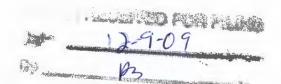
FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

This matter comes before this Deputy Zoning Commissioner as a Petition for Variance filed by the legal owner of the subject property, The Ascension Evangelical Lutheran Church of Baltimore County, Inc., for property located at 7601 York Road. The Variance requests are from Section 1B01.2.C.1.a of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations as follows:

- To allow a street corner side yard setback of 23 feet in lieu of the minimum required
 35 feet for a non-residential principal building in a D.R. Zone; and
- To allow an existing interior side yard setback of 8 feet in lieu of the minimum required 20 feet for a non-residential principal building in a D.R. Zone; and
- To allow an existing rear yard setback of 28 feet in lieu of the minimum required 30 feet for non-residential principal building in a D.R. Zone.

The subject property and requested relief are more particularly described on the site plan that was marked and accepted into evidence as Petitioner's Exhibit 1.

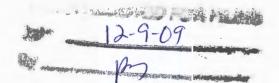
Appearing at the requisite public hearing in support of the variance requests were John Holman, Chairman of the Church Building Committee, on behalf of Petitioner, The Ascension Evangelical Lutheran Church of Baltimore County, Inc., and Douglas B. Riley, Esquire, the attorney representing Petitioner. Also appearing in support of the requested relief were Laurie



McLain with Hord Coplan Macht, Inc., the architect who prepared the building floor plan and elevation drawings, and Douglas L. Kennedy with KWC Engineering Technologies, Inc., the professional engineer who prepared the site plan. The case garnered interest in the community and several neighbors and interested persons attended the hearing, including Brian Murphy of 614 Coventry Road, Susan Hartman of 18½ Cedar Avenue, Laurie Newton-King of 501 Yarmouth Road, Jim Kirschner of 604 Worcester Road, and Francis Holman of 12 Cedar Avenue in Towson.

Petitioner's attorney, Mr. Riley, presented an overview of the proposed project and indicated that the Ascension Lutheran Church (the "Church") has occupied the subject property since 1948. The original Church building was followed by an addition for an education wing. At this juncture, the Church desires to construct another addition to the existing building in order to provide a more formal reception area, additional offices, better handicapped access, and additional bathroom facilities. As shown on the site plan, the addition would be located on the York Road side of the property. In order to build the addition as proposed, Petitioner is in need of variance relief to permit a 23 foot street corner side yard setback in lieu of the required 35 feet. In addition, due to Petitioner's current plans, there are several existing conditions that must be brought to current zoning requirements or granted variance relief. This includes an 8 foot side yard setback at the southwest corner of the existing building where 20 feet is required, and a 28 foot rear yard setback at the east side of the building where 30 feet is required.

To provide additional background information regarding the Church, Mr. Riley called John Holman as a witness. As indicated earlier, Mr. Holman is Chairman of the Church Building Committee. He and his wife, Francis Holman, have lived in the community for almost 30 years and are active members of the congregation. Mr. Holman indicated that the Church is



located at the northeast corner of York Road and Yarmouth Road in the Wiltondale neighborhood, less than a mile south of downtown Towson. As shown on the site plan, Mr. Holman explained that the original Church building was built in approximately 1949-50. An education wing was added in 1959, and a third addition was constructed in 1992. The Church also owns the adjacent property to the east, 500 Yarmouth Road, and utilizes it as a residence, while using the backyard of that property for a children's play area.

Currently, the Church has approximately 800 members, with about 130 nursery school students as well. The Church desires to build an office wing near the existing education wing and sanctuary and also create elevator space for that area, and to connect this wing to a smaller addition for a chapel and fellowship space. Mr. Holman stressed that the need for this additional space is not driven by a need to expand the congregation, but rather the recognition of potential safety issues due to the age of the church buildings and a desire to meet current fire codes and to create ADA¹ accessibility. Mr. Holman indicated that the Church is somewhat "landlocked," in the sense that it is surrounded by residential neighbotho ods to the north, south, and east, and has few areas within which to expand except toward York Road. In fact, due to space constraints and a desire not to impact the residential communities, existing parking at the Church is across the street on York Road.

Next to testify was Laurie McLain, Petitioner's architect. As illustrated on the floor plan that was marked and accepted into evidence as Petitioner's Exhibit 2, Ms. McLain explained that the new addition would have three private offices, in entry lobby/reception area, a copy/work room, and a parlor, and would have direct access to the sanctuary and education areas. Presently, the office areas for the Church are spread throughout; however, the addition would permit the office areas to become more centralized in one beattion. Ms. McLain also indicated that

12-9-09 B landscaping would be provided per a landscaping plan. Finally, Ms. McLain emphasized that if the variance relief is not granted, especially for the new addition toward the York Road side of the property, the Church cannot realistically go forward with the project. This would obviously impact the Church and the congregation, but would also have a negative effect on the community because the Church would not be able to go forward with much needed improvements to ADA accessibility requirements, as well as aesthetically improving the appearance of the building.

Finally, Mr. Riley called the engineer, Douglas Kennedy, to testify in support of the requested variance relief. Mr. Kennedy was offered and accepted as an expert in engineering, site design, and knowledge of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations and the legal standard for variance relief. Mr. Kennedy discussed a number of the unusual features and characteristics of the property that compel the need for variance relief. First, the Church property is comprised of five parcels of land and collectively is much larger than the other properties in the vicinity. Second, the property has an irregular "L" shape and is also bordered on three sides by streets—York Road to the west, Worcester Road to the north, and Yarmouth Road to the south. The property is also unusual in that it has off street parking directly across the street on York Road. Finally, the property is located in somewhat of a transition area in this mixed use corridor of York Road, with primarily residential communities of the east, but with a blend of educational (Towson University), medical (St. Joseph's Hospital) and mixed commercial uses to the west.

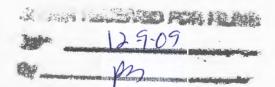
The shape of the property and the frontage on three streets, as well as the permitted nonresidential use of the property as a Church, shring the available building envelope and cause the setbacks to be more onerous than for residential buildings. Mr. Kennedy also offered his expert opinion that the impact on the nearby residential community would be almost immeasurable. This is because the addition to the existing building would extend toward York

Road, not into the community. In addition, as shown on the elevation drawing that was marked and accepted into evidence as Petitioner's Exhibit 3, as well as the photographic rendering that was marked and accepted into evidence as Petitioner's Exhibit 4, the addition would fit in with the exiting building and, indeed, would not look like an addition at all, but rather a seamless extension of the existing Church building. It would also have aesthetic character, with attractive rooflines, brick veneers, and large, architecturally pleasing windows, making the newly improved building a positive influence on the community.

As indicated earlier, the case did garner attention in the nearby community and several interested citizens attended the hearing. Testifying as a spokesman on behalf of the community was Brian Murphy of 614 Coventry Road. Mr. Murphy is a local attorney in the Baltimore area and is also President of the Wiltondale Improvement Association. He has lived in the community for about 25 years and indicated that the Wiltondale community consists of 372 homes and includes the east side of York Road from Stevenson Lane to the south side of Cedar Avenue and all the streets in between, exclusive of Weatherbee Road and Worthington Road. Mr. Murphy explained that neither he nor the Association is expressly for or against the Church's proposed addition. He acknowledged that the Church has always been a good neighbor and other than some traffic issues from time to time, therehave been few problems with the Church.

In an effort to keep the community informed, Mr. Murphy indicated he sent a newsletter to the Wiltondale residents, a copy of which was marked and accepted into evidence as Community Exhibit 1. In the newsletter, Mr. Murphy generally summarized the Church's proposal and his October 20, 2009 meeting with Church officials and their architect and engineer. He also explained the nature of the requested zoning relief as well as a preliminary construction schedule and the potential temporary in spacts of construction, such as storage

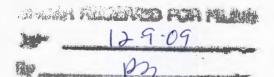


trailers, construction equipment, and intermittent sidewalk closures along York Road on the Church side. Mr. Murphy then invited members of the community to reply with their comments, which he would submit at the hearing.

In response, Mr. Murphy received a number of comments, with what he described as about a 50-50 mix of those in support and those opposed to the Church's plans. He submitted nine emails that were representative of the responses received, which were marked and accepted into evidence as Community Exhibits 2A through 2I. These emails produced a range of reactions about the project, from negative comments including traffic issues, overcrowding the existing church property, and construction impacts and disruptions, to positive comments supporting the Church's plans and lauding the Church as a good neighbor in the community.

The Zoning Advisory Committee (ZAC) comments were received and are made part of the record of this case. Comments were received from the Office of Planning dated September 30, 2009 which indicates the Office met with the applicant to discuss the architecture. The Planning Office found that the proposed addition and building material appear to be consistent with the existing building and offers support of the subject proposal.

Considering all the testimony and evidence presented, I am persuaded to grant the requested variance relief. While it can be argued that the Church is very close to exhausting its available space on the subject property for improvements, however needed those improvements may be, I find in this case that special circumstances or conditions exist which are peculiar to the land or structure which is the subject of the variance requests. In particular, the primary focus of this case is the 23 foot setback from the proposed addition to the York Road side of the property. This setback area would have the most potential impact on the site given its proximity to York Road. The other variance requests are minor and seek to simply legitimize existing conditions.



In my view, the unusual shape of the property and its frontage on three streets, and its location as a gateway to the residential neighborhoods behind it, as well as its proximity to commercial mixed uses nearby, renders the property unique in a zoning sense. In addition, although the Church is a use permitted by right on the property, the setback requirements for this nonresidential use are more extensive and burdensome than for a residential property situated only a few blocks away. Thus, the imposition of zoning disproportionately impacts the subject property as compared with others in the District.

I further find that the variance requests can be granted in strict harmony with the spirit and intent of said regulations, and in such manner as to grant relief without injury to the public health, safety and general welfare. I note that Petitioner's elevation drawing and photographic rendering show a prominent, architecturally pleasing addition to the Church property. There are no plans to expand the Church or its services, only to create a better working environment for Church employees, as well as better access for handicapped persons and additional bathroom facilities for a currently underserved building.

Based on the evidence produced at the hearing, I do not believe there will be any negative impacts from the addition². This is perhaps underscored by the letter submitted by Petitioner's attorney, Mr. Riley, dated July 30, 2009 from Stephen E. Weber, Chief of the County's Division of Traffic Engineering. This letter, marked and accepted into evidence as Petitioner's Exhibit 5, responds to a request from Mr. Riley for an exemption to the Basic Services Map – Transportation to allow the Church to expand its current building despite being located in a deficient traffic shed at York Road and Burke Avenue. In his response letter, Mr. Weber

² Obviously, there will be temporary impacts during construction of the addition and related landscaping; however, unfortunately, these impacts are inherent in virtually every construction project. Hopefully, the Church will continue as a good neighbor and make efforts to minimize the impacts to the adjacent community and keep the community informed during that process.

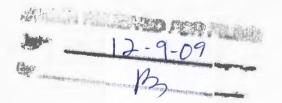
calculates that based on a review of the site plan and information detailing the purposes of the proposed expansion, the additional number of daily peak-hour trips generated by the addition to the building would be zero; thus, in Mr. Weber's view, the County's Basic Services legislation should not prevent the issuance of any building permits. In short, I find that the variance requests can be granted in such a manner as to meet the requirements of Section 307.1 of the B.C.Z.R., as interpreted in *Cromwell v. Ward*, 102 Md.App. 691 (1995).

Pursuant to the posting of the property and the provisions of both the Baltimore County Code and the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations, and for the reasons given above, the requested variance relief should be granted.

THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED, by the Deputy Zoning Commissioner for Baltimore County, this ______ day of December, 2009 that Petitioner's request for Variance relief from Section 1B01.2.C.1.a of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations as follows:

- To allow a street corner side yard setback of 23 feet in lieu of the minimum required
 35 feet for a non-residential principal building in a D.R. Zone; and
- To allow an existing interior side yard setback of 8 feet in lieu of the minimum required 20 feet for a non-residential principal building in a D.R. Zone; and
- To allow an existing rear yard setback of 28 feet in lieu of the minimum required 30 feet for a non-residential principal building in a D.R. Zone,

be and are hereby GRANTED, subject to the following:



1. Petitioner may apply for building permits and be granted same upon receipt of this Order; however, Petitioner is hereby made aware that proceeding at this time is at its own risk until such time as the 30 day appellate process from this Order has expired. If, for whatever reason, this Order is reversed, the Petitioner would be required to return, and be responsible for returning, said property to its original condition.

Any appeal of this decision must be made within thirty (30) days of the date of this Order.

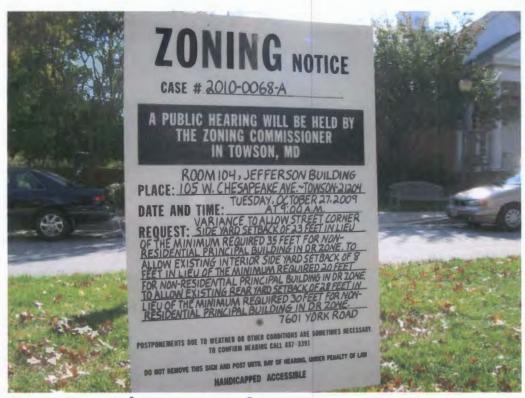

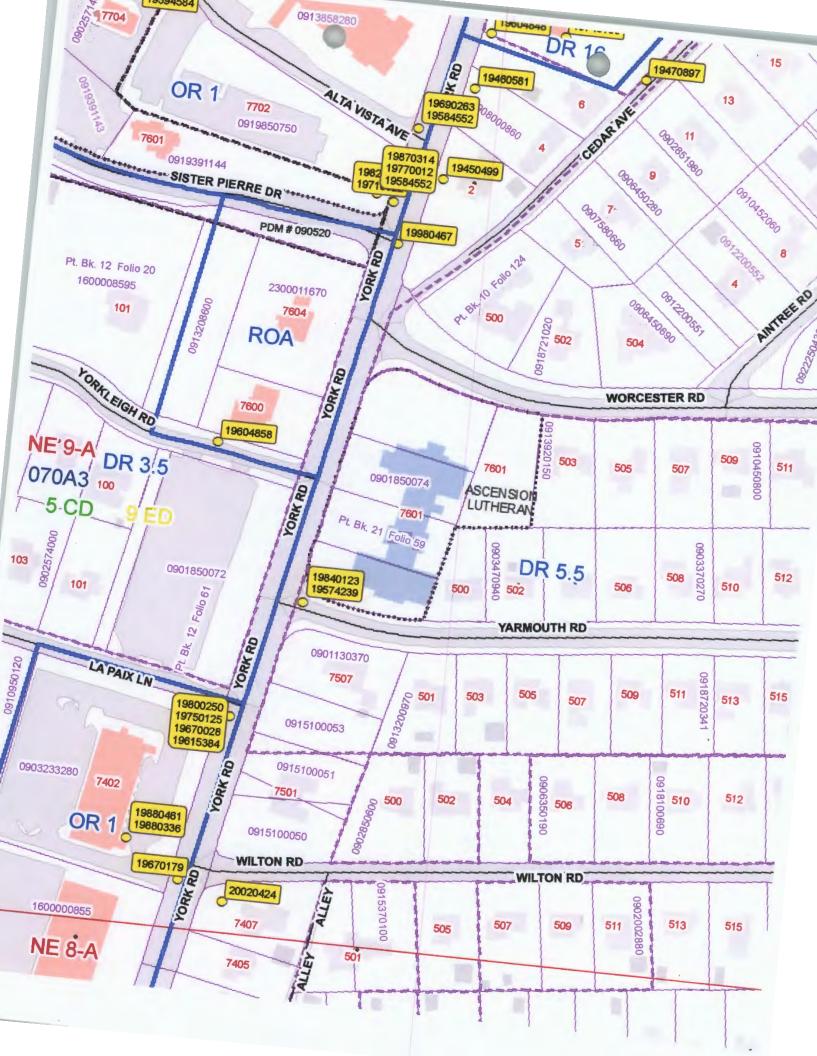

We have had the opportunity to review the submitted site plan for additions to the church building at 7601 York Rd in Towson. Based on the information supplied in the site plan and the descriptive information supplied in your letter of July 9, 2009, we would calculate that the additional number of daily peak-hour vehicle trips generated by the building addition would be zero.

Since the church is currently located within a failing transportation deficient commutershed boundary, restrictions to the issuance of any building permits to the site would only be withheld if the issuance of such permits would cause the site to generate additional peak-hour trips. Given that the site does not contain a building that is devoted principally to dwellings or retail or office uses, the number of peak-hour trips generated by the building is to be determined by the Bureau of Traffic Engineering & Transportation Planning under §4A02.4.D.3.b. of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations. Since the number of peak-hour trips generated by the building addition is zero, this section of the County's Basic Services legislation should not prevent the issuance of any building permits. (The addition certainly does have the potential for increasing the number of non-peak-hour trips, but those are not controlled by the Basic Services legislation and they would occur during hours of the day when the roadway network has adequate capacity to handle the demand.)

I am forwarding a copy of this letter and your July 9, 2009 letter to Carl Richards in the Zoning Office. While the information in your letter outlines the intent of the expansion, I feel that when the church submits their plans for review to the County for obtaining the required permits that they also need to submit a floor plan of the addition to Mr. Richards to that it can be verified that the floor plan modifications match the changes outlined in your letter. Clearly the one issue of which we have most concern with this church and the generation of peak-hour trips is with the associated day-care facilities located in the church building. There can be no changes made to the church building which is any way will result in more children being accommodated

in the day-care program nor any increase the level of staff used to support these children. That would result in increased peak-hour trips and would therefore not be allowed under the current legislation unless granted by the Zoning Commissioner through a Special Variance hearing.

The purpose of this letter is to request an exemption to the Basic Services Map – Transportation to allow Ascension Lutheran Church to expand its current building at 7601 York Road. As the building site is located in the traffic shed of York Road and Burke Avenue, a Level F intersection, the expansion cannot go forward without an exemption.

The expansion is intended to provide the following space:

- New office space to consolidate office space located throughout the building
- Additional toilet facilities to better serve an underserved building
- Expanded fellowship space to be used after services on Sundays and by the community during evening hours
- Expanded choir facilities as the current music space is inadequate
- Elevator to provide handicap access to all levels of the building
- Expansion of the lower level of the Great Hall for Saturday and Sunday activities and evening gatherings
- Increased storage spaces

The expansion will *not* include any additional classrooms, and there will be no increase in either the staff or enrollment of the day school. Likewise, the size of the church staff will remain the same. The sanctuary will also be unchanged with the same number of pews. The goal of the expansion is to centralize the office staff and make the existing building space more functional for the congregation.

Enclosed for your review are the Site Plan and the Plan to Accompany Petition for Zoning Variance. Before we move forward with our zoning petition, we would like to know whether Baltimore County will grant an exemption from the Basic Services Map – Transportation.

To Wiltondale Residents:

I met on Tuesday, October 20 with representatives of Ascension Lutheran Church and their architect and engineer about the setback variance they are seeking in order to construct an addition on the York Road side of their church. I relayed to them concerns and questions that I have heard from some Wiltondale residents and they were happy to answer my questions. The church has previously presented their building plans, which included the York Road variance request, to the architectural committee of the Wiltondale Improvement Association which, in turn, presented those plans to the board of directors of the improvement association. Neither body voiced opposition to those building plans.

First, although the zoning signs posted at the church categorize the sought-after setback variances as "side-yard" variances, because the front of the church is considered to be on Worcester Road, the setback variances in question actually relate to the York Road side of the property and to what most would call the back of the church property which abuts houses in the 500 blocks of Worcester and Yarmouth Roads. The variance on the York Road side is being sought to allow construction of an addition on that side of the church. The variances at the property line abutting the houses on Worcester and Yarmouth are being sought to make two variances that already exist there conform with the law. Apparently, when the education wing on Yarmouth Road was constructed in the early 1960's, part of that wing was built closer to the property line abutting the house at 500 Yarmouth than the setbacks then required. In addition, when the new sanctuary entrance on Worcester Road was constructed in the 1990's, one corner of that addition was built closer to the 500 Yarmouth property line than the setbacks then required. These two existing but unapproved variances were not discovered by the church until very recently and, therefore, have not been officially presented to the WIA architectural committee or the board of directors. The house at 500 Yarmouth is currently owned by the church and houses a church employee.

According to Ascension Building Committee Chairman John Holman, the addition on the York Road side of the church will add office space, a courtyard, and a lounge just outside the entrance to the sanctuary. This addition will be coordinated with some interior remodeling. Holman says that the addition, along with the interior remodeling, is being undertaken not to expand the size of the congregation or the programs offered but, rather, to enlarge and modernize outdated and cramped offices, to provide more gathering space for the existing congregation and programs, to improve exterior and interior access to those with disabilities, and to bring the building fully in compliance with fire and health codes. He notes that the sanctuary, where worship services are held, will remain the same size. Without the York Road variance, Holman says, the church would be unable to properly achieve the aforementioned goals

On the York Road side, the church is seeking to build 12 feet closer to the property line than the setback requires; *i.e.*, they are asking to be allowed to build out to 23 feet from the York Road property line rather than at the current limit of no closer than

COMMUNITY

35 feet from the York Road property line. According to Ascension attorney Doug Riley, the York Road property line is at the inside edge of the sidewalk. As to the other variances, the church is asking that the existing building be made compliant by the granting of an after-the fact-variance. In the case of the education wing, the setback would be eight feet from the 500 Yarmouth property line rather than 20 feet; in the case of the Worcester Road sanctuary entrance, the setback would be 28 feet rather than 30 feet from that property line.

According to architect Laurie McClain and engineer Douglas Kennedy, overall construction could take as long as 16 months. They state that the exterior addition will likely be undertaken first and would gradually give way to interior improvements and finish work. Holman said that the congregation will take a final vote in January of 2010 on this project and, if approved, construction will hopefully begin in February or March of 2010. The church's contractor, A. R. Marani, in an email, said that his company will do all that it can to minimize the impact that construction will have on Wiltondale. Those measures will include having all workers park in Ascension's lot across York Road and limiting the amount of time that construction equipment is parked on the site. However, some pieces of equipment such as a crane, a backhoe, and tractors, will have to remain on-site while they are being used which could be up to two weeks at a time. In addition, two or three storage trailers and a bobcat will remain on the site throughout construction. The construction site will be fenced and will be subject to sediment controls. Several times, the sidewalk on York Road will have to be closed to accommodate the installation of a new water line and a new sidewalk; this will force pedestrians to use of the sidewalk across York Road. The contractor will begin work at 7:00 A.M. (and maybe at 6:30 A.M. in the summer to beat the heat). The contractor offers that most of the noisy work will be on the York Road side of the site.

According to Holman, of the four mature trees on York Road, one will be definitely saved, one will be definitely removed, while the fate of the remaining two will be decided during construction. Some new trees will be planted.

A zoning hearing will be held on the variance requests on Tuesday, October 27 at 9:00 A.M. in Room 104 of the Jefferson Building at 105 West Chesapeake Avenue in Towson. The hearing is open to all members of the public. I plan to attend and present any concerns that Wiltondale residents may have. However, as these concerns have no relation to the legality of their right to a variance, I don't see any point in my attending that meeting. My concerns are completely separate from that issue. To Wiltondale Residents:

I met on Tuesday, October 20 with representatives of Ascension Lutheran Church and their architect and engineer about the setback variance they are seeking in order to construct an addition on the York Road side of their church. I relayed to them concerns and questions that I have heard from some Wiltondale residents and they were happy to answer my questions. The church has previously presented their building plans, which included the York Road variance request, to the architectural committee of the Wiltondale Improvement Association which, in turn, presented those plans to the board of directors of the improvement association. Neither body voiced opposition to those building plans.

First, although the zoning signs posted at the church categorize the sought-after setback variances as "side-yard" variances, because the front of the church is considered to be on Worcester Road, the setback variances in question actually relate to the York Road side of the property and to what most would call the back of the church property which abuts houses in the 500 blocks of Worcester and Yarmouth Roads. The variance on the York Road side is being sought to allow construction of an addition on that side of the church. The variances at the property line abutting the houses on Worcester and Yarmouth are being sought to make two variances that already exist there conform with the law. Apparently, when the education wing on Yarmouth Road was constructed in the early 1960's, part of that wing was built closer to the property line abutting the house at 500 Yarmouth than the setbacks then required. In addition, when the new sanctuary entrance on Worcester Road was constructed in the 1990's, one corner of that addition was built closer to the 500 Yarmouth property line than the setbacks then required. These two existing but unapproved variances were not discovered by the church until very recently and, therefore, have not been officially presented to the WIA architectural committee or the board of directors. The house at 500 Yarmouth is currently owned by the church and houses a church employee.

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On the York Road side, the church is seeking to build 12 feet closer to the property line than the setback requires; *i.e.*, they are asking to be allowed to build out to 23 feet from the York Road property line rather than at the current limit of no closer than 35 feet from the York Road property line. According to Ascension

attorney Doug Riley, the York Road property line is at the inside edge of the sidewalk. As to the other variances, the church is asking that the existing building be made compliant by the granting of an after-the fact-variance. In the case of the education wing, the setback would be eight feet from the 500 Yarmouth property line rather than 20 feet; in the case of the Worcester Road sanctuary entrance, the setback would be 28 feet rather than 30 feet from that property line.

According to architect Laurie McClain and engineer Douglas Kennedy, overall construction could take as long as 16 months. They state that the exterior addition will likely be undertaken first and would gradually give way to interior improvements and finish work. Holman said that the congregation will take a final vote in January of 2010 on this project and, if approved, construction will hopefully begin in February or March of 2010. The church's contractor, A. R. Marani, in an email, said that his company will do all that it can to minimize the impact that construction will have on Wiltondale. Those measures will include having all workers park in Ascension's lot across York Road and limiting the amount of time that construction equipment is parked on the site. However, some pieces of equipment such as a crane, a backhoe, and tractors, will have to remain on-site while they are being used which could be up to two weeks at a time. In addition, two or three storage trailers and a bobcat will remain on the site throughout construction. The construction site will be fenced and will be subject to sediment controls. Several times, the sidewalk on York Road will have to be closed to accommodate the installation of a new water line and a new sidewalk; this will force pedestrians to use of the sidewalk across York Road. The contractor will begin work at 7:00 A.M. (and maybe at 6:30 A.M. in the summer to beat the heat). The contractor offers that most of the noisy work will be on the York Road side of the site.

According to Holman, of the four mature trees on York Road, one will be definitely saved, one will be definitely removed, while the fate of the remaining two will be decided during construction. Some new trees will be planted.

A zoning hearing will be held on the variance requests on Tuesday, October 27 at 9:00 A.M. in Room 104 of the Jefferson Building at 105 West Chesapeake Avenue in Towson. The hearing is open to all members of the public. I plan to attend and present any concerns that Wiltondale residents may have. I've been following this Ascension Lutheran Church story and just read your letter to the community. Unfortunately I can't attend the hearing because I'll be at work.

I have a feeling that any concerns raised by community members will have no impact. The church seems to have community support because some highly active community members are also church members, like Doug Riley and John Holman, to name the two you mentioned. They're great guys. However, I'm not convinced that what's good for the church is necessarily good for the community.

What disturbs me that most is that the architectural committee apparently rubber stamped their request without any community input before the fact. Now the horse is out of the barn. How much space can be squeezed out of that corner lot, for goodness' sake!?

Just because they allow the WIA board to meet there does not automatically make Ascension a good neighbor. It's becoming more and more difficult to exit via Yarmouth Road, which is where I live. The clergy over there has also behaved in a somewhat militant about allowing their own to obstruct traffic going in and out of Yarmouth Road by parking illegally at the corner. On top of that offensive behavior, to have this street obstructed for about two years by even more Ascension business is not a happy thought. Even if the workers park in the lot, folks who park over there like to press the pedestrian walk button one after the other, making it impossible to exit Yarmouth. One solution would be to eliminate the "no turn on red" provision and change it to "no turn on red when pedestrians are present." Another would be to insist that during construction they move their day school traffic to the driveway on the Worcester side of the church.

Another issue is the trees. They cut down some big old oak trees a few years ago when they installed their sign, and replaced those shade trees with small ornamentals (that make no shade). Please at least get them to agree (in writing) to replace any oak trees that they either cut or that die as a result of construction, with native shade trees (and you know those will take decades to replace the existing ones). Our neighborhood looks more and more like a parking lot, with its lack of shade. One mark of civic-mindedness is someone who thinks of benefitting the community, as our forbears did—they planted trees for the future, so we could enjoy walking in the shade. Ascension doesn't really seem to care a whit about that.

Finally, what impact will this huge new wing have on our power grid? Have they studied it? You know the problems we've been having. Why add to them? The power still goes out — 3-4 times since last June. Once just last week, in fact, and we still don't have answers on that. And when they dig up the water line, how will that impact our water pressure? and for how long?

It seems to me like we're being asked to sacrifice a great deal during those 16 months (I'll be surprised if that's all it takes) and don't see how this benefits the neighborhood at all. It puzzles me why the Board saw fit to approve those plans. The WIA has given much more scrutiny to much less intrusive and offensive plans by homeowners in the neighborhood.

These setback requests sound unreasonable. The setbacks are there for a reason. And now we learn that Ascension violated them in the past. Once again, that isn't the way a good neighbor behaves.

I'd like to hear your thinking, especially on how the Board sees this construction as a boon to Wiltondale. Sounds more like an eyesore that will be painful to receive.

Excellent work on the synopsis of your meeting. The Association and its residents are very fortunate to have you as President.

Completely agree with the need/request for the variances applicable to the Yarmouth and Worcester sides of the building. Oppose the variance for the York Road side set back distance.

Although a 12ft exception doesn't sound like too much and the remaining 23ft is still a good distance, I believe the width and height of the proposed structure will visually 'crowd' that side. Unlike individual homes with their smaller structure and side set-backs, the construction of a single unit would present a dominate, if not foreboding, presence between the two otherwise residential streets offering access and invitation to the community.

I believe most residents consider Ascension Lutheran Church a part of our neighborhood. They have always been both generous with their facilities and proactive on any issues (i.e. parking, traffic) that may affect the Wiltondale community. I applaud their outreach in this situation and appreciate their desire to improve their building. Brian,

If you view the video on the church's website you can see that the church started off as a house. It has significantly outgrown its original footprint. The nursery school's impact with the car pool line blocking traffic on Yarmouth and causing speeders down adjacent streets has been endured by residents for years. Church goers also use our streets for parking for Sunday services and for weddings and funerals. That may not impact those with driveways, but many of us do not have driveways. The introduction of the blinking traffic light has increased the number of accidents on York Road in front of Ascension. When will it stop?

About the impact this addition would have on the neighborhood, one neighbor recently said to me "Well it's only one day a week." Yes, it does sound that simple, but I beg to differ. The impact will be felt daily, not just on Sunday. The whole purpose of the addition is to increase the space available for the church to provide more services. That translates into more people coming and going daily.

Again, it is a wonderful idea for them to want to provide more services, but this neighborhood was not designed to accommodate the amount of traffic it will create. We are barely able to manage as it is. In my opinion, this addition should be blocked. If they want to grow bigger, they need to find some other place to do it, not a property that was originally intended to be a residence in a residential neighborhood.

If this is approved, what will be next? And there will be a next. The pastor in the video says "it's been a long time since we added on to the building." Well, it wasn't even 20 years ago, because it happened after Jim and I moved in. And the light, while not an addition was put in at their request not ten years ago. It would appear that we could expect Ascension to want to grow again in another ten years.

We should also be asking ourselves what kind of precident we are setting for all the businesses run out of residences between the church and Stevenson Lane.

The Wiltondale Improvement Association should be opposed to this addition. It does anything but improve our neighborhood.

Following up on the discussion at last night's board meeting, please see the below email that Doug Riley sent to Russ Pope about Ascension Lutheran's variances.

Russ - Ascension Lutheran Church would like to build a one-story addition along York Road to provide its congregation with new office space, additional toilet facilities, an expanded choir room, an elevator to provide handicap access, increased fellowship and storage areas in the basement, and an outdoor porch, portico, and columns. As the front of Ascension Lutheran Church faces Worcester Road, its <u>side yard</u> is along York Road. The County's zoning regulations provide that, in a side yard, a building addition must be at least 35 feet from the property line. Ascension has requested a variance so that its new addition can be built 23 feet from its property line along York Road.

While preparing the variance petition, we discovered two existing set back issues. First, when the school building was added, its setback from the property at 500 Yarmouth Road was supposed to be 20 feet. Instead, this set back is only 8 feet. (This is the walkway from Yarmouth Road, down the steps, to the back door of the fellowship hall in the basement.) Similarly, the back yard set back adjacent to 500 Yarmouth Road is supposed to be 30 feet but, from one particular corner of the building along the walkway, it is only 28 feet. As Ascension Lutheran Church owns the house at 500 Yarmouth Road, this is not a problem and, in fact, the church uses the backyard of 500 Yarmouth Road for its nursery school playground. However, they are still technical violations of the required set back requirements, so we are asking the zoning commissioner to approve them at this time.

I hope this information is helpful. Doug

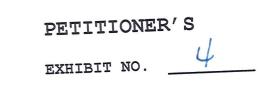
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York Road Perspective







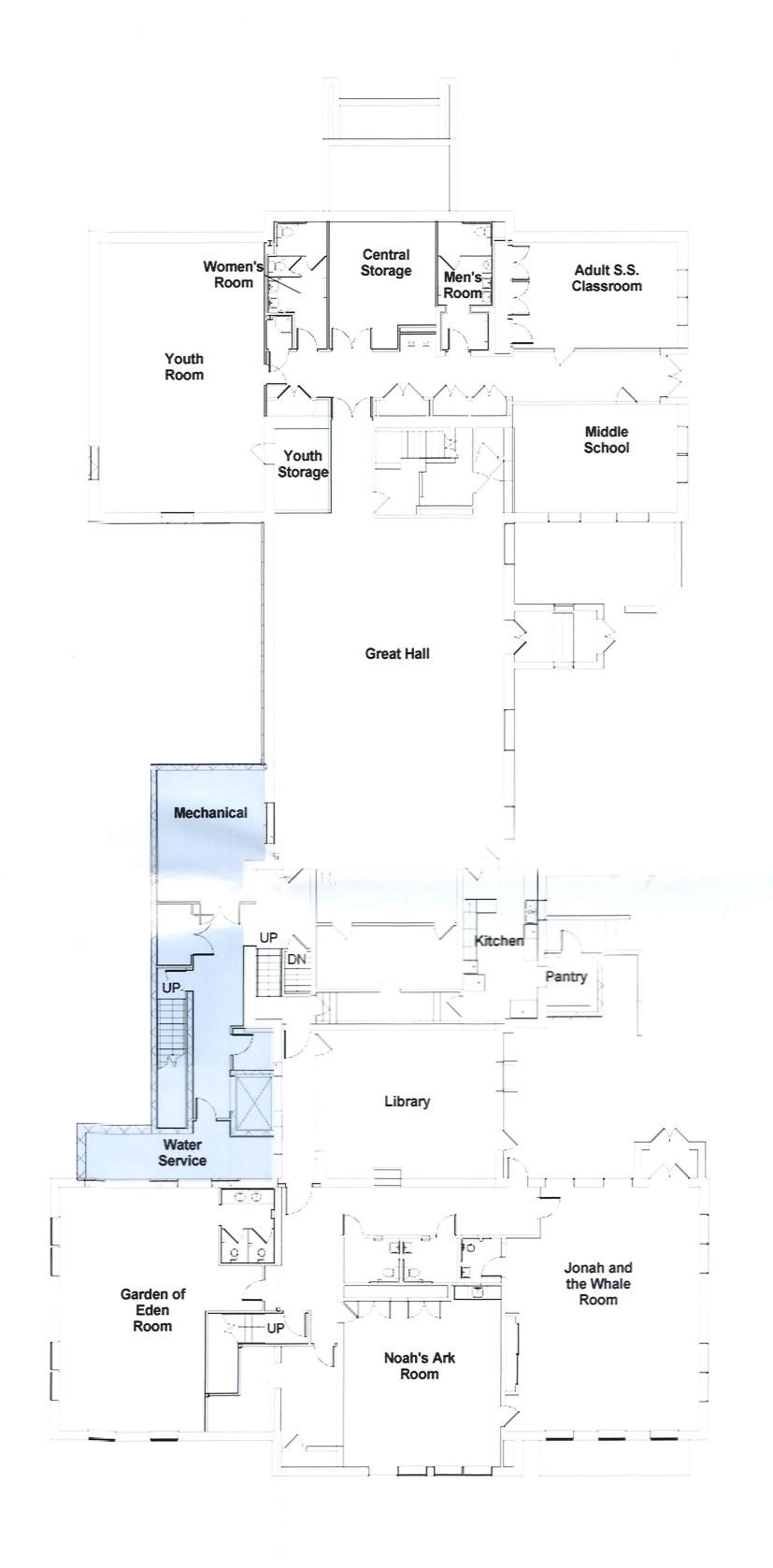
Worcester Rd. Elevation

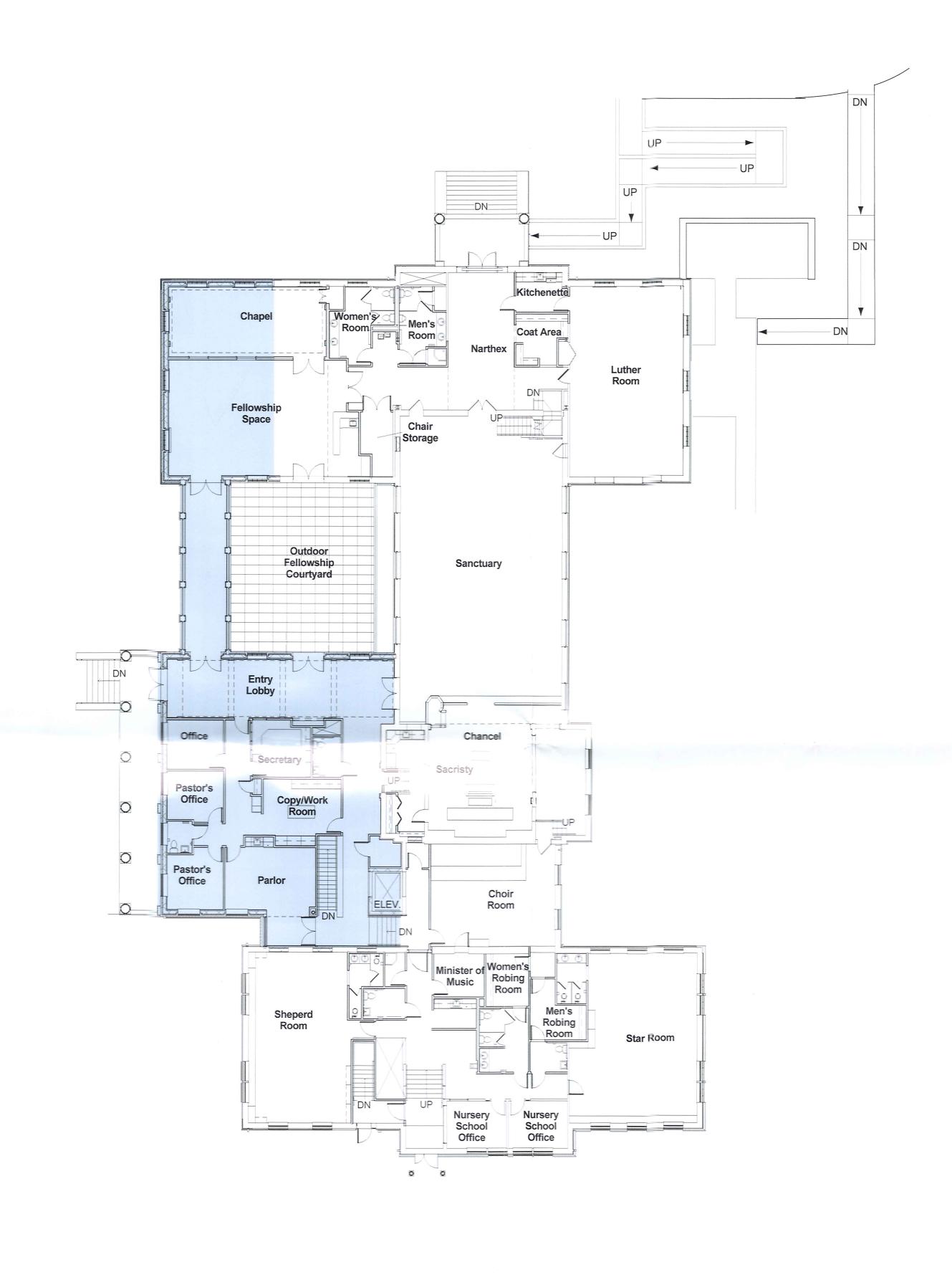

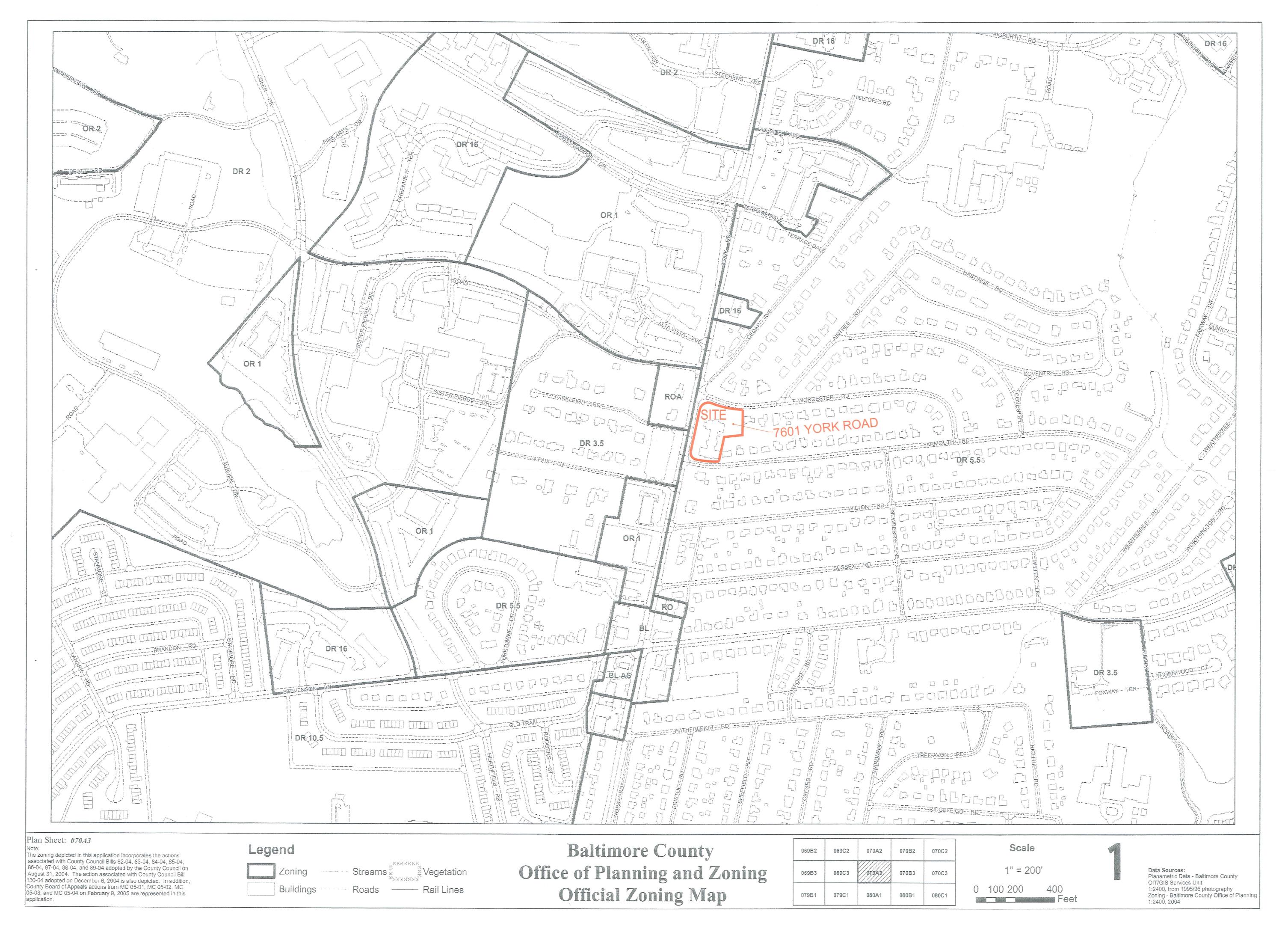
