heated controversy developed, in which one faction attributed this silting to the construction developed, in which one taction attributed this stifting to the construction of Long Bridge and the other faction maintained but it was due to the causeway built by Georgetown. The argument was even carried to Congress Isaac Hall, "in 1844, referred to Long Bridge as causing the deposition of "many million cords" of allowium.

The silting of Georgetown's hipping channel was not due primarily to-

EFFECTS OF EROSION IN CHESAPEAKE BAY

The development of larger and more efficient dredging equipment pro-teen our present-day seaports from suffering the fate of colonial ports. But dredging is a continuous and courly process. During the past century the federal government has spent more than \$56,000,000 for dredging in the Chesapack Bay area alone, some \$40,000,000 for new channels and

\$16,000,000 for maintenance, and much dredging still remains to be done. In many places this dredging involves the removal of sediment deposited

during colonial times or as a result of colonial land use, so that we are still

paying, and shall continue to pay for some time to come, for the land exploitation of the earliest settlers.

Improper land use was not a failing of the colonists alone; it has con-

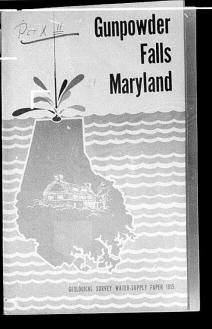

During the past 29 years the two large reservoirs of the City of Baltimore on the Gunpowder Falis have trapped a total of 9,600,000 cubic yards of sediment, derived for the most part from the cultivated land on the watershed. This is equivalent to the removal of roughly 1 inch of surface soil exclusive of eroded material that has come to rest below slopes and in valley bottoms. Research studies made in the Corn Belt by the Soil Conservation Service indicate that the removal of 1 inch of topsoil from a field will reduce corn yield by 5 bushels. removal of 1 men or topson from a nea wan reduce corn piece oy 5 outsies per acre. If the fertility of the soil in the Gunpowder Falls watershed has decreased to the point where it will produce, on the average, only 1 bushel less per acre, then the loss in income to the farmers in this watershed due duction of corn yields over 30 years has been nearly a million dollars. -The Constal Plain section of the Gunpowder Falls basin and the ne well field. (Line A-A' is line of wells and test borings shown in

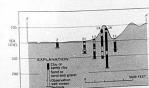

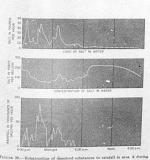

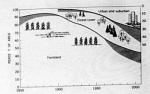


FIGURE 30.—Land use in the basin, 1830-2010. Gray area shows the most proba-ble ranges of values for periods for which records are incomplete and for the forecasts.

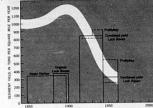


FIGURE 31.—Sediment yield reflecting change in land use, 1850-1963. (For a fuller explanation, see p. 51.)

## CONCLUSIONS

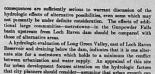

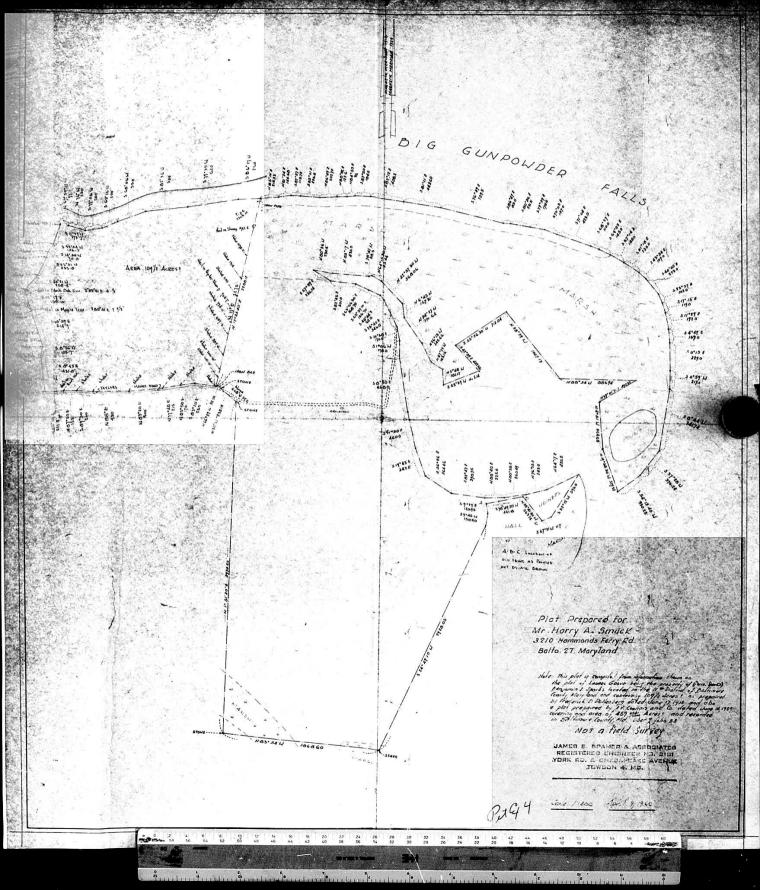

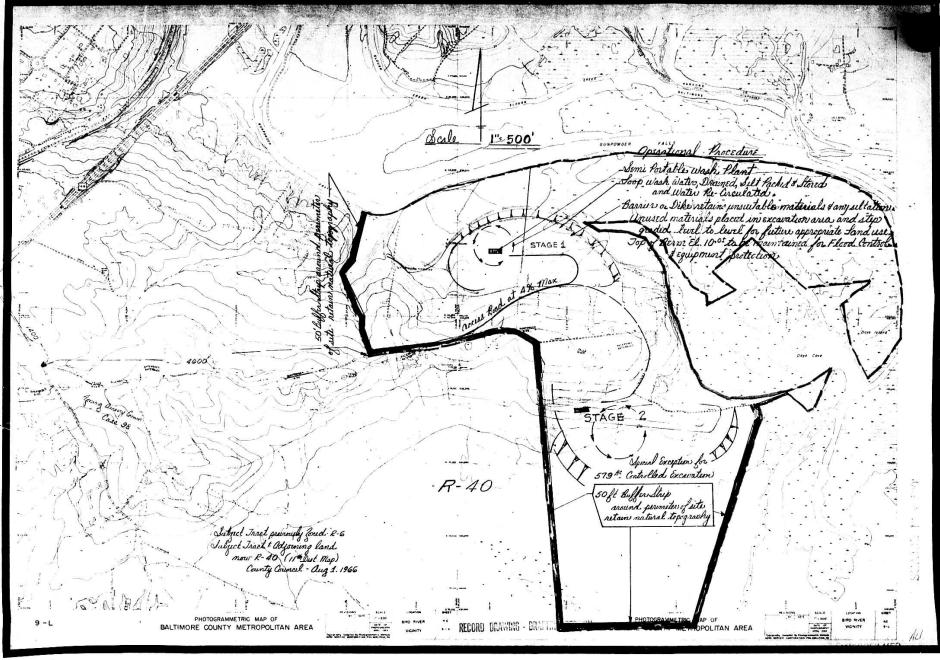
