This is an appeal from a judgment in the Circuit Court for Baltimore County. Appellee Williams Management Services, Inc. manages a mobile home park owned by appellee Williams Estates. In 1992, appellees requested a variance from Baltimore County zoning regulations that govern the distance between mobile home units. The zoning commissioner granted the variance with regard to one section of the park, but denied it with regard to the remainder. Williams appealed the denial to the County Board of Appeals, which approved the variance for the remainder of the park by order dated July 16, 1993 and amended August 11, 1993. On February 14, 1984, the Circuit Court for Baltimore County affirmed the Board's orders.

Appellants present the following questions for our review, several of which we restate for clarity:

- I. Did the Board err by issuing an opinion that failed to contain findings of fact setting forth the reasons for the Board's decision?
- II. Did the Board err in finding that "special circumstances or conditions" existed?
- III. Did the Board err in finding that strict compliance with the zoning regulations would result in "practical difficulty"?
- IV. Did the Board err by granting a variance when the record fails to establish that the owner cannot fully use his property without the variance?
- IV. Did the Board err by granting a "blanket variance" that applied to all home sites at Williams Estates?
- V. Did the Board err by granting a variance that was not in "strict harmony" with the "spirit and intention" of the applicable zoning regulation?

Nonetheless, there was also testimony that only five of the park's 557 sites are currently vacant (a vacancy rate of less than one percent), and that two of the vacant lots could accommodate a double-wide home without the requested variance. Mr. Poole also testified that there is still a "very large" market for new single-section homes, and as many as fifty percent of the sites in the older section of the park could accommodate a double-section home without the requested variance.

Mr. Poole's testimony was supplemented with the opinions of several experts, including a landscape architect and an industry trade official. Both testified that a separation of twenty feet was the norm in new communities, and opined that the requested variance would not have an adverse impact on the safety or appearance of Williams Estates. The trade official stated that mobile home communities that fail to adapt to the demand for double-wide home sites are likely to experience higher vacancy rates and a gradual decline in appearance, as home owners relocate elsewhere and renters move into older homes. Such parks, he concluded, would cease to be "viable" communities.

The requested variance was opposed by park residents, neighboring property owners, and the People's Counsel for Baltimore County. The owner of a neighboring drive-in theater testified that flooding caused by poor drainage at Williams Estates has shut down his theater on several occasions and caused extensive property damage. A park resident testified that some areas of the park remain flooded more than forty-eight hours after a heavy rain.

Park residents also expressed concerns about the loss of open space, and the possibility that a fire in one home would threaten neighboring homes. Notwithstanding the opposition, the Board granted the variance, subject to certain restrictions intended to ensure that the flooding problem does not become worse. The Board subsequently amended its order to provide for a separation of twenty feet rear-to-rear, rather than sixteen feet. Appellants, who include park residents as well as an association of mobile home owners, took an appeal from the Board's decision to the Circuit Court for Baltimore County. The court affirmed, and appellants noted this appeal.

## LEGAL ANALYSIS

I

As a general rule, review in both this Court and the circuit court is limited to determining whether the Board's decision is "in accordance with the law or whether it is arbitrary, illegal, and capricious." Moseman v. County Council, 99 Md. App. 258, 262 (1994). The court will not overturn the board's factual findings or its application of law to facts if the board's decision is supported by substantial evidence. Mortimer v. Howard Research & Dev. Corp., 83 Md. App. 432, 441, cert. denied, 321 Md. 164 (1990). Substantial evidence means more than a scintilla of evidence,

On appeal, Williams had amended its petition to provide for twenty feet of space rear-to-rear, but the Board's original order mistakenly granted a variance for sixteen f et.

Montgomery County v. Gr. Colesville Citizens' Ass'n, 70 Md. App. 374, 382 (1987); such that a reasonable person could come to more than one conclusion. Moseman, 99 Md. App. at 262-63 (citing Eger v. Stone, 253 Md. 533, 542 (1969)). In such a situation, the issue is considered to be "fairly debatable," and the reviewing court will not substitute its judgment for that of the board. When reviewing issues of law, on the other hand, the reviewing court may reach its own conclusions without deference to the board's opinion. Columbia Road Citizens' Ass'n v. Montgomery County, 98 Md. App. 695, 698 (1994).

Several of the issues raised by appellants may be addressed in Under § 307.1 of the Baltimore County Zoning short order. Regulations, a variance may be granted only upon a showing that "practical difficulty or unreasonable hardship" would result from strict compliance with the ordinance. See Red Roof Inns, Inc. v. . People's Council, 96 Md. App. 219, 224 (1993) (the language of the Baltimore County ordinance is disjunctive and a showing of either "practical difficulties" or "unreasonable hardships" will suffice); McLean v. Soley, 270 Md. 208, 214-15 (1973) (discussing the criteria 'for evaluating a claim that ."practical difficulties" existed). Under the practical difficulties standard, the party seeking a variance need not show that full use of the property cannot be made unless the variance is granted. See McLean, 270 Md. at 214. As we explain more fully below, McLean requires only that the party seeking a variance show a substantial and unnecessary burden.

We likewise find no error in the Board's decision to grant a "blanket" variance covering most of the lots at Williams Estates. As Williams correctly points out, a trailer park is not analogous to a subdivision. Williams Estates is a single piece of property, for which a single variance has been granted. Assuming, arguendo, "special circumstances" and "practical showing of that difficulties" has been made, those difficulties could be alleviated only by granting a broad variance covering some substantial portion It should be obvious that Williams can neither control nor predict where future vacancies may occur. alternative to the variance granted here would effectively require that Williams petition for a separate variance on each individual lot. We think that result to be both unnecessary and unreasonable.

Appellants also contend that the grant of a "blanket" variance is invalid because it crosses the boundary between "adjudication" and "legislation." We disagree. An ordinance authorizing variances presumes that they will be the exception, and that only a fraction of a particular zoning district will qualify. See 3 ROBERT M. ANDERSON, AMERICAN LAW OF ZONING § 20.74, at 604-07 (3d ed. 1986) (discussing variance requests with regard to large tracts of land). Although the record does not state the number of parks now operating in the county, there was testimony concerning two others. Assuming that special circumstances could be shown, we think it fair to conclude that the twenty-foot separation between trailers would remain the exception rather than the rule.

Appellants stand on firmer ground when they contend that the Board's opinion failed to contain the necessary factual findings. In Baltimore County, an order granting a variance "shall contain a finding of fact setting forth and specifying the reason or reasons for making such variance." B.C.Z.R. § 307.1. In their brief, appellants broadly contend:

A review of the [Board's] opinion and order of July 16, 1993, subsequently amended, establishes that the Board summarized the testimony of the witnesses that it believed key to the Petitioner's case. Appellants submit that the recitation of the witness' testimony cannot be viewed as the statement or findings of fact that are necessary for the Board to explain its decision. . . .

We disagree that the Board's opinion is devoid of factual findings. Where testimony containing statements of fact is quoted or paraphrased with approval, and is not contradicted by other statements in the Board's opinion, we think it fair to count those statements among the facts found by the Board. See Gray v. Anne Arundel County, 73 Md. App. 301, 313-14 (1987) (reference to summary of testimony may suffice as statement of factual findings).

For example, the Board's opinion states:

The property owner of the drive-in theater across Eastern Avenue, Edward Vogle, stated that Williams Estates has caused major flooding to his property. This flooding has shut down the drive-in theater on several occasions, and caused major property damage to the site.

The opinion does not discuss conflicting evidence. Although we would prefer that the Board label its findings more clearly, we think it obvious that the facts stated above were found by the Board.

See also Mossberg v. Montgomery County, 329 Md. 494, 507 (1993) (agency's statement of factual findings must be such that parties are appraised of the facts relied upon by the agency and meaningful judicial review is possible).

Nonetheless, appellants are correct when they state that the Board's factual findings are insufficient to support the Board's ultimate conclusion. Section 307.1 of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations sets out four requirements that must be met before a variance can be granted. It must be shown that:

- 1) "special circumstances or conditions exist that are peculiar to the land or structure which is the subject of the variance request";
- 2) "strict compliance with the zoning regulations for Baltimore County would result in practical difficulty or unreasonable hardship";
- 3) the requested variance is "in strict harmony with the spirit and intent" of the zoning regulations; and
- 4) the requested variance may be granted "without injury to the public health, safety, and general welfare."

The Board's conclusion with regard to each of those issues must be supported by detailed factual findings, Ocean Hideaway Condo. v. Boardwalk Plaza, 68 Md. App. 650, 659-60 (1986), and the party seeking a variance bears the burden of showing that each requirement for a variance is satisfied. North v. St. Mary's County, 99 Md. App. 502, 510 (1994); Easter v. Mayor of Baltimore, 195 Md. 395, 400 (1950). As the Court of Appeals explained in Turner v. Hammond, 270 Md. 41, 56 (1973), the Board's opinion must

contain something more than conclusory statements or mere boilerplate resolutions. Accord Ocean Hideaway, 68 Md. App. at 658-59; Pistorio v. Zoning Board, 268 Md. 558, 570 (1983).

The inadequacy of the Board's factual findings with regard to the first two requirements will be explained in greater detail below. With regard to the remaining requirements, the Board's opinion is entirely devoid of the required statement of reasons. The Board does not state that the requested variance is in keeping with the spirit and harmony of the zoning regulations, nor does it state that the variance can be granted without injury to the public health and welfare. At best, those conclusions may only be inferred from the Board's brief summary of the testimony.

The Board found that other Maryland counties permit a twentyfoot separation between trailers, and that new parks are designed
with twenty feet between structures. Relying on testimony by Mr.
Poole, the Board summarily concluded that Williams "need[s] the
requested variances in order to keep the park as updated as
possible and desirable to the public." From the testimony of the
trade official, the Board noted that "[i]f older parks are not
updated, developers may buy up units and turn them into rentals."
Those findings and conclusions, taken together, do not add up to
the findings of fact "setting forth and specifying the reason or
reasons for granting the variance" that are required by B.C.Z.R. §
307.1. Moreover, the Board's opinion does not address the concerns
raised by appellants, including the loss of open space and the
increased danger of fire spreading from one structure to another.

The residents of the park "are entitled to more than the perfunctory disposition" that the Board made of this case. Ocean Hideaway, 68 Md. App. at 659-60.

Williams attempts to supplement the Board's meager and conclusory factual findings with numerous references to the record. The Board's decision must be supported on the facts that were found by the Board and stated in the Board's opinion. Where the Board's factual findings are inadequate, the necessary facts may not be supplied by the parties, and neither we nor the circuit court will glean the record in search of evidence to support the Board's conclusion. As we explained in Ocean Hideaway, 68 Md. App. at 661-662, appellee's attempt to delve into the record for specific facts to support the Board's conclusions only serves to support our holding that the necessary factual findings were not made by the Board. See also United Steelworkers v. Bethlehem Steel, 298 Md. 665, 679 (1984) (holding that a court may not uphold an agency order unless it is sustainable on the agency's factual findings, and for the reasons stated by the agency).

In the interests of sparing a further appeal, however, we may go beyond the Board's factual findings and review the record to determine whether the Board's ultimate conclusions were supported by substantial evidence. See Ocean Hideaway, 68 Md. App. at 662-63. Upon reviewing the record here in the light most favorable to Williams, we conclude that Williams has failed to meet its burden of proof. The record does not contain substantial evidence to support the conclusion that sp cial circumstances existed, or that

practical difficulties would result from strict adherence to the zoning regulations. Accordingly, the judgment of the circuit court is reversed.

## Ш

Under § 307.1 of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations, a finding of special circumstances must be supported by evidence that those circumstances are "peculiar to the land or structure" that is the subject of the variance request. A "peculiar" condition is one that is "uncommon," "unusual," or "distinguished in character THE RANDOM HOUSE DICTIONARY OF THE ENGLISH or nature from others." LANGUAGE (1967). As the Court of Appeals explained in Easter, 195 Md. at 400, the existence of special circumstances must be tested against "other property in the neighborhood." See also North, 99 Md. App. at 514 (property must have "an inherent characteristic not shared by other properties in the area"). In Burns v. Mayor of Baltimore, 251 Md. 554, 559 (1968), the owner of an apartment building complained of financial difficulties brought on by general economic conditions and a greater demand for one-bedroom as opposed to two-bedroom apartments. The Court concluded that:

These are also factors which present problems common to other rental properties in the neighborhood and are not sufficiently peculiar to the appellee's premises as to justify the relaxation of the ordinance. . . .

Compare Frankel v. Mayor of Baltimore, 223 Md. 97, 104 (1960) (irregular shape of lot and relationship of property to neighboring streets and structures were not common to other property in the area).

Although we have said that special circumstances must be tested against other properties in the area or "neighborhood," it would be more accurate to state that special circumstances must be tested against other properties which are subject to the same zoning restrictions. See Ad + Soil, Inc. v. County Comm'rs, 307 The reason should be obvious; if a Md. 307, 339-40 (1986). variance could be granted without such a showing, the exceptions to a particular restriction would ultimately swallow the rule. In the context of this case, we conclude that the existence of special circumstances must be tested against other properties that are subject to the requirements contained in B.C.Z.R. § 414.5. In short, the "neighborhood" here consists of all mobile home parks in Baltimore County. In order to find that "special circumstances" existed, there must be evidence from which the Board could reasonably conclude that conditions at Williams Estates are unusual or uncommon among those parks. As a practical matter, Williams was required to demonstrate that the great majority of the parks in the county can accommodate double-wide homes without the need for a variance.

The Board's opinion is devoid of any reasoning as to how or why special circumstances existed in this case, and the Board made no factual findings that would support that conclusion. In their brief, Williams contends that the special circumstances here consist of limitations created by the park's original design. The necessary practical difficulties arise, they explain, from "the configuration of the park, the placement of the utilities, and the

layout of home sites," none of which can be easily adapted to current market demand for double-wide homes unless the variance is granted.

Although that may be true, there was no evidence to show that those limitations were in any way "uncommon" or "unusual." While there was testimony that the total number of parks in Baltimore County is relatively small, and that no parks were built in the county between 1970 and 1985, there was no testimony concerning present conditions at other parks, with the exception of brief testimony about the other two parks controlled by Williams Management.

We shall carry appellants' argument one step farther. There is not sufficient evidence from which the Board could have concluded that the conditions found at Williams Estates are uncommon among the three parks managed by Williams, much less among other parks in the county. According to Mr. Poole, Williams manages a park called Oakdale that was built in the 1940's and 1950's, when a "trailer" was genuinely a trailer and could be towed behind the family car. Poole testified that Oakdale was originally designed to accommodate trailers approximately eight-feet wide and twenty to twenty-five feet in length. We find nothing in the record concerning current conditions at Oakdale, and certainly no testimony that Oakdale could accept a double-wide home without the type of variance requested here.

### IV

williams has also failed to meet its burden of proof with regard to the practical difficulties requirement. An applicant seeking a variance from area restrictions in Baltimore County must show that "strict compliance with the zoning regulations for Baltimore County would result in practical difficulty or unreasonable hardship. . . . B.C.Z.R. § 307.1. Courts have interpreted the "practical difficulty or unreasonable hardship" language to be disjunctive, and a showing of practical difficulty alone will be sufficient. Red Roof Inns v. People's Counsel, 96 Md. App. 219, 224-45 (1993); Loyola S&L Ass'n v. Buschman, 227 Md. 243, 250-51 (1961). Although the "practical difficulty" requirement may be satisfied by a lower standard of proof than "unreasonable hardship," Red Roof Inns, 96 Md. App. at 224-25, the precise limits of the rule have not been well-delineated.

A ruling by the Court of Appeals in Carney v. City of Baltimore, 201 Md. 130 (1952) provides a useful starting point. The issue in Carney was a special exception from certain setback r quirements. The relevant ordinance provided that the exception could not be granted unless "there are practical difficulties or unreasonable hardships." Carney, 201 Md. at 136. The Court of Appeals concluded:

The need sufficient to justify an exception must be substantial and urgent and not merely for the convenience of the applicant, inasmuch as the aim of the ordinance is to prevent exceptions as far as possible, and a liberal construction allowing exceptions for reasons that are not substantial and urgent would have

the tendency to cause discrimination and eventually destroy the usefulness of the ordinance.

Id. at 137. Accord Pem Constr. Co. v. Mayor of Baltimore, 233 Md. 372, 377 (1964). See also McLean v. Soley, 270 Md. 208, 212-13 (quoting Carney with approval). In McLean, the Court of Appeals adopted additional criteria for determining whether practical difficulty would result from strict compliance with the zoning ordinance. The applicant must also establish, inter alia, that strict compliance "would unreasonably prevent the owner from using the property for a permitted purpose or would render conformity with such restrictions unnecessarily burdensome." McLean, 270 Md. at 214. When McLean and Carney are read together, it is clear that the party seeking a variance must show that conformity with the ordinance would impose a burden that is both substantial and unnecessary. A burden that is unnecessary but insubstantial is merely an inconvenience and will not justify a variance.

Under proper circumstances a financial burden may satisfy the practical difficulty requirement. See, e.g., Loyola S&L Ass'n, 227 Md. at 250 (subterranean water conditions required construction of narrow building on front half of site, and variance was necessary to construct a building sufficiently large to be economical); Red Roof Inns, 96 Md. App. at 226-27 (showing of competitive disadvantage may constitute practical difficulty). But see Salisbury Bd. of Zoning Appeals v. Bounds, 240 Md. 547, 555 (1965) (a lower return on investment does not constitute "unwarranted hardship and injustice"). The financial burden must nonetheless be

significant or substantial. McLean, 270 Md. at 212-13. The facts of McLean illustrate the minimum showing that will satisfy the practical difficulty requirement. There, the petitioner presented evidence that strict compliance with the zoning ordinance would result in the destruction of trees, and that preservation of existing trees had greatly contributed to full occupancy of a neighboring apartment building over a six-year period. There was also considerable evidence to show the natural beauty of the trees, their importance to the ecology, and the public benefit of preserving those trees. The Court of Appeals suggested that it would have reached a different conclusion on those facts, but conceded that the issue was "fairly debatable." Id. at 215-16.

Our conclusion that practical difficulties must be supported by a showing of some substantial burden is consistent with the decisions of other states, including those of New York, where the practical difficulty rule originated. See 3 ANDERSON \$ 20.50, at 527-31. The New York courts, for example, have generally held that a financial burden or loss does not constitute practical difficulties unless the loss is "significant" or "substantial." See, e.g., Orchard Michael, Inc. v. Falcon, 481 N.Y.S.2d 906, 907 (N.Y. App. Div.), aff'd, 484 N.E.2d 127 (N.Y. 1985) (holding that the goal of making a supermarket "more profitable and competitive" does not constitute the "significant economic injury" necessary to justify an area variance).

As the Court of Appeals stress d in McLean, it is not our task to substitute our judgment for that of the Board. 270 Md. at 215-

The zoning ordinance requires a showing that practical 16. difficulties "would result" from strict compliance. B.C.Z.R. § 307.1 (emphasis added). In reviewing the Board's opinion, we observe that the Board's analysis of the issue is cursory at best. Citing testimony by Mr. Poole, the Board notes that Williams needs the requested variance "to keep the park as updated as possible and desirable to the public. Relying on the testimony of the trade official, the Board further notes that "older parks must be updated in order to survive, " and that where older parks are not updated, "developers may buy up units and turn them into rentals." After quoting the full three-part test from McLean, the Board summarily concludes that Williams has met the burden of proof. We disagree. The Board's conclusory summary of assertions by three or four witnesses does not constitute the factual findings necessary to support the Board's conclusion. Moreover, McLean and Carn y require that the party seeking a variance show some substantial burden or injury. The language of the ordinance requires that the injury must flow, with a fair degree of probability, from compliance with the zoning regulations. The evidence presented by Williams falls short of meeting those requirements.

Although the trade official may choose not to live in a park containing older rental units, that is merely his preference. The record is devoid of evidence to show that conversion of home sites from home ownership to rentals would be unprofitable or burdensome. The desire to keep the park updated and attractive is likewise merely a preference; it cannot support the requested variance

without a showing that the inability to do so would also result in some significant injury or competitive disadvantage to the property owner requesting the variance. The record contains no specific facts from which the Board could make such a finding.

Our conclusion is guided, in part, by Mayor of Baltimore v. Borinsky, 239 Md. 611 (1965). In that case, Sarah Borinsky sought approval to build an office and warehouse building on property located in a residential use district. In support of her petition, Borinsky offered the testimony of two experts. One, a registered architect, testified that the site was not feasible for residential construction due to the shape and depth of the lot. The other, a developer and real estate expert, testified that it would be economically unsound and unwise to build houses on it; in his words, the use of the land for residential purposes would be "economic suicide." 239 Md. at 619. In reversing the lower court's conclusion that an unconstitutional taking had occurred, the Court of Appeals declared that "even emphatic opinion testimony does not take the place of the necessary factual support." 239 Md. The Court noted that there was no specific evidence regarding the cost or marketability of the five row houses which could be constructed on the property, and concluded that Borinsky had failed to meet her burden of proof.

The same may be said for the evidence presented in this case. Expert opinion that outdated mobile home parks, in general, may cease to be a "viable" business at some unspecified date in the future does not constitute the factual support necessary to show

that a substantial burden "would result" if the variance is not granted. Compare McLean, 270 Md. at 210-11 (development of the lot without the variance would require the destruction of trees). survival of Williams Estates will depend on whether the park remains competitive in relation to other parks in the same geographic market. By Mr. Poole's own testimony, Williams Estates may have as many as 366 sites which will accommodate a double-wide home without the requested variance. Of the five vacant sites at Williams, two will accommodate a double-wide home. There was no evidence that any resident of Williams Estates has ever left the park because the site they already occupied could not accommodate a double-wide home, or that any prospective resident has been turned away for want of such a site. There was also no evidence that any vacancy at Williams Estates has ever been filled with a home inferior in quality and appearance to the home that previously occupied the lot.

We have already noted that Williams presented no evidence concerning conditions which may exist at other parks in the area. With regard to the issue of practical difficulty, there is no evidence that denial of the variance would place Williams at a competitive disadvantage in relation to other parks. There is no evidence, for example, regarding the total number of double-wide sites at other parks, or the total number of sites which may be

We calculate that number as follows: 170 sites for which a variance was previously granted, plus 50% of the remaining 393 sites. The number may be lower if some of those sites are located in the Critical Area.

Md. App. at 226 (motel seeking sign variance presented evidence that neighboring competitors enjoyed significantly higher and larger rooftop signs, and that Red Roof was ineligible for a State-sponsored highway sign program which benefitted competing motels). Williams contends that the variance is necessary to compete with parks in neighboring counties, where a twenty-foot separation between homes is permitted. That conclusion is also unsupported by the record. Whether parks in Howard or Harford counties can accommodate a double-wide home will depend on how those parks were designed. A park designed for single-section homes, with a twenty-foot separation between trailers, would have precisely the same problems that currently exist at William Estates.

As in Borinsky, the opinions of Mr. Poole and the expert witnesses regarding the viability of Williams Estates and the consequences of strict compliance with the ordinance are unsupported by specific factual evidence. In the absence of such evidence, the Board's conclusion that practical difficulties "would result" from the denial of the requested variance is arbitrary and unreasonable.

### V

In view of the expert testimony offered by Williams, the Board could have fairly concluded that a separation of twenty-five feet between trailers is unnecessary. That alone will not suffice to justify a variance, and we believe that the advice offered by the

Court of Appeals in Marino v. Mayor of Baltimore, 215 Md. 206 (1957), may be appropriate:

"\* \* \* where a claimed hardship is common to other properties in the area and not one special and peculiar to the specific property, the remedy is by change in the zoning ordinance itself."

Id. at 222-23 (quoting Miller v. Silver, 105 N.Y.S.2d 474 (1951)).

JUDGMENT REVERSED; CASE REMANDED TO THE CIRCUIT COURT FOR REMAND TO THE COUNTY BOARD OF APPEALS WITH DIRECTION THAT THE VARIANCE BE DENIED.

### MEMORANDUM OPINION AND ORDER

This zoning matter originated before the Baltimore County
Deputy Zoning Commissioner on a Petition for Special Hearing and
a Petition for Zoning Variance. Among other relief, the
Petitioners requested a variance from Section 414.5 of the
Baltimore County Zoning Regulations to permit a distance between
housing units of 20' from side to side and 16' from rear to rear
in lieu of the required 25' specified by Section 414.5.
Exempted from the variance request were lots falling within the
Chesapeake Bay critical area. As the case progressed,
Petitioners dropped their request for 16' distances from rear to
rear and ultimately requested variances of 20' in each direction
instead of the required 25'.

The Deputy Zoning Commissioner granted the request for variances in part and denied it in part and an appeal was taken by the Petitioners to the County Board of Appeals (hereinafter CBA) from the order of the Deputy Zoning Commissioner dated November 2, 1992.

After conducting a lengthy hearing in May of 1993, the CBA granted, among other relief, the petition for variances, allowing 20' from side to side and 16' from rear to rear. Their opinion and order were filed on July 16, 1993. On August 11th,

#### OPINION

This case comes before the Board on appeal from a denial by the Deputy Zoning Commissioner of Petitioner's request in part. This Opinion will only be directed to that part of the Petition denied by the Deputy Zoning Commissioner, as that part of the Petition granted below is final.

The Petitioner requests a special hearing to approve an amendment to the special exception granted in prior Case No. 66-185-X, and to amend and add to the variances granted in the prior Case No. 70-184-ASPH and Case No. 84-263-A, in accordance with Petitioner's Exhibit 1. The Petitioner also requests variances from Section 414.5 of the <u>Baltimore County Zoning Regulations</u> (BCZR) to permit a distance between the units of 20 feet in lieu of the required 25 feet for those lots shown on Petitioner's Exhibit 1 as outlined in red.

William T. Poole, Jr., President of Williams Estates, Petitioner, testified as to the history of the park. His firm had checked other jurisdictions in order to find out if there were sites in those jurisdictions who had the requested site sizes. He found that several other Maryland counties, especially Howard

County, require only 20 feet between structures. He further testified that there will not be any increase in impervious surfaces. This will be done by reducing the patio and driveway sizes.

The reason Williams Estates Park desires to reduce the structure to structure setback is that newer manufactured homes (hereinafter "MH") are double wide and they need the requested variances in order to keep the park as updated as possible and desirable to the public. Williams Estates does not request this variance to increase profits nor to increase the number of lots.

Tapobrata Charkrobarti, P.E., testified for the Petitioner. He explained to the Board that the design of the stormwater management will not allow additional stormwater to leave the site. He also stated that the soil is clay, and the site would meet the requirements of Section 502.1 of the BCZR.

Donald Westphal testified as an expert witness. He was qualified as a MH park designer. New parks are designed with 20 feet between structures. He testified that Williams Estates park is rated at very near to top as an MH community.

George Gavrelis, former Director of Planning and Zoning for Baltimore County, testified that the park is very attractive except for five vacant lots. Only with the variances can 24-foot manufactured homes be placed on the site. Mr. Gavrelis also testified that in his opinion the site would meet the requirements of Section 502.1 of the BCZR, and that the special exception should be granted.

Andrew Scholy, from the MH Institute, testified that older parks must be updated in order to survive. If older parks are not updated, developers may buy up units and turn them into rentals. Older homes built prior to June 15, 1976, were built to different standards.

There were many protestants at the hearing. Their major concern was the water flow during a storm. Photographs were submitted which show flooded streets during storms. An added concern was the closeness of the manufactured homes which may be dangerous to the park if a fire did occur.

The property owner of the drive-in theater across Eastern Avenue, Edward Vogle, stated that Williams Estates has caused major flooding to his property. This flooding has shut down the drive-in theater on several occasions, and caused major property damage to his site.

A video of the park was shown to the Board. The park was very attractive and showed that the MH owners had invested much money and time in their homes, and the site that they lease. The Board was very interested in the way the downspouts were directed. In order for the Board to find that the special exception for a manufactured home park at this site should be granted, the requirements of Section 502.1 of the BCZR must be met.

In order for the Board to grant a variance, the following criteria for determining practical difficulty or unreasonable hardship, as established by McLean v. Soley, 270 Md. 216, 1973, must be met:

- "1) Whether compliance with the strict letter of the restrictions governing various variances would unreasonably prevent the owner from using the property for a permitted purpose or would render conformity with such restrictions unnecessarily burdensome.
- "2) Whether a grant of the variance applied for would do substantial justice to the applicant as well as to other property owners in the district, or whether a lesser relaxation than that applied for would give substantial relief to the owner of the property involved and be more consistent with justice to other property owners.
- "3) Whether relief can be granted in such fashion that the spirit of the ordinance will be observed and public safety and welfare secured." McLean v. Soley, 270 Md. 216, 1973

The Board, after reviewing all the evidence presented to it, finds that the Petitioner has met the burden of proof, and therefore the Board will issue an Order granting Petitioner's request with restrictions.

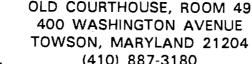

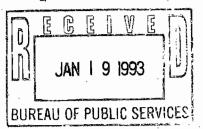

#### FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

This matter comes before the Deputy Zoning Commissioner as a Petition for Special Hearing and a Petition for Zoning Variance filed by the Legal Owners of the subject property, Williams Estates, by Williams Management Services, Inc., General Partners, by and through their attorney, Robert A. Hoffman, Esquire. The Petitioners request a special hearing to approve an amendment to the special exception granted in prior Case No. 66-185-X, and to amend and add to the variances granted in prior Case Nos. 70-184-ASPH and 84-283-A, in accordance with Petitioner's Exhibit 1. The Petitioners also request variance relief from Section 414.5 of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations (B.C.Z.R.) to permit a distance between units of 20 feet from side to side and 16 feet from rear to rear in lieu of the required 25 feet for those lots shown on Sheet 2 of 2, or Page 2 of Petitioner's Exhibit 1.

At the outset of the hearing, it was made clear that the Petitioners are not seeking any variances for lots that fall within the Chesapeake Bay Critical areas. The Petitioners marked on Petitioner's Exhibit 1 those lots which fall within the Critical Areas and have designated a line marked C.A.L. showing the lots which are not part of the variance request.

Appearing on behalf of the Petition were William T. Poole, Jr., President, Williams Management Services, Inc., represented by Robert A.

J

Hoffman, Esquire. Also appearing on behalf of the Petition were Mike Nima with Williams Management Services, Inc., and Charles K. Stark, Registered Land Surveyor. Numerous residents of the subject park and adjacent mobile home parks appeared and testified in opposition to the Petitioners' request.

Testimony and evidence presented indicated that the subject property consists of 86.413 acres, more or less, zoned M.L.-I.M. and is the site of the Williams Estates mobile home park. Portions of the subject property are located within the Chesapeake Bay Critical Areas near Middle River. Said property was the subject of prior case No. 66-185-X in which a special exception for a trailer park was granted. The Petitioners filed the instant Petition in an effort to provide their residents the opportunity to place larger manufactured homes on their particular lot. presented by William T. Poole, Jr. indicated that the manufactured home industry has changed since the development of Williams Estates in 1966. Testimony indicated that homes have increased in width and that the industry now offers double-wide homes in lieu of the single-wide home offered in the 1960s. Since Williams Estates was laid out in the 1960s, the Petitioners were not able to take into account the advent of double-wide manufactured homes. Testimony indicated that the existing lots are not of sufficient size to accommodate the newer, wider manufactured homes. cordingly, the Petitioner has requested variances for all lots in the subdivision, excluding those located within the Chesapeake Bay Critical Areas, in order to afford their residents the opportunity to locate a larger manufactured home on their particular lot if they so desire. Testimony indicated that the subject trailer park is one of the nicest manufactured housing developments in Baltimore County and that the park is well-maintained and beautifully landscaped.

As previously stated, this park came into existence by virtue of the special exception granted in 1966. Since that time, the Petitioners petitioned the Office of Zoning on two other occasions. In 1970, in Case No. 70-184-ASPH, the Petitioners were granted a variance which permitted mobile homes to be located as close as 8 feet to the existing Penn Central Railroad right-of-way line in lieu of the required minimum 75 feet. That variance was granted by the then Zoning Commissioner, Edward D. Hardesty, and allowed for the placement of 20 additional manufactured homes along the Penn Central Railroad right-of-way line. Also in Case No. 70-184-ASPH, the Petitioners requested a variance to permit mobile homes to be situated 25 feet from the street right-of-way of Bengies Road in lieu of the required 100-foot setback. Commissioner Hardesty also granted that variance which allowed the Petitioners to situate an additional 19 manufactured homes along Bengies Road. By virtue of the variances being granted in 1970, the Petitioner was permitted to place an additional 39 mobile homes on the subject site.

In 1984, the Petitioners expanded Williams Estates to that which exists today. In the course of the expansion of the park, the Petitioners requested a variance in Case No 84-283-A, to permit mobile homes to be located 60 feet from the street right-of-way of Bengies Road in lieu of 100 feet. That variance was granted and the Petitioner was able to situate 5 additional trailers within that setback area. The Petitioners also requested a variance to permit mobile homes to be situated 60 feet from the Penn Central Railroad right-of-way line in lieu of the required 75-foot setback. That variance was granted and it allowed the Petitioners to

locate an additional 8 manufactured homes along that right-of-way line. It should be made clear that in the instant Petition for Zoning Variance, the Petitioners are not requesting to add any additional mobile homes to the subject site. The Petitioners only seek relief which will permit the placement of larger manufactured homes on those lots currently existing in the park.

As previously stated, many residents of the community appeared in opposition to the Petitioners' request. They voiced opposition to the granting of this variance because of the loss of useable space outside of their mobile homes. They testified that larger homes on the same size lots would significantly reduce the amount of open space that their children currently enjoy and upon which they recreate. In addition to the testimony presented at the hearing, many residents of the area mailed petitions and letters to this Office voicing their opposition to the Petitioners' request. Of particular interest to this Deputy Zoning Commissioner was a photograph taken by George and Bernice McAllister, who reside on Dahlia Lane, which depicts the appearance of the park after a thunderstorm The photograph, a copy of which is attached hereto, in September 1990. shows a street right-of-way completely flooded with approximately 2 feet of standing water covering the entire area. It is obvious from viewing this photograph that there currently exists a storm water runoff problem this community. It is clear that allowing larger manufactured homes to be placed on every lot that exists in this mobile home park would 'substantially reduce the permeable surface contained therein and would only contribute to an already existing storm water problem. I believe that granting all of the variances requested would not be in the best interests of the public health, safety or general welfare of this mobile home community.

However, there are certain lots within Williams Estates where I believe the variance being requested would be appropriate. Specifically, those lots which were added in 1984 that are somewhat larger than the lots in the original Williams Estates park. Also there exists a drainage easement that separates the lots added in 1984 from the older section which currently experiences the water runoff problems. Therefore, it appears that any storm water runoff that might be created by a larger manufactured home being placed on the lots added in 1984 would be diverted into the drainage ditch and would not run into the older section of the park that currently has these problems. Also, many of the lots added in 1984 are larger and do not back up to other lots. Therefore, I find that the spacing of these lots in this particular section could accommodate a larger manufactured home without any detriment to the surrounding community and would not exacerbate the runoff problem in the older section of the park. The lots about which I am speaking are Lots 100 through 108, and Lots 110, 112, 114, 116, 118, 120, 122, 124, 126, 128, 130, 132, 134, 136, 138, 140 and 142 on Roundup Road; Lots 100 through 103, 105, 107, 109, 111, 113, 115 and 117 and Lots 119 through 130, 132 and 134 on Lariat Road; Lots 101 through 119 and Lots 121, 127, 129, 131, 133, 135 and 137, and Lots 139 through Lot 152 and Lot 154 on Cowhide Circle; Lots 101 through 113 and Lots 115, 117, 119, 121, 123, 125, 127 and 129, and Lots 130 through Lot 141, and Lots 143 and 145 on Rodeo Circle/Rodeo Drive.

It should be noted that the Office of Planning and Zoning recommended approval of the variances for all lots contained within this park.

However, for the reasons previously stated, variances shall only be granted for those lots specifically identified above.

An area variance may be granted where strict application of the zoning regulations would cause practical difficulty to the Petitioner and his property. McLean v. Soley, 270 Md. 208 (1973). To prove practical difficulty for an area variance, the Petitioner must meet the following:

- 1) whether strict compliance with requirement would unreasonably prevent the use of the property for a permitted purpose or render conformance unnecessarily burdensome;
- 2) whether the grant would do substantial injustice to applicant as well as other property owners in the district or whether a lesser relaxation than that applied for would give substantial relief; and
- 3) whether relief can be granted in such fashion that the spirit of the ordinance will be observed and public safety and welfare secured.

Anderson v. Bd. of Appeals, Town of Chesapeake Beach, 22 Md. App. 28 (1974).

It is clear from the testimony that if the variances are granted, as modified herein, such use as proposed, will not be contrary to the spirit of the B.C.Z.R. and will not result in any injury to the public good.

After due consideration of the testimony and evidence presented, it is clear that practical difficulty or unreasonable hardship will result if the variances, as modified herein, are not granted. I find that since there exists a drainage and utility easement between the section added in 1984 and the original section of Williams Estates which has a storm water runoff problem that the variances granted for the newer section would not contribute to that problem. It has been established that special circumstances or conditions exist that are peculiar to the land or structure which is the subject of this variance request and that the requirements from which the Petitioner seeks relief will unduly restrict the use of the

Dete By land due to the special conditions unique to this particular parcel. In addition, the variances requested will not cause any injury to the public health, safety or general welfare. Further, the granting of the Petitioner's request is in strict harmony with the spirit and intent of the B.C.Z.R.

Pursuant to the advertisement, posting of the property, and public hearing on these Petitions held, and for the reasons given above, the special hearing and variances requested should be granted.

THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED by the Deputy Zoning Commissioner for Baltimore County this day of November, 1992 that the Petition for Special Hearing to approve an amendment to the special exception granted in prior Case No. 66-185-X, and to amend and add to the variances granted in prior Case Nos. 70-184-ASPH and 84-283-A, in accordance with the revised site plan to be submitted, be and is hereby GRANTED; and,

requesting relief from Section 414.5 of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations (B.C.Z.R.) to permit a distance between units of 20 feet from side to side and 16 feet from rear to rear in lieu of the required 25 feet, be and is hereby GRANTED for the following lots: Lots 100 through 108, and Lots 110, 112, 114, 116, 118, 120, 122, 124, 126, 128, 130, 132, 134, 136, 138, 140 and 142 on Roundup Road; Lots 100 through 103, 105, 107, 109, 111, 113, 115 and 117 and Lots 119 through 130, 132 and 134 on Lariat Road; Lots 101 through 119 and Lots 121, 127, 129, 131, 133, 135 and 137, and Lots 139 through Lot 152 and Lot 154 on Cowhide Circle; Lots 101 through 113 and Lots 115, 117, 119, 121, 123, 125, 127 and 129, and Lots 130 through Lot 141, and Lots 143 and 145 on Rodeo Circle/Rodeo Drive, in

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accordance with the revised site plan to be submitted, subject to the following restrictions:

- 1) The Petitioners are hereby made aware that proceeding at this time is at their own risk until such time as the 30-day appellate process from this Order has expired. If, for whatever reason, this Order is reversed, the Petitioners would be required to return, and be responsible for returning, said property to its original condition.
- 2) Within sixty (60) days of the date of this Order, Petitioners shall submit a revised site plan which clearly depicts those lots for which variances have been granted pursuant to this Order.
- 3) Above-grade building extensions such as decks, sunporches, etc., shall not be located closer than 10 feet to another principal structure or deck, sunporch, etc.
- 4) Parking shall only be provided in the front yard. Any existing parking pads extending past the front yard shall be removed unless covered with a patio, deck or sunporch.
- 5) Accessory structures, such as storage sheds, should not be provided at the rear of dwelling units which are separated by less than 25 feet.
- 6) Prior to the placement of a manufactured home on a lot which is less than 25 feet from another building, the Petitioner shall provide a site plan to the Office of Planning and Zoning for review and approval signature. The plan should show: 1) the proposed location of the home, and 2) the location of principal and accessory structures immediately surrounding the proposed home.
- 7) A tot lot addressing the needs of small children living in the development shall be provided at the Community Center.
- 8) When applying for any permits, the site plan and/ or landscaping plan filed must reference this case and set forth and address the restrictions of this Order.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that there shall be no variances granted for any of those lots which fall within the Chesapeake Bay Critical Areas

The modular home construction industry essentially prefabricats the homes at a plant, which are then conveyed to the site and then pieced together.

The modular homes are quite sizeable containing up to 1,200 square feet of living space. In addition, the homes have architectural details such as pitched roofs, porches, bay windows, etc. The newer manufactured homes present a much better image than the older mobile homes.

The variances requested regarding the side yard setbacks are in conformance with the new CMDP regarding building setbacks (Attachment C). The BCZR and CMDP allow distances between buildings of 20 feet for single-family detached dwellings, DR 5.5, 10.5 or 16 zones. The petitioner's request is in conformance with these regulations.

The rear yard variances differ significantly from what is required for single-family detached homes in the DR 5.5, 10.5 or 16 zones. A 30 foot rear yard is required. Staff believes that adequate rear yards should be provided, however, the nature of the manufactured housing industry as well as the layout for the Williams Estates does provide adequate building separation and adequate rear yard space for the provision of storage sheds. The restrictions on the development also regulate exterior maintenance. The entire resubdivision of this development to accommodate these upgraded units would not be appropriate.

Based upon the analysis conducted and information provided staff recommends <a href="#APPROVAL">APPROVAL</a> of the petitioner's request.

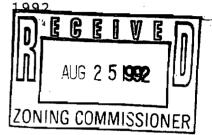

Based upon the site visit conducted August 24, 1992 and the testimony received at the hearing, staff provides additional conditions which should be placed on the property if this request is granted.

- Above grade building extensions such as decks, sun porches etc. should not be located closer than 10 feet to another principal structure or deck, sunporch, etc.
- 2. Parking shall only be provided in the front yard. Any existing parking pads extending past the front yard shall be removed unless covered with a patio, deck or sunporch.
- 3. Accessory structures such as storage sheds should not be provided at the rear of dwellings which are separated by less than 25 feet.
- 4. Prior to the placement of a manufactured home on a lot, which is less than 25 feet from another building the petitioner shall provide a site plan to the Office of Planning and Zoning for review and signature. The plan should show 1) the proposed location of the home, and 2) the location of principal and accessory structures immediately surrounding the proposed home.
- 5. A tot lot addressing the needs of small children living in the development should be provided at the Community Center.

#### 1987 Edition

This edition of NFPA 501A, Standard for Firesafety Criteria for Manufactured Home Installations, Sites, and Communities, was prepared by the Technical Committee on Firesafety for Manufactured Homes, and acted on by the National Fire Protection Association, Inc. at its Annual Meeting held May 18-21, 1987 in Cincinnati, Ohio. It was issued by the Standards Council on June 10, 1987, with an effective date of June 30, 1987, and supersedes all previous editions.

The 1987 edition of this standard has been approved by the American National Standards Institute.

#### Origin and Development of NFPA 501A

NFPA activity in this general area commenced in 1937 when NFPA organized its first Committee on Trailers and Trailer Courts. The first standard covering Trailer Coach Camps appeared in 1939, with revisions in 1940, 1952, 1960, and 1964. A completely new edition was adopted in 1971, and this text was revised in 1972, 1973, 1974, 1975, 1977, and 1982.

The American National Standards Institute (ANSI) approved the 1972 NFPA edition on May 8, 1973; the 1973 NFPA edition on December 28, 1973; the 1974 NFPA edition on January 30, 1975; the 1975 NFPA edition on February 27, 1976; and the 1977 NFPA edition on October 18, 1977.

The 1982 edition on Standard for Firesafety Criteria for Mobile Home Installations, Sites and Communities superseded the 1977 edition and was adopted by NFPA at its Annual Meeting held in San Francisco on May 19, 1982.

The 1982 edition was produced by the newly formed Committee for Firesafety for Mobile Homes (June 20, 1979) charged with the responsibility of developing documents for firesafety criteria for single-family mobile homes including the installation, sites, and communities, and the maintenance of and improvements for existing mobile homes. Therefore, that edition excluded all sections of previous editions not considered within the Committee scope. Notably excluded were stabilizing and anchoring systems; requirements for piers and footings; and plumbing, including sewage disposal systems. Requirements for park electrical systems were addressed by reference to the National Electrical Code®.

Modifications were also made in sections dealing with fuel supply, air conditioning and life and firesafety.

This 1987 edition includes major revisions to the standard in an attempt to better coordinate the NFPA chapters in a joint publication with NCSBCS, ANSI A225.1/NFPA 501A. Major changes include substituting "manufactured home" for "mobile home" throughout, deleting Chapter 3, "Air Conditioning," and expanding Chapter 2, "Fuel Supply," and combining three appendixes into two.

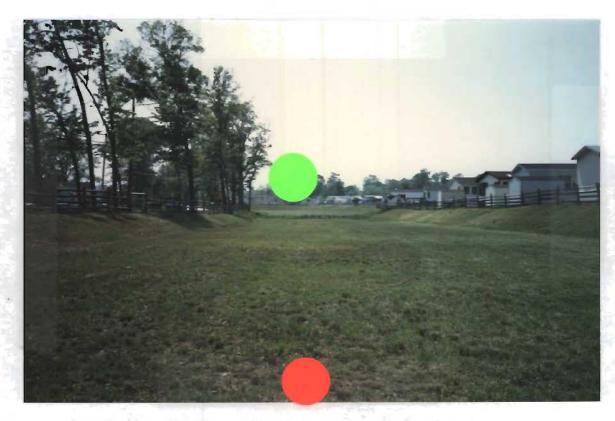

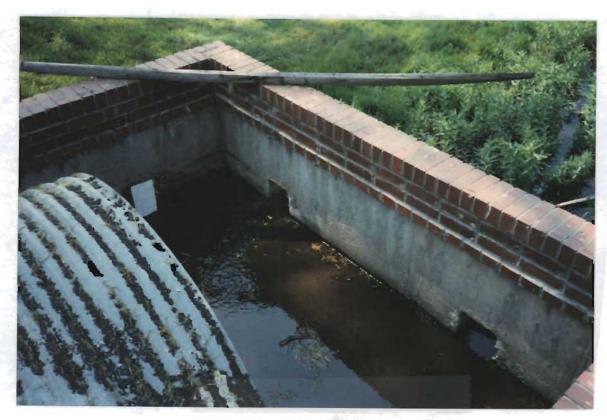

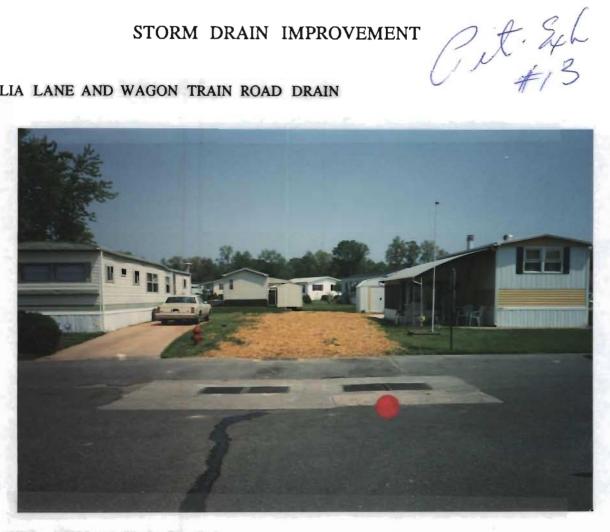

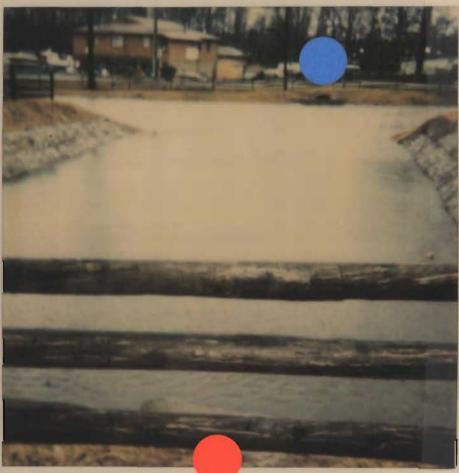


March storm soaks state

Dear Ms. Miller:

At the recent (July 14, 1992) meeting at Chase Elementary School, several inquiries, concerns and complaints were voiced by the citizens. In an effort to keep the lines of communication open, I hope you will forward this response to your neighbors.

Water Drainage - Sanitarians of the Eastern Regional Community Services Division have made several inspections over the last several weeks.

Generalized drainage problems have not been detected. However, they will continue to monitor the situation particularly after heavy rain events. As indicated, the stormwater management facilities and storm drain system within the park are private utilities. The park owner is responsible for all repair and maintenance to this system. However, my offer to provide some review and suggestions by County engineers to the Citizen Committee is still available.

The question of individual or specific lot drainage problems would have to be rectified by park management. The County uses a rough criteria of standing water for 24 hours to qualify as a drainage problem on a lot.

- 2. Oil Tanks The State of Maryland (Maryland Department of the Environment) regulates certain underground fuel tanks. The normal residential (275 gallon) tanks are not under these regulations. The removal of the underground tanks and replacement above ground is not a mandated requirement. Payment for this activity would be strictly between the landlord and the tenant.
- 3. Noise Construction noise within the park would be regulated according to the Maryland State Noise Regulations. Between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m., the maximum limit is 90 decibels. A 55-decibel limit is in force, unless an emergency situation occurs, during the remainder of the night and early morning hours.

4. Oil in Driveway - A report of an oil-soaked driveway from a previous tenant was reported. DEPRM personnel will continue to evaluate this situation at 102 Cowhide Circle.

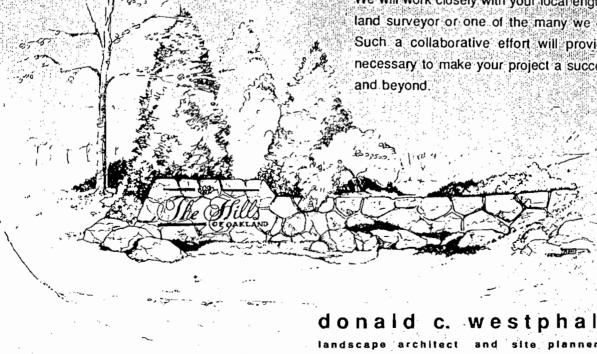

### SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATIONS:

The petitioner has requested blanket variances to allow building to building setbacks of 20 feet, and 16 foot setbacks from the rear of those units backing onto Eastern Ave., and the eastern track boundary as well as the rears of other units.

The Williams Estates is one of Baltimore County's largest and best managed manufactured home developments. The quality of the development is excellent with the vast majority of the units being well maintained and landscaped. The original development was approved in 1966 with the vast bulk of the units being 12 or 14 feet wide and 60 to 80 feet in length. The industry at that time was manufacturing units which were conveyed to the site via the use of axle and wheel assemblies (Attachment A). The manufactured home industry has changed radically since that time with the advent of modular home construction (Attachment B).

The modular home construction industry essentially prefabricats the homes at a plant, which are then conveyed to the site and then pieced together.

The modular homes are quite sizeable containing up to 1,200 square feet of living space. In addition, the homes have architectural details such as pitched roofs, porches, bay windows, etc. The newer manufactured homes present a much better image than the older mobile homes.

The variances requested regarding the side yard setbacks are in conformance with the new CMDP regarding building setbacks (Attachment C). The BCZR and CMDP allow distances between buildings of 20 feet for single-family detached dwellings DR 5.5, 10.5 or 16 zones. The petitioner's request is in conformance with these regulations.

The rear yard variances differ significantly from what is required for single-family detached homes in the DR 5.5, 10.5 or 16 zones. A 30 foot rear yard is required. Staff believes that adequate rear yards should be provided, however, the nature of the manufactured housing industry as well as the layout for the Williams Estates does provide adequate building separation and adequate rear yard space for the provision of storage sheds. The restrictions on the development also regulate exterior maintenance. The entire resubdivision of this development to accommodate these upgraded units would not be appropriate.

Based upon the analysis conducted and information provided staff recommends **APPROVAL** of the petitioner's request.

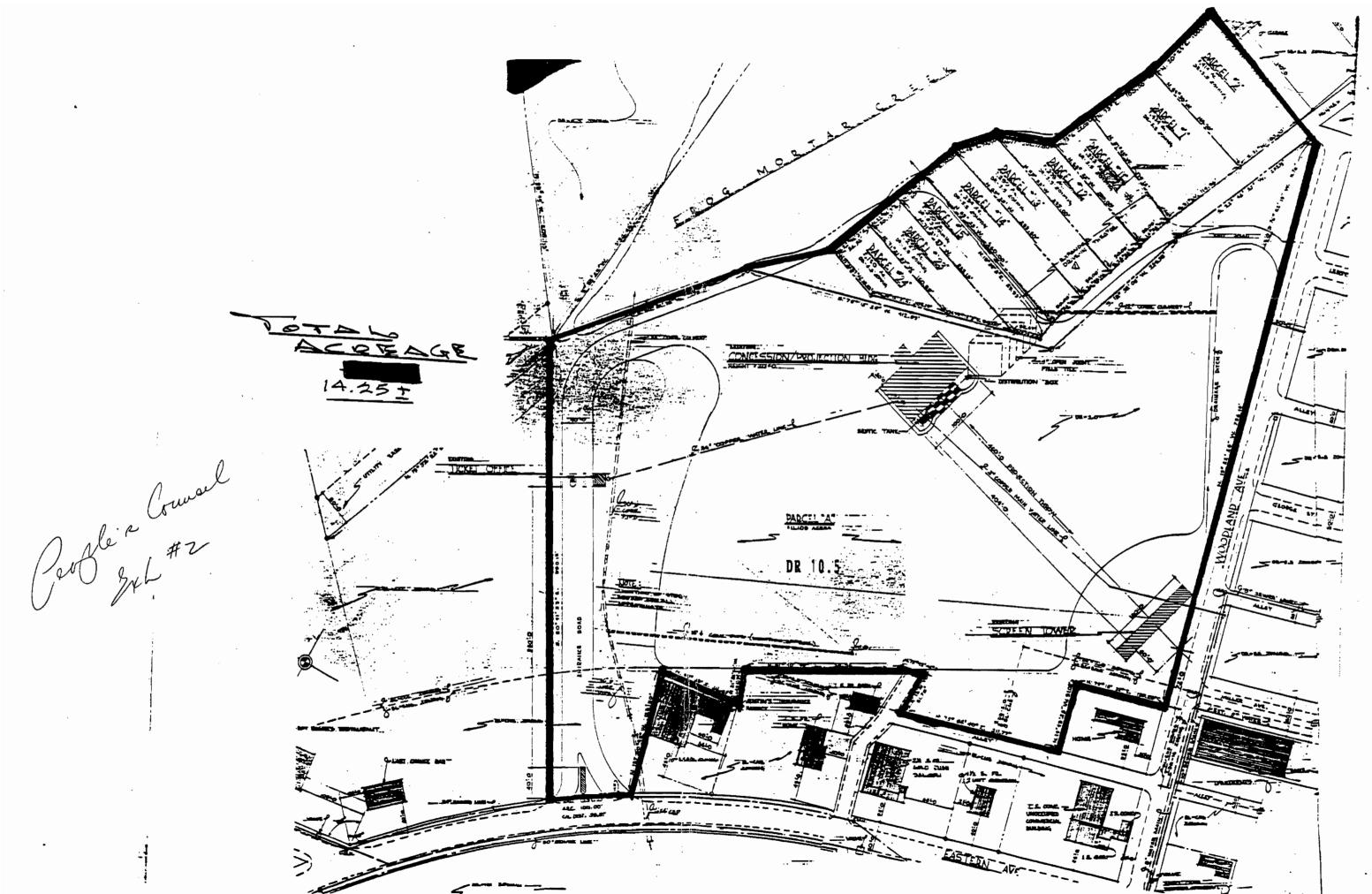

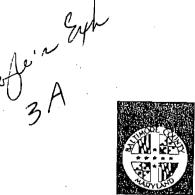

I would like to apprise you of the results of the joint office and field reviews conducted by this Department and the Department of Public Works.

Review of construction drawings and past aerial photographs confirm that the roads and trailer pads for the majority of Williams Estates (aka Bengies Trailer Village), which drains under Eastern Boulevard and through the Drive-In, was constructed in 1972. This portion of the development consisted of approximately 208 concrete trailer pads (10'x50') and 6,400 linear feet of roads. The 72"x44," culvert under Eastern Boulevard was also constructed at that time and the constructions plans show the culvert discharging into an existing ditch. No storm water management was required since the first regulations were not enacted until 1974.

In 1985, another 30 trailer pads and 780 linear feet of road were added to portion of the trailer park draining through the theater. Storm water management regulation required analysis of the peak storm flows through the 72"x44" culvert with and without the 30 unit addition. This analysis demonstrated that overall peak flows through the culvert were less without storm water management for the addition. This is due to the fact that the original trailer park produced approximately 90% of the total flow and providing management for the addition only would detain runoff such that the maximum flows for both areas would reach the culvert at the same time. Although this may be somewhat confusing, the end result is that storm water management for the addition would not have reduced peak flows through the culvert.

In an attempt to document an on-going flooding problem, Public Works has researched its complaint files and found that your client's. complaint of June 5, 1989 was the County's first notification of the problem. Given the history outlined above, we do not have the authority to require the upstream property owner to either construct improvements on your client's property or retrofit storm water management on his property.

Neither this Department nor Public Works has Capital Improvement funds available to construct a drainage system through the Drive-In property. Furthermore, it is Public Works' policy that Capital Improvement funds not be used to improve a single commercial property. I regret that there is nothing further that we can do at this time.

At the request of Mr. Vogel, Mr. William Jenkins and Mr. Clay Troy of my staff met with him on the site on February 25, 1991. Their observations, along with Mr. Vogel's statements and photographs make it clear that a stormwater problem exists at the drive-in.

As you know, my office has no enforcement authority in this case. Nevertheless, this appears to be a serious problem. Any assistance that Baltimore County can offer will be greatly appreciated. Additionally, Maryland Department of the Environment stormwater retrofit funds may be available to assist Baltimore County in correcting this problem. Dear Mr. Vogel:

First of all, I want you to know that I have recently been appointed Department Director and, as such, am following up your March 25 letter to Donald Outen.

In reviewing the project file and discussing the situation with my staff, there is no question that a severe drainage problem exists on your property which affects your entrance drive, ticket building and viewing area. However, as was explained in the letter of November 23, 1990, the changes in runoff from the Williams property began in 1972 with construction of 208 trailer units along with roads and a 72" x 44" culvert under Eastern Boulevard which drains onto your property. You stated that, during your association with the Drive-In in the mid and late 1970's, your drainage system was able to handle the increased runoff from the Williams property.

In 1985, another 30 trailer pads and additional roads were constructed adjacent to Eastern Boulevard. As explained earlier, the analysis performed to determine whether storm water management was required determined that there would be no increase in the peak rate of runoff onto your property. This, plus the fact that the County had no record of flooding on your property, was the reason that the Williams addition was permitted to proceed. By the time the Department of Public Works was notified of your problem in June 1989 (see attached information), the Williams addition was virtually complete, with permits and security deposits returned to the developer.

With the time that has elapsed since both the original construction and the addition were completed, we have no way of requiring the developer to correct the damage to the Drive-Ineproperty. As you know, neither this Department nor Public Works has funds available to rebuild your drainage

system. I can make staff available to advise you on a possible solution to your problem, but I regret that this Department can go no further than this assistance.

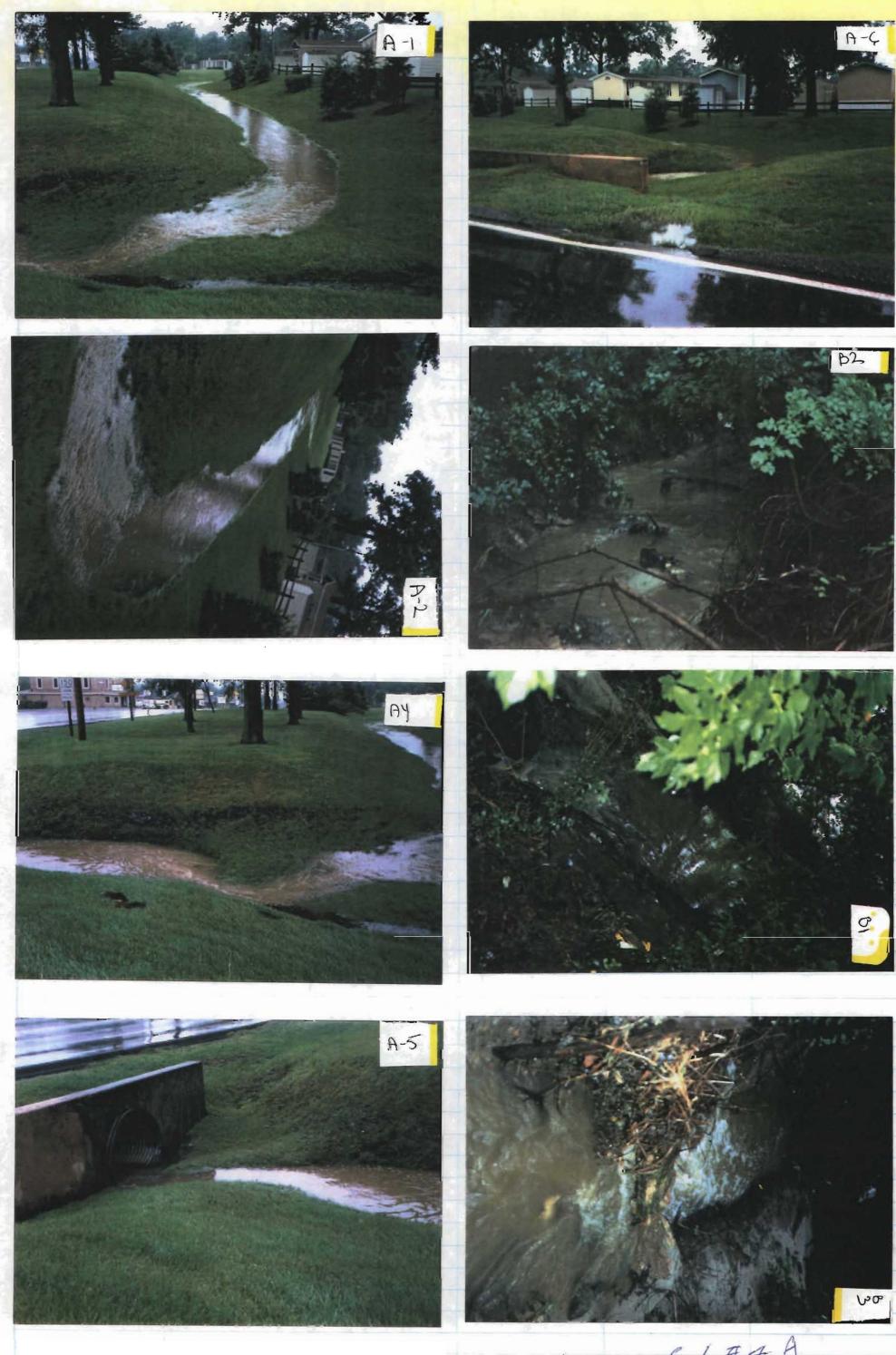

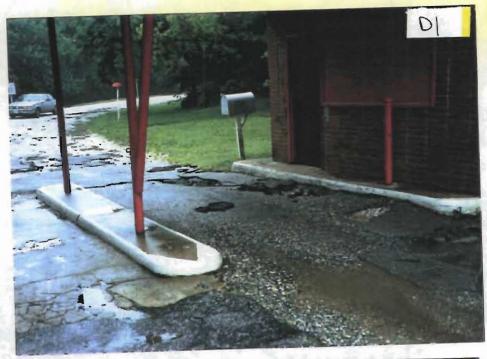

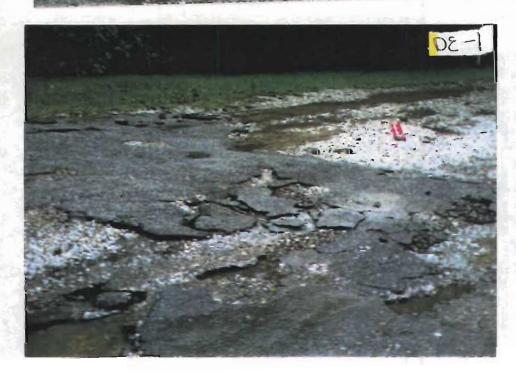

# FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

This matter comes before the Deputy Zoning Commissioner as a Petition for Special Hearing and a Petition for Zoning Variance filed by the Legal Owners of the subject property, Williams Estates, by Williams Management Services, Inc., General Partners, by and through their attorney, Robert A. Hoffman, Esquire. The Petitioners request a special hearing to approve an amendment to the special exception granted in prior Case No. 66-185-X, and to amend and add to the variances granted in prior Case Nos. 70-184-ASPH and 84-283-A, in accordance with Petitioner's Exhibit 1. The Petitioners also request variance relief from Section 414.5 of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations (B.C.Z.R.) to permit a distance between units of 20 feet from side to side and 16 feet from rear to rear in lieu of the required 25 feet for those lots shown on Sheet 2 of 2, or Page 2 of Petitioner's Exhibit 1.

At the outset of the hearing, it was made clear that the Petitioners are not seeking any variances for lots that fall within the Chesapeake Bay Critical areas. The Petitioners marked on Petitioner's Exhibit 1 those lots which fall within the Critical Areas and have designated a line marked C.A.L. showing the lots which are not part of the variance request.

Appearing on behalf of the Petition were William T. Poole, Jr., President, Williams Management Services, Inc., represented by Robert A.

Hoffman, Esquire. Also appearing on behalf of the Petition were Mike Nima with Williams Management Services, Inc., and Charles K. Stark, Registered Land Surveyor. Numerous residents of the subject park and adjacent mobile home parks appeared and testified in opposition to the Petitioners' re-

Testimony and evidence presented indicated that the subject property consists of 86.413 acres, more or less, zoned M.L.-I.M. and is the site of the Williams Estates mobile home park. Portions of the subject property are located within the Chesapeake Bay Critical Areas near Middle River. Said property was the subject of prior case No. 66-185-X in which a special exception for a trailer park was granted. The Petitioners filed the instant Petition in an effort to provide their residents the opportunity to place larger manufactured homes on their particular lot. Testimony presented by William T. Poole, Jr. indicated that the manufactured home industry has changed since the development of Williams Estates in 1966. Testimony indicated that homes have increased in width and that the industry now offers double-wide homes in lieu of the single-wide home offered in the 1960s. Since Williams Estates was laid out in the 1960s, the Petitioners were not able to take into account the advent of double-wide manufactured homes. Testimony indicated that the existing lots are not of sufficient size to accommodate the newer, wider manufactured homes. cordingly, the Petitioner has requested variances for all lots in the subdivision, excluding those located within the Chesapeake Bay Critical Areas, in order to afford their residents the opportunity to locate a larger manufactured home on their particular lot if they so desire. Testimony indicated that the subject trailer park is one of the nicest manufac-

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believe the variance being requested would be appropriate. Specifically, those lots which were added in 1984 that are somewhat larger than the lots in the original Williams Estates park. Also there exists a drainage easement that separates the lots added in 1984 from the older section which currently experiences the water runoff problems. Therefore, it appears that any storm water runoff that might be created by a larger manufactured home being placed on the lots added in 1984 would be diverted into the drainage ditch and would not run into the older section of the park that currently has these problems. Also, many of the lots added in 1984 are larger and do not back up to other lots. Therefore, I find that the spacing of these lots in this particular section could accommodate a larger manufactured home without any detriment to the surrounding community and would not exacerbate the runoff problem in the older section of the park. The lots about which I am speaking are Lots 100 through 108, and Lots 110, 112, 114, 116, 118, 120, 122, 124, 126, 128, 130, 132, 134, 136, 138, 140 and 142 on Roundup Road; Lots 100 through 103, 105, 107, 109, 111, 113, 115 and 117 and Lots 119 through 130, 132 and 134 on Lariat Road; Lots 101 through 119 and Lots 121, 127, 129, 131, 133, 135 and 137, and Lots 139 through Lot 152 and Lot 154 on Cowhide Circle; Lots 101 through 113 and

It is clear from the testimony that if the variances are granted, as modified herein, such use as proposed, will not be contrary to the spirit of the B.C.Z.R. and will not result in any injury to the public

After due consideration of the testimony and evidence presented, it is clear that practical difficulty or unreasonable hardship will result if the variances, as modified herein, are not granted. I find that since there exists a drainage and utility easement between the section added in 1984 and the original section of Williams Estates which has a storm water runoff problem that the variances granted for the newer section would not contribute to that problem. It has been established that special circumstances or conditions exist that are peculiar to the land or structure

tured housing developments in Baltimore County and that the park is wellmaintained and beautifully landscaped.

As previously stated, this park came into existence by virtue of the special exception granted in 1966. Since that time, the Petitioners petitioned the Office of Zoning on two other occasions. In 1970, in Case No. 70-184-ASPH, the Petitioners were granted a variance which permitted mobile homes to be located as close as 8 feet to the existing Penn Central Railroad right-of-way line in lieu of the required minimum 75 feet. That variance was granted by the then Zoning Commissioner, Edward D. Hardesty, and allowed for the placement of 20 additional manufactured homes along the Penn Central Railroad right-of-way line. Also in Case No. 70-184-ASPH, the Petitioners requested a variance to permit mobile homes to be situated 25 feet from the street right-of-way of Bengies Road in lieu of the required 100-foot setback. Commissioner Hardesty also granted that variance which allowed the Petitioners to situate an additional 19 manufactured homes along Bengies Road. By virtue of the variances being granted in 1970, the Petitioner was permitted to place an additional 39 mobile homes on the subject site.

In 1984, the Petitioners expanded Williams Estates to that which exists today. In the course of the expansion of the park, the Petitioners requested a variance in Case No 84-283-A, to permit mobile homes to be located 60 feet from the street right-of-way of Bengies Road in lieu of 100 feet. That variance was granted and the Petitioner was able to situate 5 additional trailers within that setback area. - 7) A tot lot addressing the needs of small children living in the development shall be provided at the Community Center.
- 8) When applying for any permits, the site plan and/ or landscaping plan filed must reference this case and set forth and address the restrictions of this Order.

I would appreciate your assistance by correcting the design thereby improving the quality of the surrounding waterways.

At the recent (July 14, 1992) meeting at Chase Elementary School, several inquiries, concerns and complaints were voiced by the citizens. In an effort to keep the lines of communication open, I hope you will forward this response to your neighbors.

1. Water Drainage - Sanitarians of the Eastern Regional Community Services Division have made several inspections over the last several weeks. Generalized drainage problems have not been detected. However, they will continue to monitor the situation particularly after heavy rain events. As indicated, the stormwater management facilities and storm drain system within the park are private utilities. The park owner is responsible for all repair and maintenance to this system. However, my offer to provide some review and suggestions by County engineers to the Citizen Committee is still available.

The question of individual or specific lot drainage problems would have to be rectified by park management. The County uses a rough criteria of standing water for 24 hours to qualify as a drainage problem on a lot.

- 2. 011 Tanks The State of Maryland (Maryland Department of the Environment) regulates certain underground fuel tanks. The normal residential (275 gallon) tanks are not under these regulations. The removal of the underground tanks and replacement above ground is not a mandated requirement. Payment for this activity would be strictly between the landlord and the tenant.
- 3. Noise Construction noise within the park would be regulated according to the Maryland State Noise Regulations. Between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m., the maximum limit is 90 decibels. A 55-decibel limit is in force, unless an emergency situation occurs, during the remainder of the night and early morning hours.

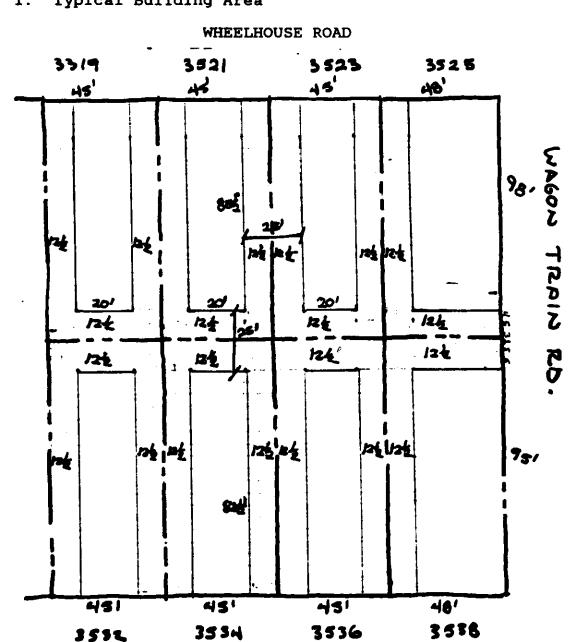

The Bowleys Quarters Improvement Association (BQIA) is opposed to the development concept proposed in plans filed with the Baltimore County Planning Office designated as the Carrollwood Manor Project - Plat # XV 181, dated March 14, 1979. It has been brought to our attention that the owner (MDIF) will request a waiver to by-pass the CRG review which will essentially allow the grandfathering of this development plan beyond the reach of the CRG review process.

The BQIA is opposed to the possible waivering of this development for the following reasons:

1. We believe that the Critical Area Map depicting the proposed area misrepresents the area as it currently exists. The Critical Area Map dated 2/11/88 shows the area as a high density area when in fact the area is densley wooded and undeveloped.

2. If the Baltimore County Planning Board staff, in it's recomendations proposed in the 1988 Comprehensive Zoning Requests document intended to protect the Saltpeter Creek area (Petition # 5-179) from storm water runoff by designating this land parcel (consisting of 503 acres) for downgrading to R.C. 20 then how, knowing that this parcel is directly north of the Carrollwood Manor plat XV 181, could the planning staff justify the designation of the Carrollwood Manor Project-Plat # XV181 as a high density development area. This designation would surely sacrifice the water quality of the Seneca Creek area by aggravating storm water runoff problems which currently exist in this area.

It is the hope of the BQIA that the Baltimore County Planning Board will not grant the waiver request if filed, thereby forcing the CRG review.

The BQIA intends to lobby the CRG to persuade them to seize the opportunity provided by this building permit lapse and reconsider the high density development designation granted for this parcel. The downgrading of this area to a classification as a limited development area would be the more desirable desigration and should be considered.

The modular home construction industry essentially prefabricats the homes at a plant, which are then conveyed to the site and then pieced together.

The modular homes are quite sizeable containing up to 1,200 square feet of living space. In addition, the homes have architectural details such as pitched roofs, porches, bay windows, etc. The newer manufactured homes present a much better image than the older mobile homes.

The variances requested regarding the side yard setbacks are in conformance with the new CMDP regarding building setbacks (Attachment C). The BCZR and CMDP allow distances between buildings of 20 feet for single-family detached dwellings, DR 5.5, 10.5 or 16 zones. The petitioner's request is in conformance with these regulations.

The rear yard variances differ significantly from what is required for single-family detached homes in the DR 5.5, 10.5 or 16 zones. A 30 foot rear yard is required. Staff believes that adequate rear yards should be provided, however, the nature of the manufactured housing industry as well as the layout for the Williams Estates does provide adequate building separation and adequate rear yard space for the provision of storage sheds. The restrictions on the development also regulate exterior maintenance. The entire resubdivision of this development to accommodate these upgraded units would not be appropriate.

Based upon the analysis conducted and information provided staff recommends **APPROVAL** of the petitioner's request.

On behalf of the members of the Bowley's Quarters Improvement Association (BOIA), I commend Commissioner Kotroco for his outstanding work on the Williams Estate Petition Case #92-460-SPHA.

In his finding, Commissioner Kotroco clearly points out conditions that should be addressed not only on the petitioners property but also on properties outside the area in question. The reason being is whatever happens on or as a result of the petitioners actions with his or her property will also impact on the interest of other locations outside the area.

One of those conditions the Commissioner examined was storm water flooding and runoff in the park that will be increased due to the reduction in permeable surfaces. What the Commissioner did not address in his examination was the impact the flooding and runoff would have outside the area of the petition. This oversight by the Commissioner was more than likely caused by the lack of information on the subject from DEPRM, Public Works, and the Army Corps of Engineers. As a result of the aforesaid, the BQIA will address the lack of information with the following history:

After the Chesapeake Bay Legislation was past and amended, Baltimore County was delegated the direct responsibility to apply the requirements of the law which are, but are not limited to, maintaining water quality, ensuring and protecting the health and 'safety of human, aquatic, and wildlife environments, etc. In part Baltimore County was to accomplish all the criteria golds by addressing the storm water flooding and runoff into Critical Area wetlands, streams, and tidalwaters with state of the art sediment and pollution controls.

I have received your letter of October 22, 1991 concerning the Carroll Manor subdivision located along Nollmeyer Road in Baltimore County. Your letter alleges that numerous wetland, sediment and stormwater violations are occurring at this site.

The Sediment and Stormwater Administration (SSA) enforcement staff investigated this site in response to your earlier complaint. Mr. William Limpert of SSA reported his findings concerning sediment violations at the site to Messrs. Roy List and Scott Porter, Baltimore County Sediment Control Division. By August 22, 1991, the County had issued a stop work order addressing wetland violations and the lack of an approved sediment control plan. An inspection conducted by Baltimore County on November 18, 1991 revealed that sediment controls were functioning adequately on site. County staff is working with the property owner to develop appropriate stormwater quality management for the site. For details concerning their progress I suggest that you contact Mr. Jack

The Army Corps of Engineers (COE) has also issued a stop work order on this site because of alleged illegal filling of wetlands. For details concerning the status of the Corps enforcement action please contact Ms. Sandra Mues at (410) 962-4502. The activities at this site were undertaken without permits, therefore, no water quality certification was issued. As soon as the COE and MDE were aware of the activities, a stop work order was issued.

SSA does have direct responsibility for the evaluation of both local erosion and sediment control and stormwater management programs. With regard to sediment control, Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE) has delegated its enforcement authority to Baltimore County during each of the program evaluations performed since 1985. The SSA has recently completed an evaluation of the County's sediment control program, and we anticipate that the delegation of our enforcement authority will be sustained. It is our opinion that Baltimore County maintains a good sediment control program, and I am confident that any sediment control problems in Bowleys Quarters will be quickly rectified by the County staff. I encourage you to contact Mr. Jack Berger, Chief, Sediment Control Division, Baltimore County Department of Environmental Protection and Resource Management at (410) 887-3226.

The State of Maryland had control over a number of development sights off Nollmeyer Road in Bowleys Quarters, Maryland which is located on the shores of the Chesapeake Bay in Chesapeake Bay Critical Areas having tidal and non-tidal wetlands. The sights were owned by Old Court Savings and Loan and turned over to a developer via the grandfather clause having exemptions relative to stormwater management. As a result of the aforesaid the development began to adversely impact on areas that were not exempt from protection of the law, i.e. neighboring properties, tidal, and nontidal wetlands and tidal waters. What became obvious is as follows.

In the Nollmeyer Road area it appears that the Maryland Department of Environment (M.D.E.) Sedement and Stormwater Administration (S.S.A.) was not "providing any oversight of the local stormwater management and sedement control programs to ensure that the local programs were meeting state standards".

In the same area it appears that the M.D.E., S.S.A. was not "maintaining the characteristics of the stormwater runoff from the development area, so that the quality and quantity of the runoff is as close as possible to the pre-development conditions".

In the same area it appears that the M.D.E., S.S.A. was not "ensuring that pertinent state statutes and regulations were being vigorously enforced".

In the same area it also appears that the M.D.E. Water Management Administration (W.M.A.) was not performing its mission to restore and maintain the quality of the surface water and to ensure that the waters are safe for human, aquatic, and wildlifes.

In the same area it apears that the M.D.E. W.M.A. prerequisits of Water Quality Certification along with Federal and State permits that were not obtained by anyone for any activity to ensure that the activities do not violate water quality standards that protects aquatic life and recreational water.

In response to your memorandum of August 27, 1991 to Jim Dieter requesting an investigation of the referenced development to determine if the site is in compliance with sediment control requirements, please be advised of the following.

The inspection records for this project since August 1, 1991 indicate: 1. August 1, 1991 - Correction Notice issued to reinstall earth dike along Nollmeyer Road and stabilize the entire dike with seed and mulch.

2. August 6, 1991 - Work ordered on August 1, 1991 not completed. No one present on site.

3. August 15, 1991 - Stop Work Order issued for non-compliance with Correction Notice of August 1, 1991. Also, Stop Work Order issued to Department of Public Works and utility contractor for working outside the limits of the approved plan and permit.

4. August 16, 1991 - Detailed Stop Work Order issued outlining the temporary sediment control measures to be installed in the area disturbed outside the limits of the permit. Also, the Developer was ordered to submit revised plans for approval by the County and the Soil Conservation District.

The Developer was also issued an order to clean Nollmeyer Road and Kittendale Circle, install inlet protection, repair and redefine existing berms which direct flow to the sediment basin, stabilize the existing stockpile area and submit revised plans for the proposed installation of an approved sediment trap along Hunting Fields Road (this area is not draining into the existing sediment basin.)

5. August 19, 1991 - All repairs in the off-site area are complete. Repair work within the limits of the subdivision was in process.

6. August 28, 1991 - Previous corrections completed. Correction Notice issued to replace straw bales placed along inlets with silt fence.
