ORDER OF DISMISSAL

This case comes to the Board on appeal from the Opinion and Order issued by the Administrative Law Judge dated August 18, 2014 wherein the requested Petition for Special Hearing pursuant to Section 500.7 of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations (BCZR), to approve temporary outdoor model car racing, on specific dates, in the shopping center parking lot, as an accessory use to a hobby shop was granted with conditions.

On September 15, 2014, J. Carroll Holzer, Esquire filed a Notice of Appeal on behalf of Kevin Arnold, Appellant/Protestant. The Petitioners were represented by Louis E. Grenzer, Jr., Esquire at the hearing before the Administrative Law Judge.

A hearing was scheduled to be held before this Board on Wednesday, January 7, 2015 at 10:00 a.m. and a Notice of Assignment was issued on October 9, 2014. On November 24, 2014, Mr. Holzer, requested a postponement of the January 7, 2015 hearing date as he was previously scheduled to be in Oral Argument at the Court of Special Appeals. Mr. Holzer's request for postponement was granted and a Notice of Postponement and Reassignment was issued rescheduling the hearing in this matter for Wednesday, February 4, 2015 at 10:00 a.m.

On January 27, 2015, Louis E. Grenzer, Jr., Esquire filed a Notice of Withdrawal of Appearance. Consent to the Notice of Withdrawal was signed by Gordon Ross, Member of Hobbie

On February 4, 2015, representatives of Hobbie Guyz, appeared at a hearing before the Board without an attorney. After much discussion, all parties and the Board agreed to postpone this matter to allow Hobbie Guyz, LLC t/a Middle River Hobbies to retain new counsel. A subsequent hearing was scheduled for Tuesday, April 21, 2015 at 10:00 a.m., for which a Notice of Postponement and Reassignment was issued on February 6, 2015.

On April 21, 2015, the Board convened at 10:10 a.m. for the rescheduled hearing. J. Carroll Holzer, Esquire, and the Appellant/Protestant, Kevin Arnold, appeared before the Board; however, no representative from Hobbie Guyz was present and no one from Hobbie Guyz called to notify the Board that its representative would be delayed. In open hearing and on the record, attorney for the Appellant/Protestant moved for dismissal because representatives from Hobbie Guyz failed to appear. Upon consideration of the prior postponements and representatives of Hobbie Guyz's failure to appear at the hearing and its failure to notify the Board that its representatives would be late, the Appellant/Protestant's Motion to Dismiss the Petition for Special Hearing was granted.

OPINION AND ORDER

This matter comes before the Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH) for consideration of a Petition for Special Hearing filed on behalf of Carroll Island Associates, LP, legal owner and Middle River Hobbies, lessee ("Petitioners"). The Special Hearing was filed pursuant to § 500.7 of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations ("B.C.Z.R.") to approve temporary outdoor model car racing, on specific dates, in the shopping center parking lot, as an accessory use to a hobby shop.

Appearing at the public hearing in support of the requests was Gordon Ross, proprietor of the hobby shop. Louis Grenzer, Jr., Esq., represented the Petitioner. Peter Zimmerman, People's Counsel, participated in the case and opposed the relief. The Petition was advertised and posted as required by the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations. There were no substantive Zoning Advisory Committee (ZAC) comments received.

A petition for special hearing is in an essence a proceeding for a declaratory judgment.

Antwerpen v. Baltimore County, 163 Md. App. 194 (2005). That is, the Petitioner asks for a determination that its activities are lawful under the B.C.Z.R.

The subject property is 20.44 acres in size and is zoned BL. The property is improved with a strip shopping center and Wal-Mart store, and is located near the intersection of Bowley's

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Quarters and Carroll Island Roads in eastern Baltimore County. Mr. Ross operates Middle River Hobbies, LLC, a store in the Carroll Island Shopping Center that sells a variety of merchandise including remote or radio ("RC") controlled cars. RC cars are small scale replica vehicles that are raced on a variety of surfaces, including carpet, dirt and pavement. The Petitioner conducts indoor races on carpet at his shop, and also operates an outdoor "track" on a seldom used parking lot at the periphery of the shopping center. Though the outdoor racing has been put on hold due to this case, the Petitioner previously held events on Saturdays during the months of April-September. Following complaints from an adjoining owner, the County insisted that Petitioner stop the events and this proceeding was then filed.

Petitioner seeks a determination that the outdoor racing is a lawful use which is "accessory" to the operation of his hobby shop, a point on which the parties disagree. As such, the use must be examined to determine whether it qualifies as "accessory" as that term is defined in B.C.Z.R. §101.1. People's Counsel urges that before this analysis is undertaken, we must categorize or define the specific use at issue.

Mr. Zimmerman contends this is a "racetrack," a term not defined under the B.C.Z.R. The Webster's Third New International Dictionary definition of "racetrack" references an "oval course over which races are run." This would not describe the use here, where the temporary race track (the contours of which are defined by concrete curbs and PVC tubing positioned on the parking lot) is not oval, but consists of a series of twists and turns. But even more fundamentally, I do not believe the operation can be classified as a racetrack because there are absolutely no structures or physical improvements to the land, and I believe the B.C.Z.R. contemplates a "racetrack" as being a venue of some sort with infrastructure and accommodations for spectators, as one would find at the Timonium State Fairgrounds.

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In addition, as noted in Petitioner's memorandum, the B.C.Z.R. identifies (in excluding the use from the definition of "commercial recreational facilities") a "go-cart course" (not "track") which must obviously be something other than a "racetrack," or else the reference would be mere surplussage. Though it too is not defined, I believe that the reference to "go-cart course" indicates that the B.C.Z.R. contemplates a use or venue where racing is conducted that does not constitute a "racetrack." Although the RC car racing does not constitute a "go-cart course," this analysis does in my opinion establish that the use is not a "racetrack" either.

In my opinion, the use defies rigid categorization under the B.C.Z.R. It is a relatively modern, niche land use that post-dates the adoption of the BCZR. Further, I do not believe it is necessary to ascribe any particular name to the activity, since we are evaluating an accessory rather than principal use. The B.C.Z.R. is considered an inclusionary zoning code; i.e., if a use is not expressly permitted by right or special exception in a zone it is excluded. Kowalski v. Lamar, 25 Md. App. 493 (1975). But this maxim concerns "principal" not "accessory" uses. In fact, I believe the rule is otherwise with respect to accessory uses. In Carroll County v. Zent, 86 Md. App. 745, 769 (1991), the court held that when a use is incidental to the principal use "it is an accessory use and, unless expressly prohibited by statute, is permitted."

Accessory uses are not catalogued in the BCZR in the same way as principal uses, nor could they be. As stated in a well-known treatise, "the perception of which accessory uses are considered 'customary' changes with the times." 2 Rathkopf's, The Law of Zoning and Planning, § 33:3. This may explain why in 1973 a New York court ruled that a helipad was not an accessory use to the operation of a department store, while in 1978 a New Jersey court found that such a heliport was an accessory use to a construction firm's headquarters, based upon the fact that helicopter usage was gaining widespread acceptance among business executives. *Compare*

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Gray v. Ward, 343 N.Y.S.2d 749 (1973) with State v. P.T.& L. Constr., Inc., 389 A.2d 448 (N.J. 1978).

Under the B.C.Z.R., an "accessory use" is defined as follows:

ACCESSORY USE OR STRUCTURE

A use or structure which: (a) is customarily incident and subordinate to and serves a principal use or structure; (b) is subordinate in area, extent or purpose to the principal use or structure; (c) is located on the same lot as the principal use or structure served; and (d) contributes to the comfort, convenience or necessity of occupants, business or industry in the principal use or structure served[.]

The terminology used in this definition is relatively straight forward. But there is a dearth of Md. case law concerning accessory uses, which means that out of state cases will be consulted to aid in the interpretation.

In this case, Mr. Ross testified that he is familiar with the operation of hobby shops around the country and that it is customary for such shops to conduct RC racing in conjunction with their business. He cited several examples, yet conceded his is the only such outdoor use in Maryland. But even though a use is not necessarily widespread, it can nonetheless be "customarily incident" to the principal operation. In Lake County v. LaSalle Natl. Bank, 395 N.E.2d 392 (Ill. 1979), the court considered whether temporary housing for groundskeepers was an accessory use to a golf course. The court held that it was, and stressed that the petitioner did not need to show that most, or even many, golf courses featured such housing. The court found that an accessory use can be sustained if it constitutes a "recognized mode of activity in the field." In addition to Mr. Ross's testimony, a cursory Google search revealed several RC car sales (i.e., hobby shops) operations being conducted in conjunction with indoor and outdoor race courses. Thus, I think it is fair to characterize it as a "recognized mode of activity in the field," and I believe the Petitioner has satisfied this element.

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The next issue is whether the racing use is subordinate in "area, extent or purpose." These elements are stated in the disjunctive; any one would suffice. As such, even though the racing and spectator areas arguably occupy a larger land area (which is not dispositive), it seems clear the racing events held one day a week for less than half the year would qualify as subordinate in extent and/or purpose to the hobby shop operation, which occupies 7,000 SF of commercial space and is open nearly every day of the year according to the proprietor. Mamaroneck Beach & Yacht Club, Inc. v. Zoning Board, 862 N.Y.S.2d 81 (2008)(accessory use can be larger in square footage than principal structures on site). Whether viewed temporally or financially, the hobby shop is clearly the principal operation. Thus, this element is also satisfied.

The B.C.Z.R. also requires the accessory use to be located on the same lot as the principal use. In this case, both the site plan for the shopping center and the site plan for the zoning case (Petitioner's Exhibit Nos. 1& 2) reveal that this is indeed the case. Finally, based on the testimony of the race participants and shop patrons, I find the racing use serves the "comfort" and/or "convenience" of the hobby shop business and its customers.

One recent unreported case from Connecticut provides further support for the proposition that a race course is an accessory use to a business that sells RC cars. In Sorrentino v. Ives, 2010 WL 626086 (Conn. 2010), the owner (Kenneth Ives) operated an RV sales business that also sold ATVs and RC cars. Mr. Ives constructed both "off road" and "on pavement" racing facilities in the parking lot area at the rear of his lot. The race facilities involved "extensive construction" and a two-story grandstand. The town zoning commission "determined [the race facility] to be a permissible accessory use." Id. at 3. But it was subsequently determined the property was split zoned and that the race course was located in a rural residential zone rather than a business zone.

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As such, the owner was then obliged to seek a change in zoning district classification (which was denied), and was not permitted to conduct the races in the residential zone.

Two witnesses testified in opposition to the Petitioner's request. Kevin Arnold, who lives immediately adjacent to the parking lot on which the races are held, testified that the events are noisy and disruptive. He stated that attendees frequently argue and use profanity, and also urinate/defecate in the bushes next door to his home. Dan Mearkle, who dates Mr. Arnold's sister (but lives some distance from the subject property), testified that the events cause traffic snares when patrons of the shopping center slow down to take a look at the racing. He also presented a short video that he took on his I-phone which showed the cars racing around the course.

As noted by Petitioner, Mr. Arnold operates a boat repair business at his property, which is zoned B.L., pursuant to a special exception granted in Case # 99-311-X. In that Order then Zoning Commissioner Schmidt noted that the "area at large is commercial in character." The special exception in that case was granted despite the objection of the Department (then Office) of Planning, which did not feel that the business (which "operates 6 days a week, Monday through Saturday from 7:00 A.M. thru 10:00 P.M.") was appropriate at the location.

On cross examination, Mr. Arnold confirmed that he operates and repairs boat engines on his property, and he said they make as much noise as an automobile engine. My point in mentioning this is that the area in question is certainly commercial (a large Wal-Mart store anchors the shopping center at the location) and businesses and activities are conducted in those environs that generate noise and other disturbances that may be objectionable if conducted in a residential zone. While there are residential zones adjoining the subject property, Mr. Arnold was the only nearby resident to testify at the hearing, and the file does not contain any letters of

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complaint or opposition from other neighbors in the area. In addition, other than Mr. Mearkle's testimony there was no evidence or testimony presented to show that the traffic problems described impacted motorists along the adjoining roadways or generated calls for service to the police department. In addition, none of the other tenants at the shopping center testified or submitted comments indicating the racing was negatively impacting their businesses, and the owner of the shopping center advised that it does "not oppose the racing on our property." As such, I do not believe that the use has the potential for the range of detrimental impacts described by the Protestants. See Kaiser v. Western R/C Flyers, Inc., 477 N.W.2d 557 (Neb. 1991)(noise from RC airplanes, although annoying to residents, did not constitute a nuisance).

None of this is meant to dismiss the concerns raised by Messrs. Arnold and Zimmerman. But I believe those concerns can be ameliorated (even if not eliminated) by the imposition of restrictive conditions, which will be included in the Order which follows. The approved development plan for the shopping center (PDM #XV-760) was not submitted by either of the parties, and the site plans do not indicate the exact setback between the parking lot and Mr. Arnold's property line. Both properties are zoned commercial, and there does not appear to be any landscape strip, fencing or other screening between the properties. Such feature(s) would not only provide a buffer for the racing events but would also screen Mr. Arnold's property from the parking lot itself, which though zoned B.L. is his primary residence.

THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED this <u>18th</u> day of August 2014, by this Administrative Law Judge, that the Petition for Special Hearing pursuant to § 500.7 of the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations ("B.C.Z.R) to approve temporary outdoor model car racing, on specific dates, in the shopping center parking lot, as an accessory use to a hobby shop, be and is hereby

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GRANTED.

The relief granted herein shall be subject to the following:

1. Petitioners may apply for appropriate permits and be granted same upon receipt of this Order; however, Petitioners are hereby made aware that proceeding at this time is at their own risk until such time as the 30-day appellate process from this Order has expired. If, for whatever reason, this Order is reversed, Petitioners would be required to return, and be responsible for returning, said property to its original condition.

2. RC car racing shall be permitted from May 1-August 31. The races shall be held no more than one time per week, on a Saturday or Sunday. While administrative activities (i.e., registration or course marking) in connection with the races may begin at 8:00 A.M., operation of RC cars for whatever reason (i.e, racing, practice, repairs, etc.) shall be restricted to the hours of 10:00 A.M.-5:00 P.M. All activities of any nature in connection with the RC racing shall be concluded by no later than 7:00 P.M.

3. Petitioners must provide a landscape strip, fence or other screening between the parking lot and Mr. Arnold's property. The type of screening required will be determined in the sole discretion of the County's Landscape Architect.

Any appeal of this decision must be made within thirty (30) days of the date of this Order.

POST HEARING MEMORANDUM OF MIDDLE RIVER HOBBIES, LLC

OFFICE OF AUMINISTRATIVE HEARINGS

Middle River Hobbies, LLC ("Middle River"), by its undersigned counsel, hereby submits this Post Hearing Memorandum in support of its Petition under Section 500.7 of the Baltimore County Zoning Code to determine whether the holding of temporary outdoor model car racing on specific dates in the shopping center parking lot servicing 164 Carroll Island Road constitutes an accessory use to Middle River's hobby shop located at the same location. As stated under section 100.1, the zoning ordinance is promulgated "[f]or the purpose of promoting the health, security, comfort, convenience, prosperity, orderly development and other aspects of the general welfare of the community, zones are intended to provide broad regulation of the use and manner of use of land, in accordance with comprehensive plans." We should not abrogate the free use of land. County Comm'rs v. Zent, 86 Md. App. 745 (1991).

Background

At the hearing on this matter evidence was provided to evaluate the temporary model car racing as an accessory use. We submit this evidence here.

Mr. Ross operates a hobby shop known as Middle River Hobbies at 164 Carroll Island Road. The shop is a retail store of approximately 7000 square feet contained within a strip mall type facility. The retail store is located in a 17-acre center at the head of the Bowleys Quarters peninsula. The zone is B.L. (Business-Local). The retail store sells numerous hobby items, but specializes in model remote control merchandise. In addition to the 7000 square foot shop, Middle River has also secured the use of another space in the shopping center of approximately 12,000 square feet. Therefore, the total indoor space of the hobby shop is approximately 19,000 square feet.

Mr. Ross coordinates temporary outdoor model car racing adjacent to his store. The activity is seasonal from approximately April to September, weather permitting. Events take place on once a week Saturday or Sunday running from the morning until the late afternoon.

Average attendance at the events is about 30 to 50, including children and adults of all ages.

The area used for the temporary outdoor model car racing is contained within an approximately 9000 square foot area of the existing shopping center parking lot. The model cars are bound mostly by existing parking lot curbs while select turns are marked by temporary PVC-type tubing. Parking for the shopping center serves as parking for the event participants and spectators. It is common for participants to set up portable, temporary 10' X 10' tents for protection from the sun. The temporary model car racing allows for customers of Middle River Hobbies to practice and test merchandise purchased at the store. The outdoor location allows for community and family enjoyment at a comfortable venue.

Definition of Racetrack

People's Counsel suggested at the hearing that Middle River's temporary use of the parking lot for model car racing constitutes a racetrack. Unfortunately, the Baltimore County Zoning Regualtions provide no specific definition of "Racetrack." Further, the definition of

"racetrack" provided by Webster's Third New International Dictionary as "a usually oval course over which races are run esp.; a dirt track for flat or harness races" does not appear to be helpful in this context. Under this broad brush definition, any time a group of children run around a neighborhood yard or ride bikes in a driveway in a test of speed could result in the property owner being cited for operating an illegal "racetrack." One can hardly conceive of the County intending such a result.

Therefore, we must look to the overall intent and spirit of the zoning regulations. The BCZR Section 100.1 definition of "commercial recreational facilities" specifically limits a commercial recreational facility to not include a go-cart course. While it is apparent that a go-cart course maintains a closer connection to a traditional vehicle racetrack then model car racing, the drafters of the zoning regulations found it necessary to specifically distinguish a go-cart course. This is indicative of a view that a go-cart track is something distinguishable and less than a "racetrack" as meant under the zoning regulations. If the zoning regulations did not intend to define a go-cart course as a racetrack, then certainly a model car racing course would likewise not be a racetrack.

Accessory Use

We address the contention that the temporary outdoor model car racing is not an accessory use to the principal use of the subject property as a hobby shop. The People's Counsel suggested at the hearing that temporary outdoor model car racing is neither a specifically permitted nor conditional use in the B.L. zone. The rationale follows that use not specifically enumerated or allowed by a conditional use is not permitted. People's Counsel relies on Kowalski v. Lamar 25 MD. App 493 (1975), however, Kowalski was decided without

consideration of an accessory use as the evidence, "[t]he record here unequivocally establishes that the subject property is vacant, contains no buildings or structures, is not served by water or sewer facilities, and is not equipped with any electrical service. It has no use other than those authorized and permitted by the owner, all of which are associated with the berthing, storage, maintenance and launching of boats, as well as the fishing activities previously described. Thus, the record establishes that at the present time the only uses of the subject property are the uses of which the appellant complains. Under these circumstances such uses constitute the main or principal uses of the subject property. They do not and cannot fall within the ambit of the definition of an accessory use." Id. at 500.

Under the ordinance, accessory uses or structures are permitted in the B.L. zone.

People's Counsel pointed out at the hearing that the examples contained in Section 230.1.A.11 of an accessory use does not include model car racing¹ and, therefore, suggests that such use is prohibited. To accept the argument of the People's Counsel, we must conclude that, because Baltimore County did not include temporary model car racing or any other use in the "including" portion of Section 230.1.A.11, it intended to prohibit such uses in the B.L. zone. Our goal in construing a zoning ordinance is to discover legislative intent. The People's Counsel's construction of the ordinance runs counter to the settled rule that an accessory use need not derive from the express terms of the ordinance; an accessory use is implied as a matter of law as a right which accompanies the principal use. 2 Arden H. and Daren A. Rathkopf, The Law of Zoning and Planning 23.01 at 23-6 (4th ed. 1985). The proposition is stated as:

¹ Section 230.1.A.11 states that "Accessory uses or structures, including signs (See Section 450), garages and parking spaces for the use; of owners, employees, tenants and invitees. A maximum of six coin operated children's rides are permitted as an accessory use."

The term accessory use as used by the courts may be predicated upon the specific provision relating to accessory uses found in the ordinance, or may be based upon the concept that whether or not the ordinance provides for accessory use, the litigated use is one so customarily incidental to the principal use of the zoning lot that it is, as a matter of law, a part of the permitted use. Ibid. In County Comm'rs v. Zent, 86 Md. App. 745 (1991), "[t]he Court of Appeals, in discussing zoning ordinances generally, has said:

Such ordinances are in derogation of the common law right to so use private property as to realize its highest utility, and while they should be liberally construed to accomplish their plain purpose and intent, they should not be extended by implication to cases not clearly within the scope of the purpose and intent manifest in their language." Landay v. Bd. of Zoning Appeals, 173 Md. 460, 466, 196 A. 293 (1938) (citation omitted, emphasis added). See also Aspen Hill Venture v. Mont. Co., 265 Md. 303, 313-14, 289 A.2d 303 (1972); Canada's Tavern, Inc. v. Glen Echo, 260 Md. 206, 218, 271 A.2d 664 (1970); Gino's of Md., Inc. v. Mayor of Baltimore City, 250 Md. 621, 642, 244 A.2d 218 (1968); Accord Borough of Northvale v. Blundo, 85 N.J.Super. 56, 59, 203 A.2d 721 (App.Div. 1964) (even if the zoning ordinance does not speak "in terms of a use accessory to the residence use, an accessory use must ordinarily be implied — as a matter of law — as a right which accompanies the principal use")

It is significant that the zoning ordinance provides a general definition of an "accessory use" as one which is: (a) is customarily incident and subordinate to and serves a principal use or structure; (b) is subordinate in area, extent or purpose to the principal use or structure; (c) is located on the same lot as the principal use or structure served; and (d) contributes to the comfort, convenience or necessity of occupants, business or industry in the principal use or structure served. Inclusion of this definition suggests that Baltimore County intended to extend permitted accessory uses beyond those itemized in the B.L. zone, provided that the proposed use satisfies the four prong test under the definition. A determination otherwise renders the general

definition of accessory use superfluous. While no relevant MD cases address this specific issue, the Supreme Court of New Jersey addressed a similar zoning ordinance in State v. P.T. & L. Constr. Co., 77 N.J. 20, 24-26, 389 A.2d 448 (1978). Plaintiff sought plan approval for the installation of a heliport as an accessory use to its construction company headquarters. The zone permitted accessory uses if the use was customarily incident and subordinate to the permitted use and not in violation of the provision "set forth herein." Id. at 25, 389 A.2d 448. The ordinance stated: "the following accessory uses are permitted," and itemized eleven specific accessory uses. Heliports were not included on the list although they were permitted in other zones as permitted uses. Ibid. The municipality advanced the same argument as People's Counsel, that all uses not expressly permitted in the zone are prohibited in that the list of accessory uses specified in the zone is exclusive. Id. at 26, 389 A.2d 448. The Court found in favor of the applicant's contrary argument that the allowance of accessory uses in general terms was intended to extend beyond the eleven specific uses enumerated. The Court said, "that under the borough's proposed construction of the ordinance the introductory proviso alluding to 'customarily incident' accessory uses would be meaningless as mere surplusage." Ibid. The Court found:

The argument goes on to aver that the itemization of specific accessory uses was intended only to provide examples of valid accessory uses for the ease of administration of the ordinance. This is persuasive. Otherwise any number of other uses, unquestionably incident to the main use as a matter of custom or convenience, would automatically be disqualified. [Ibid]

We find the same issue here, the definition of accessory use in the ordinance would be irrelevant if only permitted and itemized accessory uses are allowed. We contend that a variety of accessory uses may be permitted as a matter of law.

As stated above, the ordinance provides a general definition of an "accessory use" as one which is: (a) is customarily incident and subordinate to and serves a principal use or structure; (b) is subordinate in area, extent or purpose to the principal use or structure; (c) is located on the same lot as the principal use or structure served; and (d) contributes to the comfort, convenience or necessity of occupants, business or industry in the principal use or structure served.

There is no dispute that the temporary model car racing events are held on the same lot as the hobby shop. The temporary model car racing contributes to the comfort, convenience and necessity of the hobby shop and its customers. The temporary model car racing is customarily incident and subordinate to Middle River Hobbies. The temporary racing operation is held seasonally, only on the weekends. Its use is subordinate. The temporary model car racing operation is subordinate in size, extent or purpose to Middle River Hobbies. As stated above, Middle River occupies approximately 19,000 square feet of indoor space at the shopping center. This is significantly larger in size then the outdoor area 9000 square feet.² In addition the purpose of the temporary model car racing is to provide a venue for customers to test, utilize and view merchandise subordinate to the principal use of Middle River Hobbies of selling merchandise. The extent of the temporary model car racing is limited temporarily from April to September and only on weekends during daylight hours. The extent is, therefore, subordinate.

As noted in County Comm'rs v. Zent 86 Md. App. 745 there is a dearth of case law in Maryland dealing with accessory use. There the Court relied upon cases from other jurisdictions

² While People's Counsel suggests that the size of the accessory use is substantially larger due to the "parking area" used, it should be noted that said parking area is a parking lot. In other words, the participants are parking vehicles in an area specifically designated as a parking lot. Middle River would note that a parking lot is a permitted use in a B.L. Zone.

to find the storage of decommissioned vehicles an accessory use to a dairy farm. Id. We rely on Zent in determining the appropriate application of the four-prong test to characterize an accessory use. The storage of decommissioned vehicles encompassed a significant area of the property but was found an accessory use. Additionally, it was without question that, had the decommissioned vehicles been stored on an alternate location not affiliated with the dairy farm, the storage of the vehicles would have been prohibited as a salvage yard which was not permitted under the zoning regulations applicable in Zent. However, the fact that the storage of the decommissioned vehicles was specifically to service the dairy farm made it an accessory and, thus, permitted use.

Because an accessory use must be "incidental and subordinate" to the principal use, the magnitude of the principal use must be greater than that of the accessory use. The principal use must be proportionally larger, or more important, or more functionally central, than the accessory use. There is no "bright line" standard as to when an accessory use becomes so large or so important as to veer into the territory of "principal uses." See, National Cathedral Neighborhood Ass'n. v. D.C. Board of Zoning Adjustment, 753 A.2d 984, 986 (D.C. 2000) (83,160 square foot athletic facility was found an accessory use to a school); Simmons v. Zoning Board of Appeals of Newburyport, 60 Mass. App. Ct. 5 (Mass. 2003) (owning and stabling three horses was an accessory use to a residence).

The temporary model car racing meets all of the requirements of an accessory use and as a matter of law should be deemed a permitted use in the B.L. zone.

Adverse Land Use Impacts

People's Counsel asserted several particular adverse land use impacts at hearing. Mr.

Arnold testified relating to noise impacts from the engines. However, it is clear due to the earlier

Code Enforcement proceeding that Baltimore County Code Enforcement visited the site and noted adverse noise impacts. There is no denying remote car racing creates noise, but the determination of whether that noise rises to the level of nuisance was investigated by the Baltimore County office of zoning and was found to be incidental. Further, Mr. Arnold presented evidence through the video of an actual model car event held at the property of the noise level created by the model car racing. A review of the video revealed that the noise produced by the model cars was minimal. In fact, during the video it was easy to discern spectators holding normal conversations and birds chirping as the model cars operated. If continued noise complaints from a single resident are an obstacle to the acceptance of temporary model car racing, a response could be permissible time restrictions on the permitted accessory use, but not denial.

The issue of traffic congestion was also discussed at the hearing. However, based on the evidence presented, it appears that this was a single event. Further, evidence was presented as to Middle River's actions to remedy this issue. Lastly, evidence as to the lack of portable bathrooms at this site was presented, as was evidence that bathroom locations inside the hobby shop are used by attendees. We need not downplay these as potential issues, they are. They are also curable issues and should not restrict the free use of land.

Conclusion

Respectfully, Middle River Hobbies, LLC requests that the temporary outdoor model car racing meets the stipulations of an accessory use under the zoning ordinance and should be permitted in a B.L. zone.

- 8. If this Racing gets any bigger there will be no room for customers of the Carroll Island Shopping Center.

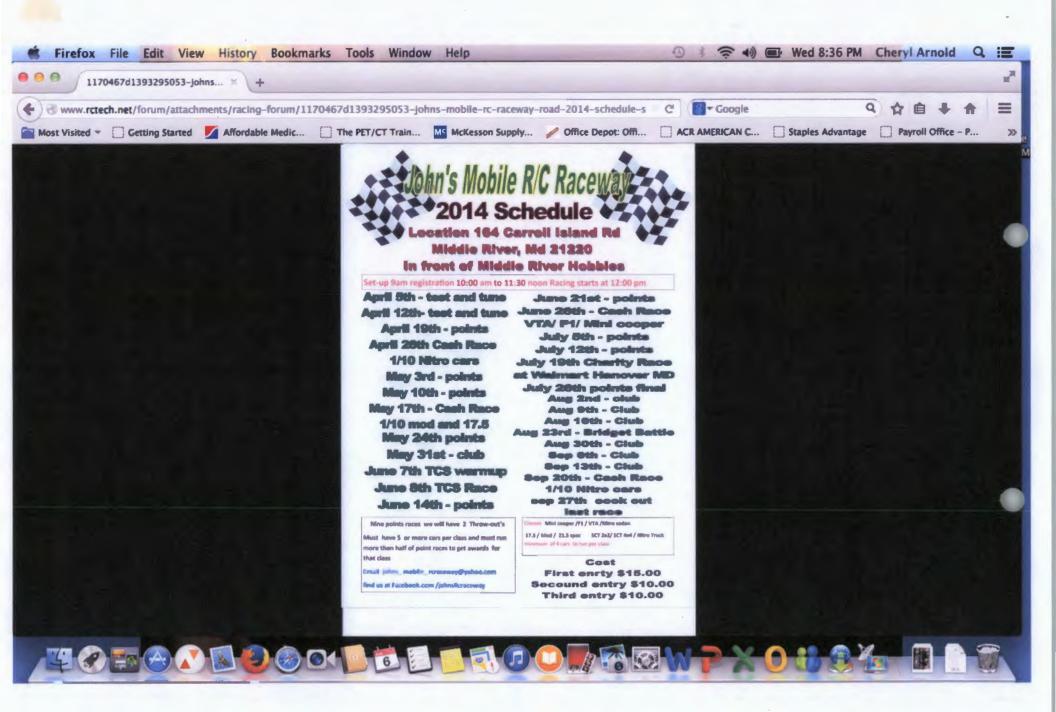

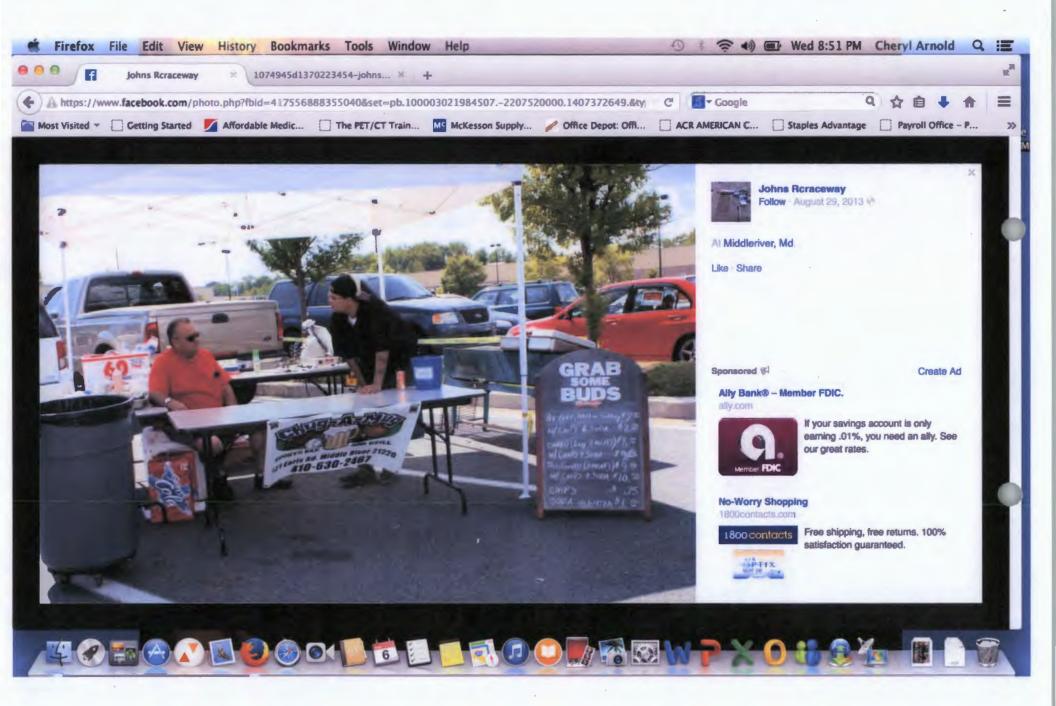

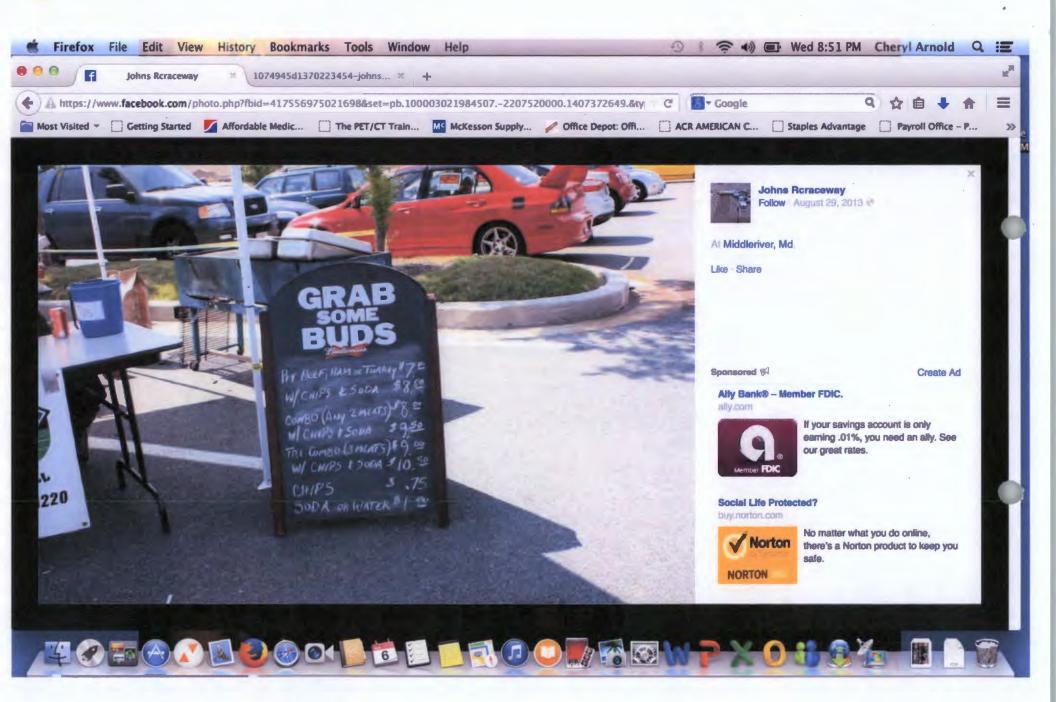

PEOPLE'S COUNSEL FOR BALTIMORE COUNTY'S POST-HEARING MEMORANDUM

Hobbie Guyz, LLC t/a Middle River Hobbies' petition is for a special hearing:

"For approval of temporary outdoor model car racing, on specific dates, in the shopping center parking lot, as an accessory use to a hobby shop."

The location is Carroll Island Shopping Center, a 17-acre center at the head of Bowleys Quarters peninsula. It is anchored by a Wal-Mart, and there is a strip of stores, including the hobby shop known as Middle River Hobbies. The zone is B.L. (Business-Local).

This case sparked our attention for a number of reasons. To begin, it is a case of first impression in Baltimore County concerning the zoning of a use involving an on-road racing operation for radio-controlled or "R/C" cars. Indeed, the evidence is that this is the only one of its kind currently operational in Maryland. It also turns out, so far as we can tell, that there is no reported judicial opinion on this exact type of use. The closest we can find are cases involving midget racing, snowmobiles, motocross, and ATVs.

The case also sparked our attention because, under the zoning regulations, the most accurate description of the use appeared to be a "racetrack" or possibly a "commercial recreation facility." Neither of these are permitted in the B.L. Zone. We had in mind the description of the course for racing model cars and common English language usage. We also noted the petition's reference to "model car racing," the site plan description of "Portable R/C Model Race Track," and the freestanding sign for "Middle River Hobbies and Raceway." In this context, a petitioner is ordinarily bound by its petition. People's Counsel v. Mangione 85 Md. App. 738 (1991). It is also

noteworthy that Kevin Arnold subsequently submitted copies of the 2013 and 2014 schedules for "John's Mobile R/C Raceway."

Nevertheless, as Judge Beverungen observed at the August 1, 2014 hearing, where a use is not defined in the regulations, BCZR Section 101.1 directs us to Webster's Third New International Dictionary. So, we will assume for the sake of argument that the petitioners' own description is not binding. We shall take an objective look at the facts, apply the dictionary definition, and try to identify the use as accurately as possible.

Correlatively, the case also sparked our attention because, whatever name we assign to the use, its character, size, and scale are such as to take it way beyond any reasonable description of an "accessory use," whether to a hobby shop, shopping center, or anything else.

The background and provenance of the petition were also noteworthy. Kevin Arnold, who resides and operates a marine repair business at 210 Bowleys Quarters Road immediately adjacent to the racing operation, filed a zoning complaint. Eventually, county zoning inspector Joshua Homan inspected the operation and issued citations. There followed negotiations between Assistant County Attorney Brady Locher and Hobbie Guyz, LLC's then attorney, Andrew Grenzer. Gordon Ross was and is the principal owner of Hobbie Guyz.

There was a July 2, 2014 hearing before ALJ Lawrence Stahl. The parties advised him they were in negotiations. This led to a July 9 Settlement Agreement, and a July 15 Order by Judge Stahl, accepting and incorporating the Agreement.

As part of the Agreement, Hobbie Guyz, LLC agreed to file a zoning petition. They actually filed this petition on June 17, while negotiations were apparently ongoing. Ironically, despite the issuance of zoning citations by the enforcement division, it appears that county zoning office staff helped Gordon Ross to fill out the zoning petition and come up with the idea of an "accessory use." This reflects the inclination of cooperative staff to assist property owners if at all possible, in contrast to the approach of the enforcement division to try to understand and evaluate complaints.

In any event, regardless of these mixed messages from different county divisions, the task before us is to perform an objective legal analysis.

Consistent with our view of the case's importance, we submitted a letter dated July 24, 2014 expressing our preliminary thought process. After that, under the circumstances, we thought it would be fair and reasonable to attend the August 1, 2014 hearing, consider the facts presented by petitioners, ask questions, and present such facts as we could briefly assemble, including online research on R/C Car activities and racetracks. While we had fairly strong views that the use amounts to a racetrack and, by whatever name, is not an accessory use, we approached with an open mind to listen to all the witnesses.

With the hearing now complete, and expanding on our comments at the end of the afternoon, we submit this memorandum. We still submit the most accurate description of the use is that it is a type of racetrack use, although we shall consider other possible names. We also submit that whatever name is assigned to the use, it does not qualify as an accessory use because of its character, size, scale, and problematic aspects.

The public interest in the case has increased as the case evolved. The scope of review spans several levels. On a global level, if we can call it that, the case is a kind of laboratory for the legal process to identify and name controversial zoning uses and evaluate whether they amount to principal or accessory uses. In contrast, on the most specific level, we focus on the actual use in the Carroll Island Shopping Center. But the evaluation of the specific use must not lose sight of the context. There must be an evaluation of how this use fits generally in relation to shops, shopping centers, and the B.L. Zone. There also must be kept in mind, in relation to all these issues, the extent to which it is relevant that this type of use is problematic – not only in the situation here, but also as a general matter.

These questions are interrelated. Nevertheless, in the interest of an organized presentation, we shall divide our discussion according to the following questions:

1. Conceptually, what is the proper way to identify and name the use, what is the relationship of the name to differentiation of principal and accessory uses, and what are the criteria for evaluating the differences?

- 2. What use best describes, identifies, and names the R/C model car use here, and what are the consequences, if any, for its status as principal or accessory?
- 3. How does the on-road R/C car use fit generally in the B.L. Zone?
- 4. What is the relevance of the intense and problematic nature of the use?

I. Identification and Naming of the Use, and the Consequences

"Tse-Lu said, 'The ruler of Wei has been waiting for you, in order with you to administer the government. What will you consider the first thing to be done?'"

"The Master replied, 'What is necessary is to rectify names ... If names be not correct, language is not in accordance with the truth of things. If language be not in accordance with the truth of things, affairs cannot be carried on to success." Confucius, Analects, Book 13, Verse 3

As noted in our July 24, 2014 letter, the structure of the zoning law is based on the enumeration and listing of named uses permitted by right or special exception. BCZR Section 102.1; Kowalski v. Lamar 25 Md. App. 493 (1975); People's Counsel v. Surina 400 Md. 662 (2007). As Judge Rita Davidson explained,

"These sections established that the only uses permitted in the R.D.P. zone are those designated as uses permitted as of right and uses permitted by special exception. Any use other than those permitted and being carried on as of right or by special exception are prohibited." 25 Md. App. at 498.

As a framework for identification and naming of uses, BCZR Section 101.1 includes definitions of specific uses. It includes, among other things, a general definition for "Accessory use or structure," quoted in our July 24 letter. There is also a definition of "Principal use," which is simply: "A main use of land, as distinguished from an accessory use."

Inevitably, there are many uses for which BCZR Section 101.1 does not provide a definition. As the judge observed at the conclusion of the hearing, the law then refers us to Webster's Third New International Dictionary. There is no BCZR Section 101.1 definition of racetrack, so we shall go to the dictionary to see how it applies. We shall also consider other potential names. It is our view that every use must first be named as accurately as possible.

Then, there is the matter of differentiating principal and accessory uses. Every zone in the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations begins with an identification of principal uses. The B.L. zone follows this pattern.

It may be overlooked, however, that almost every zone also includes a listing of specific accessory uses. The B.L. Zone is one of these zones.

We shall evaluate the B.L. Zone situation more specifically in our discussion of this particular racing activity. At this juncture, we shall add context by surveying the treatment of accessory uses in other zones.

The R.C. 2 (Agricultural) Zone lists eleven specific accessory uses or groups of such uses in BCZR Sec.1A01.2.B.9.; the R.C. 3 Zone, eight, BCZR Section 1A01.2.A.12; the R.C. 4 and R.C. 5, Zones, seven, BCZR Sections 1A03.3.A.9, 1A04.2.A.11; the R.C. 6, R.C. 7, and R.C. 8 Zones, six, BCZR Sections 1A07.3.A.7, 1A08.3.A.7, 1A09.3.A.7; and the R.C. 20 and R.C. 50 Zones, three, BCZR Section 1A05.2.F. Interestingly, the R.C.C. (Rural Commercial) Zone lists six types or groups of accessory commercial uses, including intermittent outdoor sales. BCZR 1A06.2.C.

The Density-Residential (D.R.) Zones also list seven specific accessory uses. BCZR Sec. 1B01.1.A.18. The R.A.E. 1 and R.A.E. 2 (Residence, Apartment, Elevator) Zones also list specific accessory uses. BCZR Sections 200.2.A.5, 201.2.A.5.

The O.R. 1 (Office-Residential) Zone lists six "accessory commercial" uses within buildings by right and three by special exception. BCZR Sec. 205.3.A.3, 205.3.B.2. The O.R. 2 Zone also lists accessory uses. BCZR Sections 206.3.A.3, 206.3.B.2, with the O-3 (Office Park) Zone incorporating them as well in BCZR Section 207.3. The O-T (Office and Technology) Zone lists accessory uses in BCZR Section 209.3.B. The S-E (Service-Employment) Zone lists accessory uses in BCZR Section 210.3.C along with "auxiliary commercial and retail" uses in BCZR Section 210.3.D. The C.B. and B.L.R. Zones (Community Business and Business Light Restricted) list "customary accessory uses" in BCZR Sections 229.A.3 and, by incorporation, 229.5.A.

The M.L.R. (Manufacturing-Light-Restricted) Zone lists limited accessory uses in BCZR Section 248.1.A.4. The M.L. Zone lists auxiliary retail or service uses by right in

BCZR Section 253.1.C. Interestingly, it permits as a temporary use a carnival for no more than 90 days. BCZR Section 253.1.D. The M.L. Zone goes on to list eight accessory uses. BCZR Section 253.1.F. It is also noteworthy that the M.L. Zone allows ten interim uses by special exception, including amusement parks and racetracks. BCZR Section 253.2.C. It also allows as a miscellaneous use commercial recreation facilities. BCZR Section 253.2.D.

In addition, BCZR Section 400.1 provides the more generic coverage of accessory uses in residential zones (including D.R. and R.C. Zones by BCZR 101.1 definition), which usually applies to garages, sheds, swimming pools, and the like.

Remarkably, in 2011, for the modest use of "in-law apartments," it took legislation by the County Council to allow a temporary use for accessory apartments in dwellings or detached buildings. Bill 49-2011, BCZR Section 400.4

To conclude this conceptual discussion, we believe that the first task in this case is to identify and name the use. The next task is to determine whether it is principal or accessory. If a use accurately fits within a use identified as a principal use in various zones, then it is likely a principal use in most cases. However, there may be uses which, depending on character, size, and scale, may arguably be principal uses in some circumstances but accessory uses in others.

To illustrate, if the judge agrees with our view that this is best described as a racetrack use (despite indication otherwise toward the end of the hearing), it is still necessary to evaluate this particular use. The treatment of racetracks as principal uses by special exception in the B.R., and M.L. zones indicates strongly that these ordinarily are principal rather than accessory uses, but we must still analyze the issue in depth.

II. Naming the R/C Car Use, and Determining if it is Accessory

a. Use Identification, the Naming Problem

The material facts about basic use are mostly not in dispute. There is some debate about the impact of the use, primarily of degree.

As Mr. Ross agreed, and is corroborated by the Wikipedia entry, model car racing began to take a significant place in the culture about fifty years ago. There are now

various types of tracks -- off-road and on-road, carpet, dirt, clay, or asphalt, varying in size, configuration, and location --- all around the United States and the world. Some may be in shopping centers, but there is no survey in evidence to give statistics.

There is a national organization called ROAR (Remotely Operated Auto Racers). Hobbie Guyz is a member in Region 2. There is an international organization called IFMAR (International Federation of Model Auto Racing). ROAR is one of the four blocs. The IFMAR website has multiple links, including a detailed set of rules.

Before setting up the current track in 2013, Hobbie Guyz and Gordon Ross previously ran a dirt track about 1200 feet away, across several roads. Before that, he conducted drag racing in Eastern Regional Park. We printed excerpts from YouTube videos to provide photographic evidence of the earlier activities.

The hobby shop is about 7000 square feet, .16 acre, with a product/sales area in front and an off-road carpet track in the rear. At least sixty feet away, at its closest point, is the outdoor R/C activity area.

The activity is seasonal, so far approximately April to September. The races take place on Saturdays. From setup of the course to the races to the closing down, the activity takes place from early in the morning to late in the evening, as the days lengthen. There was some debate about the precise opening and closing times. The average attendance has been about 30, with as high as 50.

The "model race track" area is an oval of about 150 feet x 60 feet (9000 square feet) and a tent area for parking, support, and attendant uses of about 120 feet x 60 feet (7200 square feet). Given the internal configuration of the course, the cars likely run well over 300 feet to complete a lap. There is a pit and intermediate area between the track and the tents. There is also a perimeter which includes a modest stand. If we begin with the track and tent areas, the 16,200 square feet calculates to .37 acre. If we add the areas in between and around, it is probably close to a half an acre. This does not count the fact that participants may park in surrounding areas.

The track has a starting line and finish line. The outside boundary is marked mostly by parking lot curbs. There is pvc set down to mark the turns. There are wooden

ramps or hills. There is a public address announcer to help manage starts, finishes, and rules issues. There is a computer timing mechanism. There are stands, however moderate or modest in size, for spectators.

The activity involves model car races of different classes and types of "hobby-grade" cars. Races often resemble tournaments in which many contestants pair off and the winner of each heat advances to the next round until there is a final and a champion. There are moderate entry fees for each race, and the award of prizes.

Mr. Ross said that many participants are customers of his hobby shop, but acknowledged that anyone can participate, no matter where they got their R/C car. As noted, this is the only such on-road track in Maryland. Enthusiasts come from many places in the region to compete, attend, and volunteer. There is advertising of the racing schedule and events.

The unmanned R/C cars are remote-controlled. Around the course, the owner of each car exercises control with electric or mechanical controllers. The cars have engines which may be electric or "nitro" (internal combustion, gasoline). The cars can achieve significant speeds, up to forty miles per hour according to Mr. Ross. The nitro engines produce the most noise.

There was debate about engine noise levels and about crowd noise and behavior. Kevin Arnold complained not just about the sound, but also the content of arguments. There was also the matter of the PA system and music. He found the impact so great that he could not enjoy his residence, even when he closed his windows.

At this particular location, there has also been a traffic congestion problem. The track adjoins the entrance to the shopping center nearest to the strip of stores. There was no dispute that some drivers rubberneck at the entrance to watch the races. Cars then back up on Bowleys Quarters Road. Mr. Ross set up signs to tell drivers to move on. There was debate about their effectiveness.

There are no portable bathrooms at this site. Gordon Ross said the attendees use the bathroom in the hobby shop. Kevin Arnold said they sometimes use the bushes near his residence. Mr. Ross and Mr. Arnold submitted photographs, so the record shows a good array of the activities and the operation. They also show the proximity of Mr. Arnold's property. As Mr. Arnold said, the track is within three feet of his property and very close to his dwelling. There was also shown an Iphone video on a laptop computer, which reflected the type of engine sounds, although not to the scale of the volume in the field.

This brings us to the matter of identification and naming the use. We already noted petitioners' own consistent and multiple descriptions of the use as "racing" (the petition), "model car race track" (the site plan), "raceway" (the sign and schedules).

Webster's Third New International Dictionary defines "racetrack" as

"a usu. oval course over which races are run esp.; a dirt track for flat or harness races."

In turn, the word "course" is defined in multiple ways, among which are:

"1 a: the act or action of moving in a particular path from point to point

2: the path over which something moves or the way which something extends: the line or way described by some progression, motion, or series: the direction taken or the ground traversed; TRACK, WAY ... as a: RACECOURSE"

We add that the definition of "track" includes the following:

"1 c: a way or road constructed and maintained for a specific purpose: as (1) a path laid out esp. for racing or exercise"

The definition of "race" is in great detail and is consistent with the above definitions.

The use here plainly fits the racetrack definition. It is "an oval course over which races are run." It fits the definition of "course" as well. Moreover, there is no doubt that it involves racing, and that the racing area meets the definition of "track."

At the conclusion of the hearing, the judge made inquiries or observations about aspects of the use here which differ from some racetrack uses. Let us discuss them.

There was the question of "structure." It is debatable whether a "structure" is necessary to lay out a course. But even if we assume it to be necessary, there is "structure" here. The definition of the word "structure" has many parts. Among them are:

"2 b something made up of more or less interdependent elements or parts: something having a definite and fixed pattern of organization (leaves and other complex

plant ---) (a glandular ---- at the base of the brain) ... (any object which is in some sense an organized whole is said to have, or to be characterized by ---)

4: the arrangement of particles or parts in a substance or body"

Suffice it to say that the definition is quite broad. Here, while the existing curbs of the parking lot constitute a substantial part of the racetrack boundary, they still form part of the structure of the racetrack, which also includes internal pvc barriers, ramps, and start and finish lines. There are also the tent and pit areas. In sum, there is structure to this use.

Indeed, that the on-road course is completely outside, standing alone, rather than in a stadium or building structure, adds to its problematic nature, as discussed below. In contrast, the indoor off-road carpet racetrack inside the hobby shop does not present such problems.

Analogously, BCZR Sec. 431, which regulates commercial vehicles on residential property, allows certain vehicles if parked within a fully enclosed structure, but allows them outside only under strict limits. The point is that the absence of a building enclosure is not a favorable factor for the use here.

It was also brought up that the R/C cars are unmanned. But there is nothing in the definition of racetrack which requires that racers be manned or involve animals such as horses or dogs. Indeed, R/C cars are still called cars, even though the traditional car has a human driver. In an analogous context, drones are types of aircraft:

"3 a a pilotless airplane remote controlled by radio signals b a seagoing ship remote controlled by radio"

The subject of the intermittent or periodic timing of the use also came up. But there is nothing in the racetrack definition which requires racing every day. Indeed, most racing as well as other athletic and entertainment events are of an occasional or periodic nature. The problem is that, however intermittent, these uses tend to be highly intense for a variety of reasons.

Whether track and field, horse racing, or other events, they may take place from time to time. Many outdoor running races have courses or paths without significant structural boundaries, whether inside a stadium or cross-country or marathons. Marathon courses may be set up temporarily without major structures annually. There are intermittent music concerts at some outdoor venues, where there may be a setup for a particular event. They may be in amphitheatres with temporary stages, for example. At the annual Maryland State Fair, there is harness racing for only a couple of weeks at most. Another example would be outdoor event venues for parties and weddings of an occasional nature. These are still significant land uses.

So, having considered all these aspects of the situations, we come back to the point that the Webster's Dictionary definition confirms and corroborates that the use is what we thought it was and what it has been called, namely, a racetrack.

Furthermore, if it is not a racetrack, then what is it? In theory, we might call it a commercial recreation facility. But the BCZR Section 101.1 definition excludes go-cart tracks. In light of the applicability of the racetrack category, we must eliminate this use. Anyway, it is not permitted in the B.L. Zone.

If the use is to be permitted at all, we must give it a name. We cannot find any other use, whether listed as a principal or accessory use, which fits the R/C model car racetrack. We would have to make up a new name, such as gathering place or event venue. These names candidly do not seem satisfactory, and they are nowhere found in the zoning regulations.

This concludes our analysis of the identification and naming of the use. Having concluded it is a racetrack, we proceed to analyze whether it is a principal or accessory use. Conservatively, we shall do the analysis on the alternative assumption that the judge may nevertheless conclude the use is something other than a racetrack.

b. Principal or Accessory Use

Racetracks are permitted as principal uses by special exception in the B.R. and M.L. zones. BCZR Sections 236.2, 253.2.C.5. As noted in our July 24, 2014 letter, the applicability of a particular principal use is a strong factor weighing against any attempt to cover it or rationalize it in a broader or more general category. <u>Arundel Supply Co. v. Cason</u> 265 Md. 371, 377-78 (1972); <u>Smith v. Miller</u> 249 Md. 390, 394-95 (1968); <u>St. Clair v. Colonial Pipeline Co.</u> 235 Md. 578, 582-83 (1964). <u>Arundel</u> involved an attempt

to escape the zoning law via the rationalization of "accessory use." Smith and St. Clair involved attempts to escape the zoning law by reference to broad categories where the use was identified and permitted in other zones, but prohibited in the zone where the property was situated. We think these cases reinforce our conclusion that we are dealing with a principal racetrack use.

We also note that the Business-Local Zone lists, by our count, 75 principal permitted uses by right and 29 by special exception, many of which are categories with multiple included uses. BCZR Sections 230.1.A., 230.3. The permitted uses by right in BCZR Section 230.1.A.9 include, among others, automobile parking lot, billiard and pool rooms, bowling alley, clothing and accessory stores, helistop, hobby shop, parking lot, pet shop, and swimming pool. The one temporary use listed is "temporary or occasional outdoor sales of cut flowers or live plants, subject to standards. Remarkably, BCZR Section 230.1.A.11 lists:

"Accessory uses or structures, including signs, (see Section 450), garages and parking spaces for the use of owners, employees, tenants, and invitees. A maximum of six coin-operated children's rides are permitted as an accessory use."

The B.M. Zone has the same language. BCZR Section 233.1.D.

The R/C car use here simply does not fit under any of the listed permitted use categories, principal or accessory. Significantly, racetrack use here does not fit the language, purpose, spirit and intent of the B.L. Zone accessory use category. There is no general category for accessory uses in business zones comparable to the relatively broad scope of accessory uses allowed in residential zones under BCZR Section 400.1.

Let us assume nevertheless that, without finding a proper name for the use or correlating it specifically to the B.L. zone, we can somehow call it a legal accessory use if it is related to a permitted principal use in a way which meets the BCZR Section 101.1 definition of accessory use. In other words, let us assume, based on this definition, that anything on the same lot as the hobby shop may qualify if it is "(a) customarily incident and subordinate to and serves [the hobby shop], (b) is subordinate in area, extent or purpose ... (c) is located on the same lot as the [hobby shop] served; and (d) contributes

to the comfort, convenience and necessity of the occupants, business or industry [the hobby shop] served ..."

We note that Webster's defines "shop," in pertinent part, as:

"2 a: a building or room stocked with merchandise for sale ..."

Let us then begin with the inquiry as to whether the racetrack is "incident and subordinate." We have already cited the very application and definition of "incidental" in Dampman v. City of Baltimore 231 Md. 280, 286 (1963). Webster's defines "incident" as, in pertinent part,

- "1 b An accompanying minor occurrence or condition ..."
- 3 a Something dependent upon, appertaining, or subordinate thereto, or accompanying something else of principal or greater importance ..."

The latter is essentially the definition applied in <u>Dampman</u>. The definition of "incidental is along the same lines.

Meanwhile, Webster's defines "subordinate" as, again in pertinent part,

"1: placed in a lower order, class, or rank: holding a lower or inferior position
....."

Taking these together, let us proceed. We submit that the racetrack or racing use stands on its own, whatever name we give to it. The on-road track could be located anywhere, as it was here before 2013, and as is likely at many venues around the country. In this sense, it is not tethered to this hobby shop, or any other.

In terms of area, the racetrack course and tent areas alone occupy .37 acre, well over twice the area of the hobby shop at .16 acre. As noted, we must keep in mind the added area occupied by the pit, the interstices, and the inevitable milling around the perimeter and likely overflow parking. So, the comparison is conservative.

In terms of character, the racing use is very different from the hobby shop in every way. To be sure, it may be convenient to have the racetrack near the shop, but it involves a different activity. It involves an outdoor event which draws a crowd, regional in nature, with significant noise (engines, p.a. system, music, humans), traffic issues, and not found in any hobby shop.

This racetrack is not "incident," as it surely cannot reasonably be described as minor. Nor is it subordinate. It is not just that the racetrack is much bigger than the hobby shop. The adverse land use impacts are inevitably of much greater magnitude in quality and quantity.

This racetrack is not dependent on the hobby shop. The hobby shop existed before this racetrack, and the hobby shop owner operated R/C tracks at other locations before locating the current track.

Now, let us take a step back and consider the requirement that an accessory use be "customarily" incident and subordinate. Mr. Ross has mentioned other on-road tracks operated by hobby shops in shopping centers. But there is no survey to provide a realistic percentage. There is nothing in any of the online sources such as ROAR, IFMAR, racerlog.com to suggest that outdoor R/C tracks are ordinarily located near hobby shops or in shopping centers.

Taking another point of view, we must keep in mind that there are many hobby shops in Maryland, and none of them but this one currently have an outdoor track connected with them. There are still a multitude of strip shopping centers in Maryland, and this is the only one with an outdoor R/C track.

So, whatever we call this activity, and we have to call it something, it does not qualify as an accessory use. If, despite initial indications of doubt, the judge agrees with us that it is a racetrack, it just reinforces the point.

As a footnote, we observe that a couple of children playing in the backyard could conceivably set up a miniature racetrack. But this sort of activity would truly be a minor residential recreational use dependent on the dwelling. It may also be arguable that the Hobby Guyz modest indoor carpet racetrack inside the shop building is incident and subordinate, without significant land use impact, so that it qualifies as an accessory use. But that is a very different sort of racetrack use. There is no present controversy, and none foreseeable. We do not need to analyze that to decide the present case.

III. The On-Road Track Zoning Issue Generally in the B.L. Zone

While the current focus is on the Hobbie Guyz model car race track, we must underline that such tracks can vary in type, size, scale, and impact. We must also keep in mind that B.L. Zones are often adjacent to residential zones and that strip shopping centers often border dwellings, ranging from single-family detached to townhouses to apartments. They may also border other uses where the occupants would find the racetrack use problematic.

If such racetrack uses can come into B.L. Zones under the guise of accessory uses, then the door is open to major adverse land use impacts. It is inevitable that such uses will present noise, traffic, and other problems associated with events drawing crowds. Moreover, dirt and clay tracks could generate air, wind, and dust migration issues.

These problems are not qualitatively different from the problems presented by midget racing, snowmobiles, motocross, and ATV uses. We submitted several cases from other states. We shall briefly discuss them here. While involving manned vehicles, they reflect the treatment of various racing event uses as principal racetrack uses.

The most helpful cases appear to be the following, in chronological order:

- (1) <u>City of Norwalk v. Auction City, Inc.</u> 186 Cal. App. 2d 287 (Cal. App. 1960). The appellate court affirmed injunction against midget racing racetrack where statute prohibited racetracks in the absence of special use permit. "Midget racing" involved nonprofit activity for children in small vehicles with 2-horsepower lawnmower motors around a 1/20 mile track (264 feet). Court noted that it could not deviate from the law based on the claims of educational and recreational purposes or that the activity has less objectionable or annoying than other types of racetracks.
- (2) Ironstone Corp. v. Zoning Hearing Board of Douglas Township 291 A.2d 310 (Pa. Cmwlth 1972). The appellate court affirmed emphatically zoning board's determination that seasonal winter snowmobile racing constituted racetrack use prohibited in industrial zone except by special exception subject to "detrimental to health, safety, and welfare" standards. Races proceeded from a fixed starting point to finishing point along a marked course; as many as 12 entrants in each race; cash prizes

sometimes awarded; and some advertising. It was unclear what structures, if any, were used to mark the course. The record included evidence that the noise offended neighbors, but the appellate court anyway held that it would have been an abuse of discretion to say this was not a racetrack.

- (3) <u>Neshannock Township v. Musguire</u> 484 A.2d 839 (Pa.Cmwlth 1984), The appellate court affirmed injunction against commercial motocross racetrack use because use was not permitted "recreational ground" in residential district and could not be allowed in the absence of a use permit meeting standards of compatibility with uses in district and consistency with purpose of ordinance.
- (4) <u>Town of Uxbridge v. Griff</u> 860 N.E. 2d 972 (Mass. App. 2007). The appellate court affirmed town zoning board determination that motocross use was not permitted in industrial zone where use was offensive to neighbors.
- (5) <u>Hawk v. Eldred Township Board of Supervisors</u> 983 A.2d 216 (Pa. Cmwlth 2009). The appellate court affirmed, in rejecting a constitutional challenge to the zoning ordinance, referred to its earlier unreported decision that motorcycle, ATV, and Weekend Warriors Club activities were not permitted as "private club" use but rather were prohibited racetrack uses.

To sum up, <u>Norwalk</u>, <u>Uxbridge</u>, and <u>Hawk</u> affirmed decisions that the uses were racetracks and were not permitted under the zoning ordinance. <u>Ironstone</u> and <u>Neshannock</u> held that the racetrack uses were not permitted generally, but were subject to special exception-type standards for which they either did not qualify or had not qualified. These cases all treated the various sorts of racetracks as principal uses, not accessory uses.

We also looked at cases presenting "accessory use" questions in other contexts.

These included the following, again in chronological order:

(1) <u>Gray v. Ward</u> 343 N.Y.S. 2d 749 (N.Y. Supreme Ct. 1973). Court annulled village grant of building permit rooftop helipad use for executives of Alexander's department store because it did not qualify as an accessory use.

(2) <u>Smith v. Zoning Hearing Board of Conewago Township</u> 713 A.2d 1210 (Pa. Cmwlth. Ct. 1998). Appellate court affirmed zoning board determination that skydiving business use and mobile home office did not qualify as accessory uses to airport.

Petitioners rely on <u>County Comm'rs v. Zent</u> 86 Md. App. 745 (1991). The CSA there held that storage activities cold qualify as an accessory use to a milk trucking and distribution business in an agricultural zone. Respectfully, we do not find this case to be germane to the present issue.

It remains our office's opinion, therefore, that if the use is to be permitted in the B.L. Zone, then it will take specific legislative action to allocate the use, whether by right or special exception, and to set parameters such as bulk, area, and other standards.

IV. Adverse Land Use Impacts

There is no doubt that on-road racetracks generate particular adverse land use impacts. In the present case, Mr. Arnold gave credible testimony relating to the noise impacts from engines, the public address system, and crowd activity. There was also the traffic congestion issue. The lack of portable toilets led to additional issues.

To be sure, Mr. Ross and his supporting witnesses downplayed these problems and viewed the events as fun family affairs. But realistically, these sorts of events are going to generate some problems. When they are right next to residential uses, the problems are magnified.

One of the basic functions of zoning law is to guard against the right thing being in the wrong place, echoing nuisance law. The Supreme Court made this observation almost ninety years ago in Village of Euclid v. Ambler Realty Co. 272 U.S. 365 (1926). Justice Sutherland also made the point that an adequate margin of safety is often warranted. He pointed out that the law may be upheld even if it covers some uses which are relatively innocuous.

The adverse land use impacts here are likely to be significant when the location is close to adjacent uses, whether residential or otherwise. Again, this reinforces our point that these are principal uses, and that if they are to be permitted, it is up to the legislature to make the judgment and set the parameters.

We recognize that, according to Mr. Ross, this is currently the only outdoor onroad track in Maryland. But these tracks seem to pop up from time to time in different ways. There seems to be some growing enthusiasm among a part of the population. So, we should treat the issue with the seriousness it deserves.

Conclusion

Respectfully, it remains our view that the outdoor on-road racing use is not permitted in the B.L. Zone. We submit it is best described as a type of racetrack use. Anyway, whatever name it goes by, it does not qualify as an accessory use. We appreciate the fairness and patience of the administrative law judge in reviewing this case and look forward to the decision.

Dear Judge Beverungen,

Upon review of this zoning petition, the record, and the background, we find it necessary and appropriate to submit our legal analysis. We trust this will be helpful in deciding this case. We also trust this will provide the petitioner with notice of our position.

I. An Enforcement Proceeding Generates a Settlement, ALJ Order, and Zoning Petition

Petitioners filed this zoning petition June 17, 2014. It comes in the wake of a zoning enforcement proceeding, which began with citation CC 1402662, issued June 11, 2014. On July 2, 2014, Managing Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) Lawrence Stahl convened a hearing. The County, by Brady Locher, Assistant County Attorney, and Hobbie Guyz, by Andrew Grenzer, Esq., advised ALJ Stahl they were negotiating a settlement agreement. This came to fruition July 9, 2014. They submitted it on July 10. ALJ Stahl accepted it and incorporated it into his July 15, 2014 final order.

II. The July 9 Settlement Agreement

This order and the settlement agreement are enclosed. Hobbie Guyz agreed to suspend its "race radio-controlled cars" until approval by an Administrative Law Judge or the County Board of Appeals. There are other provisions which we need not detail for the purpose of this letter. The main thing is that the zoning petition, actually filed prior to the settlement agreement, comes before you as administrative law judge on August 1, 2014.

III. The Petition for Special Hearing

The petition requests approval of temporary outdoor model car racing in a parking lot as an accessory use to a hobby shop on a shopping center property in the Middle River/Bowleys Quarters area. The shopping center is zoned B.L. (Business-Local), BCZR Sec. 230, et seq.

The petition involves a type of racetrack. The site plan is fairly nondescript, but identifies a "PORTABLE R/C MODEL RACE TRACK" in a portion of the parking lot approximately 215 feet long by 50 feet wide (10,750 square feet) and "PARKING AND TENTS" in an area which looks to be about 90 feet by 50 feet (4500 square feet). So, in combination, the land use occupies about 15,250 square feet. This is .35 acre, a little over a third of an acre. It is not clear whether there is an additional area for spectators.

The site plan is not certified by an engineer or surveyor, so its accuracy and sufficiency may be questioned. It does not show the entire shopping center. Nor does it show the "hobby shop" to which the racetrack is alleged to be accessory.

IV. People's Counsel's Position: The Proposed Use Is Not Permitted in the Zone

Our office finds sufficient material facts, not genuinely in dispute, to conclude that the proposed use is not permitted. To be sure, the burden of proof is on the petitioner. But, in our office's view, the issue is not even fairly debatable. The issue may be decided as a matter of law. We shall explain our reasons, and submit on the record.

a. Zoning Law: Interpretation; Structure

The interpretation of zoning use definitions typically presents at heart a question of law and language. This also goes to differentiate accessory from principal uses and the relationship of different uses. Arundel Supply Co. v. Cason 265 Md. 371, 377-78 (1972); Smith v. Miller 249 Md. 390, 394-95 (1968); St. Clair v. Colonial Pipeline Co. 235 Md. 578, 582-83 (1964); Kenyon v. Board of Zoning Appeals 235 Md. 388, 394 (1964); Kowalski v. Lamar 25 Md. App. 493, 496-501 (1975); United Parcel Service v. People's Counsel 93 Md. App. 59, 71-74 ((1993), rev'd on other grounds 336 Md. 569 (1994). To be a permitted use, a use must be enumerated as such by right or special exception in a particular zone. Kowalski v. Lamar 25 Md. App. 493 (1975); People's Counsel v. Surina 400 Md. 662 (2007).

b. Not Permitted as a Principal Use

A racetrack use is plainly not permitted as a principal use either by right or special exception in the B.L. Zone. BCZR Sec. 102.1; 230.1, 230.3. Indeed, the petition does not claim the proposed use is permitted as a principal use. The zoning law does address racetrack uses and places them in other zones. Racetrack uses are permitted by special exception "racetrack, commercial" in the B.R. (Business-Roadside) Zone under BCZR Sec. 236.2 and

by interim special exception for "racetracks" in the M.L. (Manufacturing-Light) Zone under BCZR 253.2.C.5.

We also reviewed the definition of "commercial recreation facility." BCZR Sec. 101.1. See <u>Riffin v. People's Counsel</u> 137 Md. App. 90, cert. denied 363 Md. 660 (2001). It specifically excludes "go-cart course" uses, which appear analogous to the proposed use here. Anyway, a commercial recreation facility is not permitted in the B.L. Zone.

As we shall explain below, the specific treatment of racetrack uses, and their exclusion from the B.L. Zone, reinforces our view that this racetrack --- even for radio-controlled cars --- cannot properly be bootstrapped in under the guise of an accessory hobby use. This is a significant use which occupies a substantial area.

c. Not Permitted as an Accessory Use

We have often dealt with accessory use claims and theories, such as in the <u>Riffin</u> case, No. 2014-094-SPH, now on appeal at the County Board of Appeals. The proposed use here does not qualify.

BCZR §101.1 defines "accessory use or structure" and "principal use."

"ACCESSORY USE OR STRUCTURE: A use or structure which: (a) is customarily incident and subordinate to and serves a principal use or structure; (b) is subordinate in area, extent or purpose to the principal use or structure; (c) is located on the same lot as the principal use or structure served; and (d) contributes to the comfort, convenience or necessity of occupants, business or industry in the principal use or structure served; except that, where specifically provided in the applicable regulations, accessory off-street parking need not be located on the same lot. An accessory building, as defined above, shall be considered an accessory structure. A trailer may be an accessory use or structure if hereinafter so specified. An ancillary use shall be considered as an accessory use; however, a use of such a nature or extent as to be permitted as a "use in combination" (with a service station) shall be considered a principal use."

"PRINCIPAL USE: A main use of land, as distinguished from an accessory use."

There may be more than one principal structure or use on a property. Here, the size, scope, and character of the use is of sufficient magnitude to exceed the framework of an "accessory use." The proposed uses do not meet the "accessory use or structure" definitional criterion of (a) "customarily incident and subordinate to ... the principal use." Nor is it (b) "subordinate in area, extent, or purpose" Rather, even if periodic, it is akin to a "principal use." It is "[a] main use of land, as distinguished from an accessory use."

To illustrate, there is nothing "incidental," or "appertaining, subordinate, or casual," about this use or structure either in size or character. In <u>Dampman v. City of Baltimore</u> 231 Md. 280 (1963), the Court analyzed the meaning of "incidental" where the ordinance allowed an "incidental" addition to a legal nonconforming use. The Court held that a second-floor addition, 12 feet wide and 22 feet long was not incidental, and wrote,

"The statute in requiring that the use be 'incidental' does not, we think, contemplate a major addition to or a major expansion of the nonconforming use, but rather one appertaining, subordinate or casual thereto." 231 Md. at 286.

Indeed, the proposed "accessory use" appears to dwarf the size of the hobby shop. We enclosed Google Earth online photos, shaded in yellow to mark the approximate location and situation of the hobby shop. It appears to one of the shops in a strip, and of moderate size.

Nor is the use "customary." This is simply not a customary use of a shopping center parking lot. The use is extraordinary. This reinforces the point that it is not "accessory."

Moreover, the zoning regulations explicit placement of racetracks in other zones is relevant not only directly to the assessment of principal uses, but also indirectly to the assessment of the accessory use issue. Where zoning regulations define specifically a use or structure which fits the one in question, the use may not be rationalized under the guise of another more general use, whether "principal" or "accessory." To illustrate, in Smith v. Miller, 249 Md. 390 (1968), the Harford County Board of Appeals granted a special exception for a sawmill operation in an agricultural zone. A special exception was permitted for "Processing of. . . farm products." But the law explicitly listed "sawmill" as a permitted use in a manufacturing zone. The Zoning Board and Circuit Court had reasoned that "timber is a farm product; a sawmill processes it; therefore, Mr. Miller is entitled to build a sawmill in an agricultural district." The Court of Appeals reversed, as a matter of law,

"The testimony before the Board reveals the character of Mr. Miller's operation. . . This can scarcely be regarded as consistent with the other conditional uses possible under Section 702. To take any other view would open the county's agricultural district to any industrial development remotely connected with the processing of dairy and farm products . . . and would make meaningless the provision of the Ordinance which attempts to confine sawmills, . . . to a general industrial district." 249 Md. at 393-4.

"The provisions of the Ordinance must be considered as an entirety, and we do not think the Board could rely on a conditional use provision to permit in an agricultural use district a use which the Ordinance manifestly intended to confine to a general industrial district." 249 Md. at 395.

Correspondingly, in refusing to find the washing and screening of gravel from other sites as accessory to a permitted gravel pit use, the Court of Appeals stated in <u>Arundel Supply Corp.</u> v. Cason, 265 Md. 371, 378 (1972), as a matter of law,

"We are not persuaded that this is so any more than we could be persuaded that a commercial bakery in an agricultural zone could be said to be a use accessory to the raising of wheat."

In reaching this conclusion, Judge McWilliams also observed, 265 Md. at 377,

"The plausibility of what we have said is enhanced by the fact that under the 1948 ordinance washing, screening and batching required a highly restrictive special exception."

V. Precedent and Public Policy; the Legislative Function

So far as we can recall, this is the first case to present the issue of a racetrack for radio-controlled cars in a shopping center. We have no way of knowing whether this could be the harbinger of other proposals. We do know that this case will set a precedent.

It may be debated whether or not this use is problematic, here or in other B.L. Zone locations. What we do know is that is not presently permitted by law. It is the function of the legislature to make policy. This is part of our governmental structure with separation of powers. If petitioners believe it is good public policy to permit this use in a shopping center, whether by right or special exception, conditionally or unconditionally, they must make their case to the County Council.

On June 11, 2014, pursuant to BCC § 3-6-205, Inspector Joshua Homan issued a Code Enforcement & Inspections Citation. The citation was sent to the Respondent by 1st class mail to the last known address listed in the Maryland State Tax Assessment files.

The citation proposed a civil penalty of \$1,200.00 (One thousand two hundred dollars).

The following persons appeared for the Hearing and testified: Respondent, Andrew Grenzer, Mr. Ross on behalf of the respondent, Brady Locher, Assistant Baltimore County Attorney and Phillip Mills, Baltimore County Code Enforcement Officer.

Evidence was presented that the abovenoted violations were the subject of negotiations between counsel for the County and Mr. Grenzer, on behalf of the Respondent. SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT

Plaintiff, Baltimore County, Maryland, a body corporate and public, (hereinafter "Baltimore County") and Defendant, Hobbie Guyz LLC, collectively referred to as the "Parties," hereby enter into this Settlement Agreement (hereinafter the "Agreement") and agree to all of the terms set forth herein, which will formally be made a part of the record in the above-captioned matter:

WHERBAS, Baltimore County issued a Code Enforcement & Inspection Citation on June 11, 2014, arising from the activities of Hobbie Guyz LLC, and its affiliate MRH Racing LLC (d/b/a "MRH", and "MR Hobbies") located at 164 Carroll Island Road; and

WHEREAS the Citation named Hobbie Guyz LLC as tenants of the property located at 164 Carroll Island Road, to be in continuing violation of section 32-3-102 the Baltimore County Code, and section 500.9 Baltimore County Zoning Regulations; and

WHEREAS, the matter was ultimately set in for a public hearing on July 2, 2014; and
WHEREAS, the Parties have reached a negotiated settlement of their dispute and desire
to settle all known issues and disputes surrounding the instant Code Enforcement & Inspection
Citations;

NOW, THERBFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises set forth below and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is expressly acknowledged, the Parties agree to the following terms:

- 1. Effective immediately, Hobbie Guyz LLC, or its affiliate MRH Racing LLC, located at 164 Carroll Island Road, Middle River, MD 21202, its agents and assigns, will not race radio-controlled (R.C.) cars in the storefront parking lot of MR Hobbies located at 164 Carroll Island Road unless and until such time that either an Administrative Judge of the Office of Administrative Hearings for Baltimore County or the Board of Appeals for Baltimore County issues an order ruling that such prior cited use conforms with the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations.
- 2. In exchange for all terms and conditions set forth in this Settlement Agreement, the Defendant agrees to be liable for Four-Hundred dollars (\$400.00) in civil penalties if, in the final adjudication of this matter, it is determined that the prior cited use did not conform with the Baltimore County Zoning Regulations.
- Baltimore County agrees that the Defendant will not be liable for any amount of civil penalties if the prior cited use is deemed a conforming use by the Office of Adminstrative Hearings or the Board of Appeals.
- 4. Payment of any civil penalties due and owing under the terms of this agreement shall be made to Baltimore County within 10 days of the issuance of a final order from the Office of Administrative Hearings; or in the event of a timely appeal, within 10 days of the issuance of a final order from the Board of Appeals.
- 5. Any violation of the terms and conditions of this Settlement Agreement by Hobbie Guyz LLC, its agents or assigns, including MRH Racing LLC, shall result in the

immediate and non-appealable imposition of the entire One-Thousand Two-Hundred dollar (\$1,200.00) civil penalty contained in the citation issued by Baltimore County in this matter.

- 6. If payments described in Paragraph Four of this Settlement Agreement are more than five (5) days late, the entire One-Thousand Two-Hundred dollar (\$1,200.00) civil penalty shall be immediately imposed and such imposition is non-appealable.
- 7. Any penalty imposed as a result of a violation of this Settlement Agreement will constitute a fine and penalty payable to the governmental unit known as Baltimore County; will be entered as a civil judgment in the District Court of Maryland for Baltimore County, and will hold Hobbie Guyz LLC liable.
 - 8. This Settlement Agreement contains the entire agreement between the Parties.
 - 9. The terms of this Agreement are contractual and not a mere recital.
- 10. If this Agreement is executed by an authorized representative of any party, the representative represents and warrants that full authority has been granted to such representative to fully bind the party and anyone holding or claiming by, through or under him/her/it.
- 11. This Agreement may be signed by any number of counterparts with the same effect as if signatures to each such counterpart were a part of the same instrument.
- 12. The Parties state that they have carefully reviewed this Agreement and that they expressly consent to all of the terms contained herein.

Radio controlled (or R/C) cars are self-powered model cars or trucks that can be controlled from a distance using a specialized transmitter. The term "R/C" has been used to mean both "remote controlled" and "radio controlled", where "remote controlled" includes vehicles that are connected to their controller by a wire, but common use of "R/C" today usually refers to vehicles controlled by a radio-frequency link. This article focuses on radio-controlled vehicles only.

Cars are powered by various sources Electric models are powered by small but powerful electric motors and rechargeable nickel-cadmium, nickel metal hydride, or lithium polymer cells. There are also brushed or brushless electric motors. Most fuel-powered models use glow plug engines, small internal combustion engines fueled by a special mixture of nitromethane, methanol, and oil (in most cases a blend of castor oil and synthetic oil). These are referred to as "nitro" cars. Recently, exceptionally large models have been introduced that are powered by small gasoline engines, similar to string trimmer motors, which use a mix of oil and gasoline. Electric cars are generally considered easier for the novice to work with compared to fuel-driven models, but can be equally as complex at the higher budget and skill levels.

In both of these categories, both on-road and off-road vehicles are available. Off-road models, which are built with fully functional off-road suspensions, and a wide tire selection, can be used on various types of terrain. On-road cars, with a much less robust suspension, are strictly limited to smooth, paved surfaces. In the past decade, advances in "on-road" vehicles have made their suspension as adjustable as many full scale race cars, today.

Hobby-grade radio control models

In recent years, hobby-grade "ready-to-run" (or "RTR") models have become readily available from major manufacturers of radio-controlled cars, attracting many hobbyists who would otherwise not have purchased a kit car, Vehicles of this type need little or no final assembly and in most cases, the bodies are shipped painted and trimmed. Safety inspection of the product to ensure correct operation is essential, as injury to operators or bystanders from disassembling vehicles is possible. A number of cars and trucks are presently available only in ready-to-run form. The growing popularity of the RTR vehicle has prompted many manufacturers to discontinue production of kit vehicles. High-spec racing vehicles are generally still available or sold only as kits, and companies like ThunderTiger, Losi, HPI and Tamiya sell kit and RTR versions with the benefits of a kit version being in upgraded parts or lower costs, respectively. Hobby grade vehicles can cost much more, ranging from \$90 to over \$1600.

Electric models

Electrically powered models utilize mechanical or electronic speed control units to adjust the amount of power delivered to the electric motor. The power delivered is proportional to the amount of throttle called for by the transmitter - the more you pull the trigger, the faster it goes. The voltage is "pulsed" using transistors to produce varying output with smooth transitions and greater efficiency. Electronic speed controllers use solid state components to regulate duty cycle, adjusting the power delivered to the electrical motor. In addition, most electronic speed controllers can use the electric motor as a magnetic brake, offering better control of the model than is possible with a mechanical speed control. Mechanical speed controllers use a network of resistors and switch between them by rotating a head with an electrode around a plate that has electrical contacts. Mechanical speed controllers are prone to being slow to react because they are actuated by servos, waste energy in the form of heat from the resistors, commonly become dirty and perform intermittently, and lack a dedicated braking ability. They appear only in vintage RC models, and are now essentially obsolete. Most electric cars up to recently used brushed motors but now many people are turning to brushless motors for their higher power output and because they require much less maintenance. They are rated either in relative turns or Kv. The Kv number tells how many RPM the motor will turn per volt, assuming no load and maximum efficiency. However, the ability of the system to put out power is dependent on the quality of the batteries used, wires and connectors supplying power. Due to their power, brushless motors are also used in bigger monster trucks and 1/8 nitro-powered buggies that have been converted to electric. High quality brushless systems can be much more powerful than nitro and can accomplish feats such as standing backflips when installed in a monster truck, most notably the HPI Savage Flux. Some 1/5 scale gas to electric conversions are in production but are uncommon due to high price. A new (2012) form of electric r/c racing is MAGracing. Toy-grade R/C cars

Toy-grade R/C cars are typically manufactured with a focus on design coupled with reducing production costs. Whereas a hobby-grade car has separate electronic components that are individually replaceable if they fail, toy grade cars are typically made with components harder to find as spare parts and a single electronic circuit board integrated into the design of the vehicle. Although hobby-grade enthusiasts look down on toy-grade R/C cars, their maintenance is much easier than of the hobby-grade models since number of components is drastically smaller, and pairs can be harvested at almost no cost from any R/C toy car of the similar size. Performance is proportional to the price, but with addition of hobby-grade type of batteries (LiPo) toy R/C cars can get up to 1/2 the speed of comparable hobby-grade car for 1/5 of the price. Stock toy-grade cars are equipped with weaker motors and are powered by alkaline or NiCad batteries which means their top speed is usually only 5-15 mph. Cheaper ones lack any form of a suspension and the ones that do feature a suspension have very primitive or rudimentary designs. Steering is typically not proportional (with only three positions: straight, full left, and full right) and there is typically no proportional "throttle" either, with stopped and full power usually

Extra steering guidance is provided by steel wires hidden in the track surface enabling more accurate steering than is attainable with free running r/c cars. Tracks can therefore be much narrower and smaller making the system suitable for 'in home' racing. Cars can be driven back onto the track after an 'off', using reverse if necessary, so that track marshals are not required,

Nitro 5000 powered models

Nitromethane nitro powered models utilize a single servo for throttle and braking control: rotation of the servo in one direction will cause the throttle on the carburetor to open, providing more air and fuel mixture to the internal combustion engine. Rotation of the servo in the other direction causes torque to be applied to a linkage and cam which causes friction with the braking material. The brake is commonly located on the driveshaft or spur gear in some cases and applies stopping power only to the driven wheels. Some models will also use an additional servo to control a transmission box, enabling the vehicle to drive in reverse.

Fuel engine sizes most often range between .12-.35 cubic inches. This is due to restrictions by the main sanctioning bodies for radio-controlled racing. Many "outlaw" engines are manufactured larger than these, mainly intended for vehicles which will not be used in sanctioned races and therefore do not need to comply with these regulations. Engine size is related to the class of car, 1/10 scale on and off road vehicles usually are equipped with .12-.18 cubic inch engines, with 1/8 scale vehicles using .21-.32 cubic inch engines. There are exceptions, with many Schumacher and Thunder Tiger/Team

Associated RC models being good examples of unusually large engines coming as standard equipment on certain models.

Fuel-powered engines allow model cars to reach moderate speeds unmodified. Maximum power is generally achieved at medium to high speeds, and a slightly slower throttle response than electrically powered vehicles is to be expected due to clutching and lack of torque. Electric motors effectively produce instantaneous torque, whereas nitro engines, like full-sized gasoline engines, take time for the engine to spool up and for the clutch to engage. Nitro- (and fuel) powered cars may be refueled and returned to action in a few seconds, as opposed to electrics needing to remove the hody shell and battery fasteners to replace a discharged battery. Nitro cars are cooled some by air, some by the oil mixed in with the fuel and may be run continuously with no need to take breaks for cooling down assuming they are properly tuned.

Nitro-powered cars operate like full-sized fuel vehicles more than their electric counterparts do, making use of a two stroke engine rather than an electric motor. The sound of the engine noise is a main selling points to nitro enthusiasts, even though brushless electric equilivents-are. generally faster. However, their exhaust contains unburned oil, which usually ends up coating the chassis. This, in turn, requires more cleaning than an electric-powered equivalent. Cleaning is usually achieved by the use of compressed air nozzles and solvents (such as
